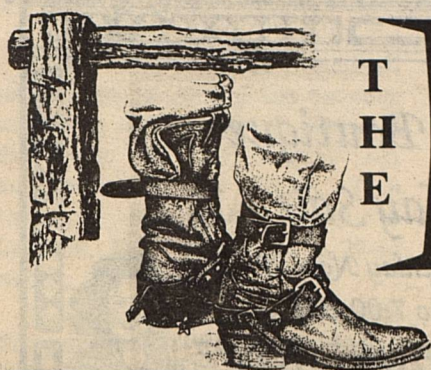

Robin Hood Forum Presents Argument Over School Finance

The superintendent of Andrews Independent School District says that legislation passed by the Texas Legislature earlier this year to equalize funding among the state's school districts is a failure.

"This is not a rich against poor issue. Anyway you cut it, the burden falls on local taxpayers whether they reside in a poor district or a rich district," said James Pennington.

Senate Bill 351 took money from districts with higher than average property wealth that forced increases in local taxes and/or cuts in education programs. About 50 of these districts have banded together in a group called the "Robin Hood Forum" to make their stand on the school finance issue. Plains ISD is a member of this group.

Research being conducted by the Robin Hood Forum indicates that while the new law has hurt programs in the wealthier districts it has not significantly helped the poorer districts.

The bottom line is that the state of Texas is once again neglecting its

Cowboys Win 2nd In State

responsibility to adequately fund quality education," said Bill Reeves, superintendent in Palacios ISD. "Nobody is really a winner under this plan because it still fails to deliver a sufficient amount of money to poorer school districts so they can truly make a difference. At the same time, it simply levels down higher spending schools to a state-imposed standard of mediocrity."

Many of the poor districts that received additional money through the County Education District (CED) distribution report that their local property taxes have also increased with little or no improvement in their education programs.

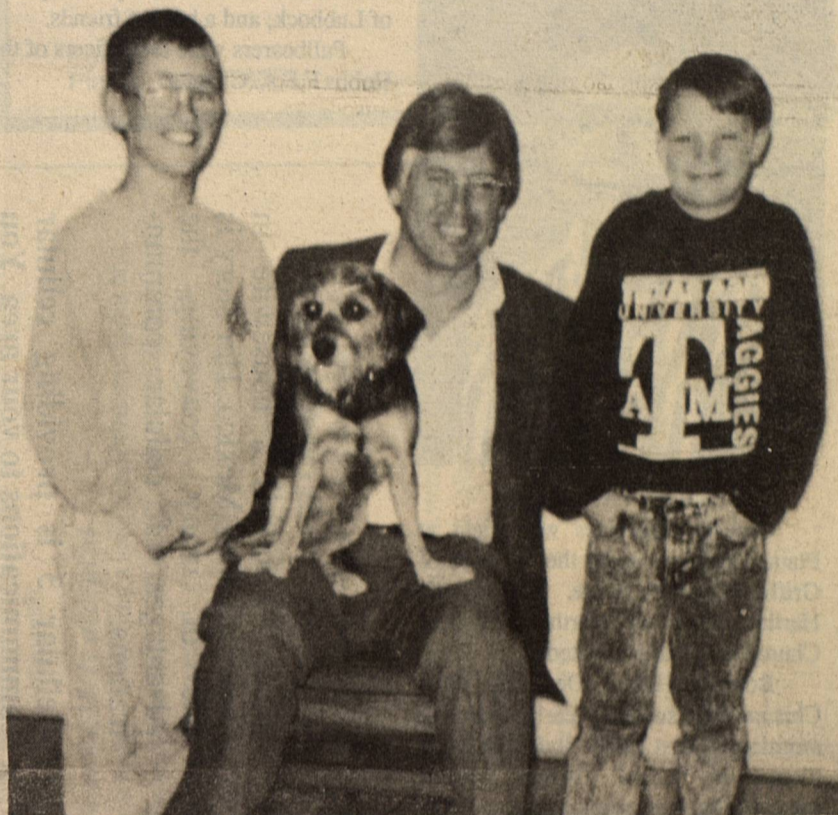
The Supreme Court of Texas was to hear oral arguments for the appeal in the case on Nov. 19.

The Robin Hood Forum is conducting research to determine the comparative impact of the legislation on the 50 districts with the least and most wealth and will mount an information campaign to dispel the myth that "taking money from the rich has helped the poor". Preliminary survey results underscore the fact that local property tax increases and lagging state funding overshadow any gains poor districts received from newly formed CEDs. Results of the findings will be released statewide in conjunction with a news conference in Austin as soon as final date is compiled.

