Plains School District Acquires Integrated Learning System

Plains Independent School District recently jumped into the 21st Century when it purchased the Jostens Integrated Learning System. In September, a File Server and 20 IBM computers, each having an interactive headphone/microphone and mouse, were installed in the Elementary computer lab. Another File Server and 24 additional IBM computers, identical to those in the Elementary building, were installed in a lab shared by Middle School and High School. Additionally, four computer systems were placed in the High School Resource Center and two in the Elementary Resource Center which are connected to the Middle School/High School File Server and run Compton's Multimedia Encyclopedia, a computerized encyclopedia and word processor.

The File Server, also called the Master Station, is the computer in charge; it controls everything in the lab. The Student Stations are the computers where the students do the lessons. The Master Station and the Student Stations "talk" to each other over the Novell Network, which consists of special cables, connectors and software. There are two basic kinds of software in the Integrated Learning System: the Management System and the Jostens Learning Curriculum. The Management System software is stored on the Master Station's hard disk. The lessons are the Josten's Learning Curriculum. This software is stored on Compact Disc at the Master Station. The Master Station in the Middle School/High School lab is supervised by Tricia Allman and Clara Garza supervises the Master Station in the Elementary lab.

Students are scheduled into the computer lab at specific times and each student is assigned to a specific computer station for one or more specific lessons. Jostens Learning Corporation's curriculum consists of Mathematics, Reading, Research-Writing System, Physical Science, Life and Employability Skills, The Children's Writing and Publishing Center, and the IBM Primary Editor Plus programs. Jostens Learning Corporation's Read-

ing and Mathematics curriculum is designed to promote thinking skills, develop a positive attitude towards mathematics, reading, and learning, develop essential concepts and skills, and to promote positive work habits and on-task behavior that can permeate the child's entire learning life. Jostens' Research-Writing System will help the student develop fluency in transferring thoughts to written form, generate topics for writing, explore and refine ideas, find a purpose and an audience for writing.

All students were required to take the Jostens Basic Skills Inventory (BSI) before beginning any lessons. The BSI is a criterion-referenced test that determines for each student the appropriate starting points in the Jostens Learning Corporation Mathematics and Reading curricula. It took approximately 60 minutes of computer time for the BSI to determine the correct starting levels for Mathematics and Reading. The management system then automatically placed the students in the Reading and Mathematics curricula according to their BSI performance. Upon completion of testing, teachers were provided a placement summary report which lists each class member and his/her placements in the Jostens Learning Curricula.

FRUIT SALAD

1 sm box Jell-O vanilla Instant Pudding
1 can pineapple chunks
1 can sliced peaches
4 med bananas, sliced
1 can apricots, sliced

Empty pudding in mixing bowl; drain juices off the fruit and add to pudding. Mix well until lumps are gone. Add fruit and stir together. For extra color add maraschino cherries.

POTATO CASSEROLE

1 bag frozen chopped hash browns
1 8 oz carton sour cream
1 lb grated cheddar cheese - divided
1 can chopped green chilies
1 can cream of chicken soup
salt and pepper to taste
2 c crushed cornflakes
1 1/2 sticks of butter, melted
1/2 c chopped onions

Thaw frozen hash browns. After they are thawed, mix together soup, sour cream, green chilies, 1/2 of grated cheese and salt and pepper to taste. Mix together well. Saute onions, 3/4

stick of butter and spread over the bottom of a casserole dish evenly. Put hash brown mixture into dish and bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes. Take out of oven, sprinkle with remaining cheese and pour melted butter over the crushed cornflakes in separate bowl and mix well. Then put cornflake mixture on top of cheese and put back into oven until cheese is melted. (This is really a meal in one, just add a salad.)

