Deadline Nears For Submission Of Grant Applications

As a reminder to the producers in the Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District, the deadline for submitting written conservation plans to be eligible for grant monies is Tuesday, Dec. 10, 1991.

To be eligible, a producer must first have complied with all rules of the District. This includes but is not limited to well registration, irrigation systems registration, capping or plugging abandoned wells and filing permits for a new well drilled since January 1991.

Applications may be filed at the District office in the form of a written plan for the purchase of new or used irrigation systems, the changing of existing systems or any other appropriate purchase whereby a producer can prove the expenditure will conserve, preserve and/or protect our groundwater. This grant, approved and appropriated by the Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District's Board of Directors will be available after Jan. 2, 1992 for a maximum of \$3,000 or 50% of the expenditures for any one pro-

Anyone interested in being a part of this project may leave contributions in the collection boxes by Dec. 10.



Rena McElroy led in scoring with 12 points followed by Ashlee Winn with 7. Daphne Lowe and Ogla Ramirez each hit 6 followed by Rhonda Cowart and Amy Crutcher with 2 each. Ogla led in field goal percentage with 75%. Rena led in steals with 7 followed by Ashlee and Rhonda with 4 each. Rena also led in rebounds with 9. Daphne led in assists with 4 and Ashlee had 3.

Plains took their first trip of the year, traveling to Loop for Friday night's contest with the Loop Lady Longhorns, and gave the hosts a 42-41 setback in an exciting game to the end.

Rhonda Cowart made 4, Heather Bowlin made 2, and Brandy Lester rounded out the scoring with 1. Rena led in field goal percentage with 55% followed by Ogla and Heather with 50% each. Daphne led in free throw percentage with 80%, making 4 of 5. Rena, Daphne and Ogla tied for honors in rebounds with 7 each, followed by Ashlee with 6. Brandy led in assists with 4 and Daphne had 3. Brandy also led in steals with 4.