"We cannot sit back and allow erosion of the quality education that we have worked so hard to deliver to students in our districts," said Glen Rose Superintendent Marion Czaja, who is chairperson of the Litigation Group that is spearheading the Robin Hood Forum.

"We must inform taxpayers of the serious implications of this legislation on the future of education in this state. We also will enlist the support of citizens and business leaders to push for a revitalized state commitment to public education," Czaja said.

Plans are underway for a meeting which will bring together members of the business community and education leaders from both wealthy and poor districts which are experiencing increased property taxes and no improvement in programs.

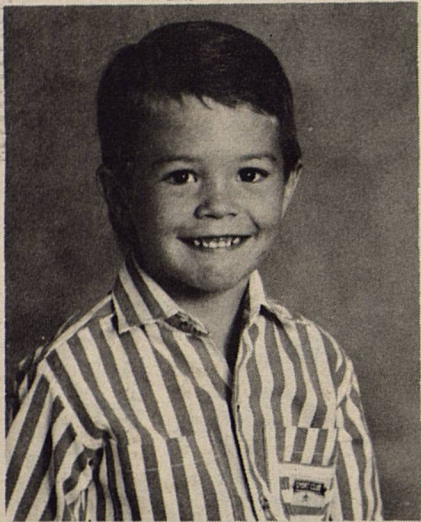

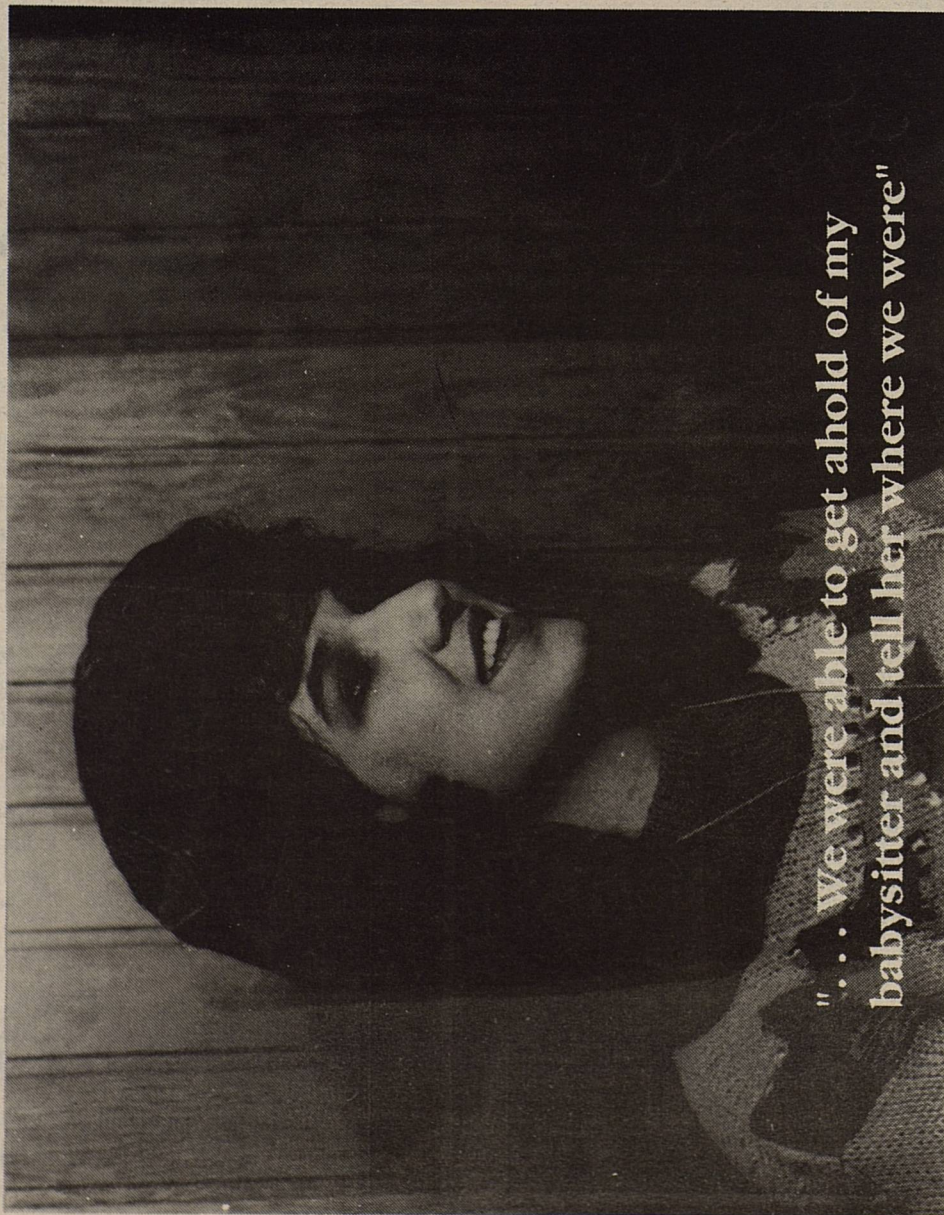
COWGIRLS ARE #1 and COWBOYS WILL ALWAYS BE OUR HEROES.