LAYER DIP

1 lg can bean dip
1 carton sour cream
1/2 lb grated cheese
2 chopped tomatoes
2 mashed avocados with 1/2 c picante sauce mixed in it
2 T mayo
1/2 c sliced black olives

In a small dish, spread bean dip evenly, then avocados. Mix mayo in sour cream. Spread over avocados, then cheese and tomatoes. Sprinkle with black olives. Serve with nacho chips and extra salsa.

CARROT CAKE

Mix in order:
2 c sugar
2 c flour
2 t soda
2 t cinnamon
1 1/2 c Wesson Oil
4 eggs
pinch of salt

Mix well, then add 3 c carrots, shredded. Bake at 350 degrees in 13x9x2 or loaf pan.

ICING

Mix together:
2-3 oz pkg cream cheese
1 stick oleo
1 lb powdered sugar
1 t vanilla
1 c chopped pecans
Top while cake is warm.

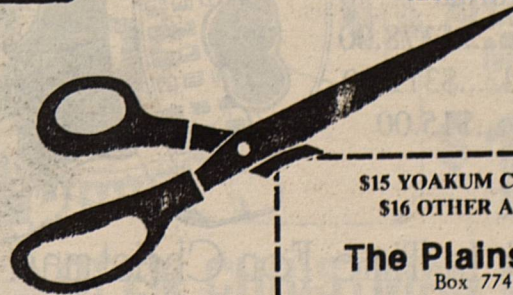

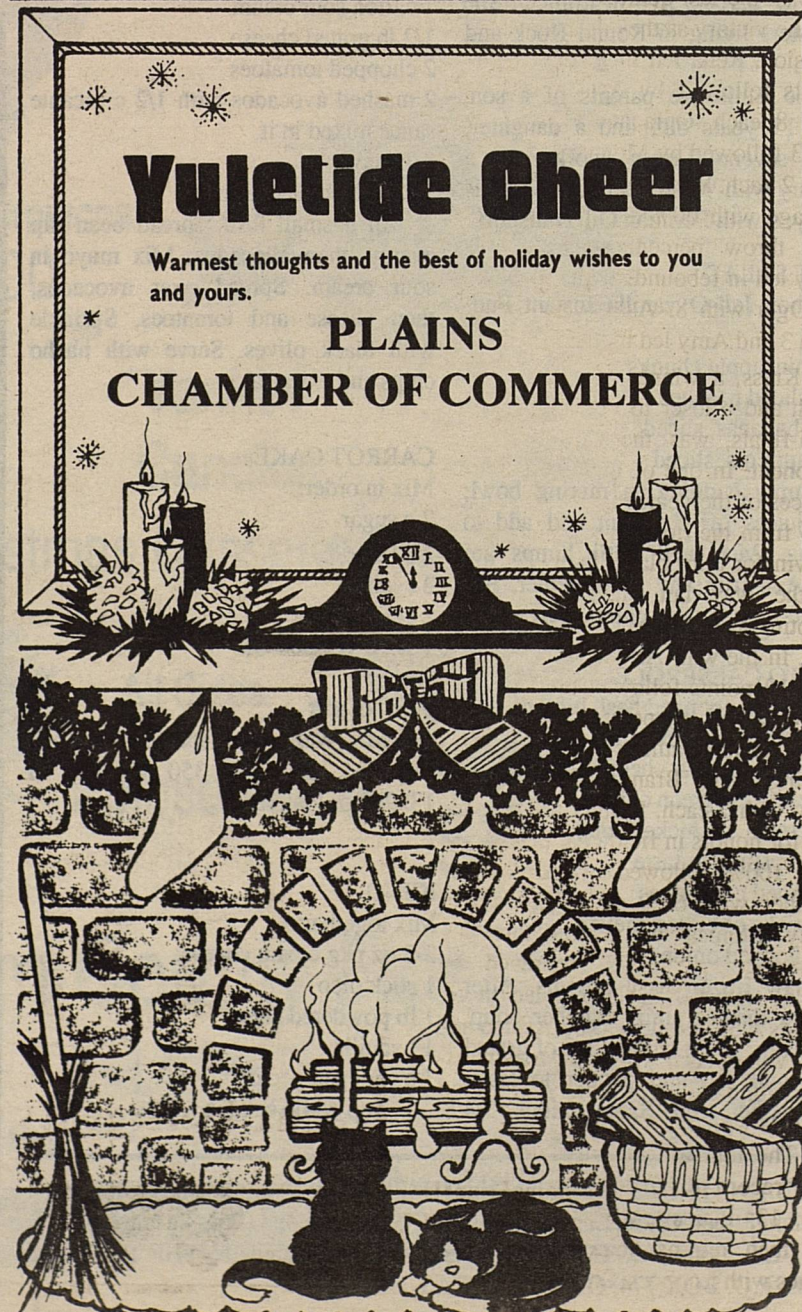

Cowgirls Win Third Place

Plains traveled to Lubbock this past weekend to take part in the 14th Annual Reese Air Force Base Classic Tournament. Placing third out of a field of eight teams, they defeated Kress JV, and Kress and dropped a close game to Amherst.

In the first game against Kress JV, Plains jumped out to a 16-2 first quarter lead and stretched it to 40-8 by halftime. All players got plenty of action in the lopsided 70-23 win, led by Ashlee Winn with 23 points. Rena McElroy had 11 points followed by Heather Bowlin with 10. Ogla Ramirez hit 9 points, Monica Flores and Amy Crutcher each had 7, and Rhonda Cowart hit 3 to round out the scoring. Monica led in field goal percentage with 75% followed by Rena and Ashlee with 57% and 53% respectively. Monica also led in free throw percentage with 100% and Ogla followed with 88%. Amy led in rebounds with 13 and Ogla had 9. Brandy Lester led in assists with 4 and Rhonda led in steals with 7 followed by Ashlee and Amy with 6 each.

The semi-finals found the Cowgirls against the Lady Bulldogs from Amherst. Plains jumped out to a narrow 15-14 lead and increased their lead to 26-22 entering the third quarter. There disaster struck as Plains went 0 for 10 from the field and suffered costly turnovers to allow Amherst back into the game. Even a 12-8 scoring edge in the last quarter could not pull out the victory as they dropped a 48-38 decision. Rena led in scoring with 12 points followed by Ashlee and Amy with 8 each. Ogla and Heather each had 3 followed by Monica and Rhonda with 2 each. Rena led in field goal percentage with 60% and Monica led in free throw percentage with 100%. Amy led in rebounds with 11 followed by Ogla with 8. Ashlee led in steals with 3 and Amy led in assists with 2.

Kress, a winner over Springlake-Earth and a loser to Petersburg in the semi-finals, was the Cowgirls' next opponent. In one of their best performances of the year, Plains shot a good 56% from the floor as a team in a 49-45 win for third place. Plains led most of the way but clutch free throw shooting at the end pulled out the victory. In the win, Ashlee led in scoring with 19 points followed by Ogla with 8. Rena hit 6 points followed by Rhonda and Heather with 5 each. Also scoring were Brandy, Monica, and Amy with 2 each. Brandy and Rhonda tied for honors in field goal percentage with 100% followed by Ashlee and Heather with 62% and 67% respectively. Monica led in free throwing percentage with 67% followed by Ashlee with 60%. Heather led in rebounds with 6 followed by Ashlee and Ogla with 4 each. Ogla was tops in assists with 6 and Ashlee had 3. Rena led in steals with 6.

The tournament raised the Cowgirls' record to 5-2 on the year. Friday, Dec. 13, Plains travels to Ropesville and then returns home Tuesday for games with Lubbock Christian.