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Cowgirls Finish Season With 29 Wins, 11 Losses

The Cowgirls 1991 volleyball season came to an end last Saturday when they were defeated by Bronte in the finals of the Region I-A tournament at the Texas Tech University Recreational Center in Lubbock. They finish with a 29-11 record.

Getting off to a strong start in the first game the Cowgirls jumped to a 9-0 lead and dominated the net with eight blocks and nine kills. The Lady Longhorns put together seven points before the Cowgirl offense recorded a kill at gamepoint for 15-7 and a one game advantage. Following the three minutes between game rest, the momentum changed. Bronte rallied in game two with kills and dinks, capitalizing on Cowgirl errors to event the match with a 15-4 win. Momentum went back and forth in the final game with the Cowgirls leading at 3-1 and 7-6. Bronte pulled ahead 11-7 after four rotations and allowed the Cowgirls two more points before scoring the last four points of the match for a 15-9 victory. Librarian Attends Lubbock Workshop

A meeting was held for librarians and interested public at the Godeke Library in Lubbock, Saturday, Nov. 16. The workshop was given by Linda Coronado, Dean of Instruction, and Helen Holley, Reading Instructor, both of South Plains Junior College.

Latrell McDonnell, Plains Librarian attended this meeting. A special thought was given out at the end of the Comprehension Workshop: "Reading furnishes our mind only with materials of knowledge; it is thinking that makes what we read ours" by John Locke.

Winners Nominated By Kirk Williams, Former Ext. Agent

Doug Snyder and David Drucker, both pest control advisors with United Agri Products retail outlet in Sebastopol, Calif., are co-winners of the "Safe in The Saddle" award.

The two PCAs share the award for launching a safety training program - in both Spanish and English - for pesticide handlers and for helping to organize a collection and disposal day for all unwanted pesticides.

TSR Kirk Williams, who nominated Snyder and Drucker for the award, says the pesticide training will help overcome farm workers fears about handling AG chemicals and will keep growers in compliance with California's strict pesticide regulations.

"There is a real concern about ensuring farm worker safety," says Williams. "But keeping up with all of the regulations and paperwork required in California is a tremendous task. Doug and David recognized a service that farmers really needed."

"There's a lot more to running a dealership than just selling products. Making sure people know how to handle and use them is just as important," says Snyder. "Offering pesticide training is a tremendous service to growers."

Recently Snyder and Drucker coordinated a county-wide pesticide collection and disposal day. This gave growers a chance to get rid of unwanted, or unregistered pesticides, without having to assume the disposal costs, Drucker said.

Currently, California law classifies banned, unregistered or out-dated pesticides as hazardous waste and limits the amount of time growers can store the chemicals on their farms. But many growers have avoided disposing of the chemicals because of the many expensive permits required. However, a recent decision by the state legislature waives all permits and license requirements until Jan. 1, 1993.

For their exceptional contributions to environmental stewardship, Snyder and Drucker will receive a "Safe in The Saddle" plaque and additional publicity generated by ICL. Kirk Williams wins a \$100 American Express "Be My Guest" gift certificate for submitting the winning nomination.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR FLUID INJECTION WELL PERMIT

ARCO Oil and Gas Company has applied to the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to inject fluid into a formation which is productive of oil and gas.

The applicant proposes to inject fluid into the San Andres formation, Sable San Andres Unit, Well Number 23W. The proposed injection well is located five miles northwest of Plains in the Sable (San Andres) Field in Yoakum County. Fluid will be injected into strata at the subsurface depth interval from 5100 to 5350 feet. Injection fluids will consist of water and carbon dioxide.