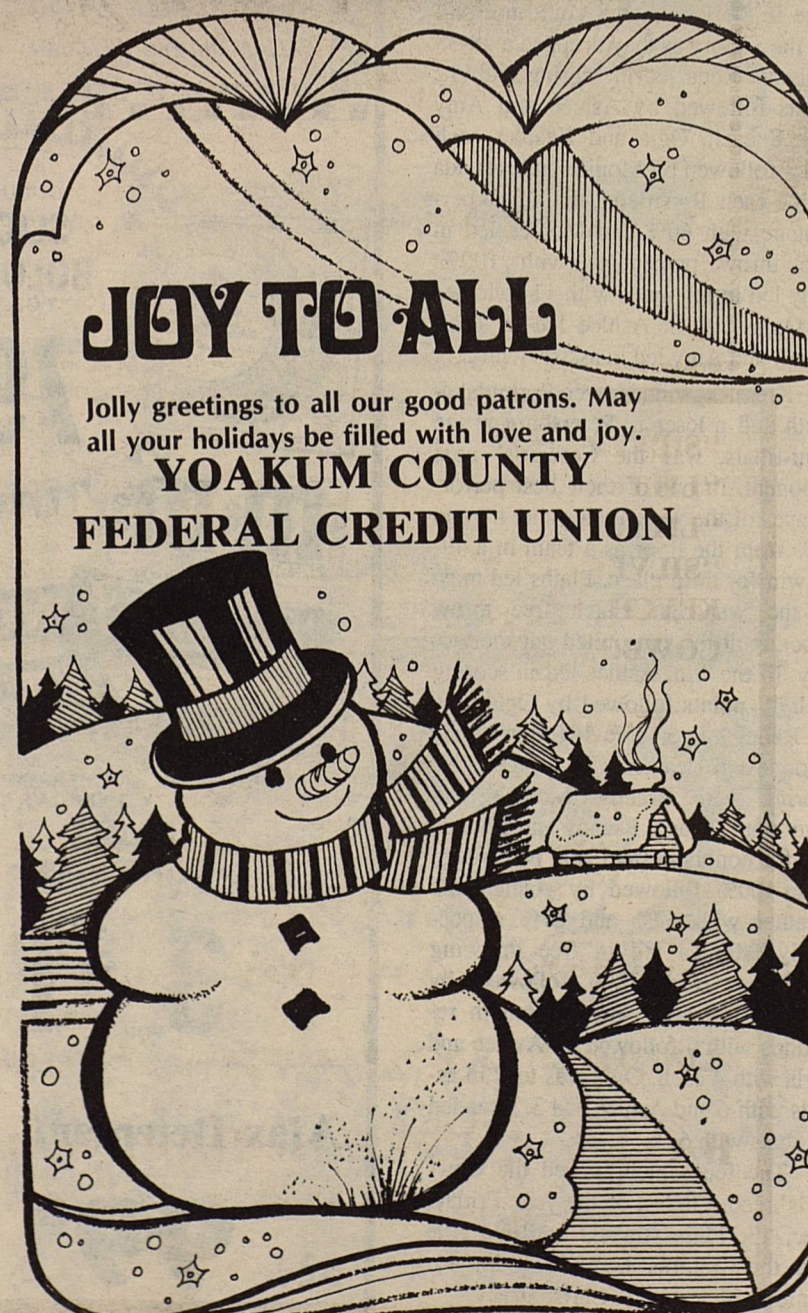
Wanda Ashburn To Retire

Plains I.S.D. offers congratulations on Wanda's retirement and our deepest appreciation for her years of service.



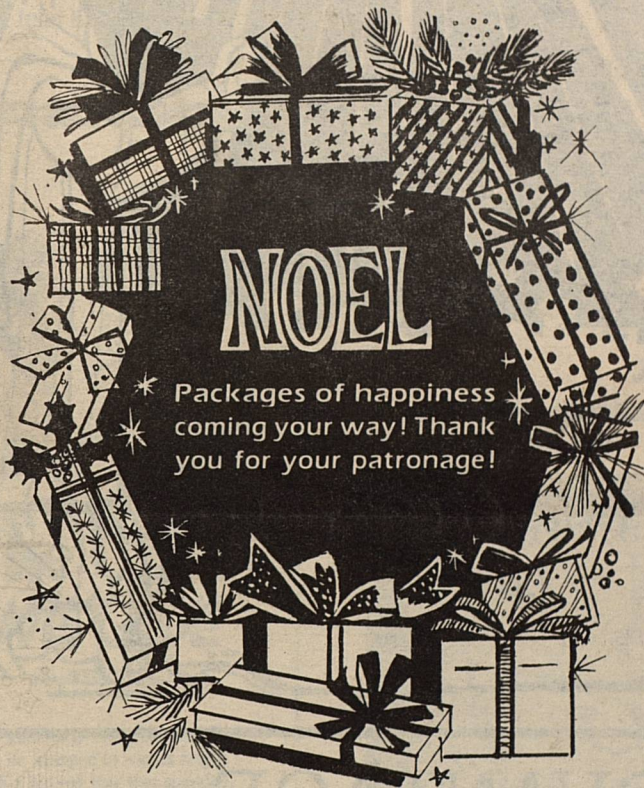

Seniors Attend 'Open House'

The seniors of Plains High School visited the Courthouse during their first annual open house.

The 29 students were accompanied by Govt. teacher Edwin Brink and PHS principal J.B. Wilson. Purpose of the visit was to acquaint the students with the various offices in the county government and the services that they provide.

The seniors were led on the tour by County Treasurer Toni Jones. While on the tour, they visited the jail, the County Judge Dallas Brewer and courtroom where they were addressed by the other department heads.

The tour was completed with refreshments and visiting between Courthouse staff and students.

Fourth Grade Students Learn About Conservation Programs

Fourth grade students in Plains Elementary School have been using a unit of study entitled The Major Rivers Water Education Program. The materials were provided by the Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District Office in Plains. It introduces fourth grade students to how we get and use water throughout Texas and how important it is for us to conserve water.

On Monday, Dec. 2, Gary Walker, Manager of the Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District Office visited the classroom of Dianne Wilson, fourth grade Social Studies teacher, to talk with the three classes. His program began with a slide presentation of water use and conservation in Texas. It explained what a Water Conservation District is and why it has been formed. The Sandy Land Water Conservation District in Yoakum County is one of the most recently formed in Texas.

Mr. Walker stressed the danger of abandoned wells and the need for plugging them. He told students to never go close to a well that appears to be uncapped or unplugged. One of the major goals of the Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District is to locate and plug or cap unused wells in Yoakum County. This will keep the wells from being a danger to humans and protect the water supply from pollutants.

He explained how the location chosen for drilling a waterwell must not infringe on a neighbor's water rights. The Water Conservation District encourages and teaches Yoakum County farmers and residents to conserve water because the Ogallala Aquifer, located beneath Yoakum County, is a non-recharging water supply. When this source of our water is depleted, there will be no more water available. The predicted life of the Ogallala Aquifer at current use is about 100 years.

Mr. Walker demonstrated water-quality testing - a free service provided by the Sandy Land Underground Water

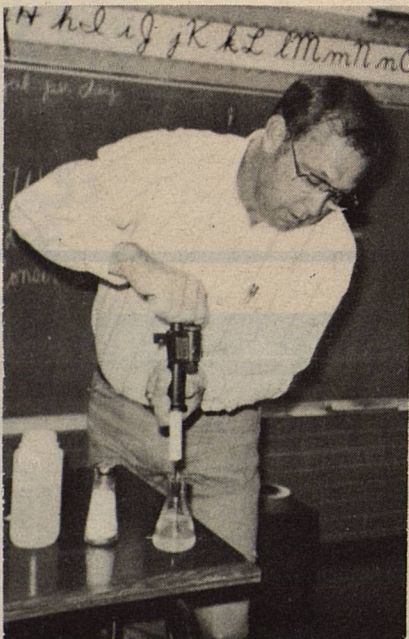
