## NEW FUNDS MADE AVAILABLE IN FARM HOME LOAN PROGRAM

An additional \$50 million has been made available to the Farm-ers Home Administration for farm housing loans, Mr. Homer P. Cole, the agency's Eastland county supervisor, announced to-

He said that new loan funds assure an adequate supply of this type of credit for eligib.le farm families during the balance of the fiscal year. Loans made so far this year plus those being processed had practically ex-hausted the funds previously available.

Farm housing loans are made throughout the rural areas of the United States. The loans provide farm families with an pportunity to aquire an adequate house and efficient service buildings.

Applications for farm housing loans may be made at the local office of the Farmers Home Administration, Mr. Cole said. The loans bear 4 percent interest and are repayable over periods up tc 33 years.

## **Peanut Support Price Set At** S221; Meetings Are Announced

The major dumand in Eastland County is for losss to construct and modernise farm houses, and most of the funds are used for new construction.

Improvements financed with the loans include the installation of central heating, and pressure water supply systems, the addition of bathrooms and the modernization of kitchens.

Many local farmers diso use the loans to adjust their service build-ings to the changing requirements of agriculture.

To be eligible a farmer must own a farm that will annually produce for sale or home use at least \$400 worth of commodities based on 1944 prices and be of sufficient value to adequately secure the loan. In addition, he must lack the resources needed to obtain credit elsewhere and

have the sufficient income to pay farm operating and family living expenses and meet payments when due on his debts.

last year's price to a new level of \$221 per ton.

"The 1960 price of \$201 was a gross figure since the Commodity Credit Corporation deducted \$9 per ton for storage and carrying costs and the figure of \$221 for this year will be net to growers so that actually we will realize a \$29 per ton increase, this year," Mr. Warren said. This amounts to 44¢ per bushel and is the largest increase for any commodity. Mr. Warren added that association officials have made several trips to Washington the past six weeks to confer with Department of Agriculture officials relative to the logi support level "With continued favorable

### Questiops & Answers

Q - Is there any chance for a woman to get into a VA hospital as a patient? I'm a World War II veteran but was never stationed outside the States.

A - Yes. Women veterans are eligible for VA hospitalization on the same basis as are men. For further information, get in touch with the nearest VA regional office or apply directly to a VA hospital.

Q - Has Congress passed any of the proposed legislation which would furnish special benefits for peacetime veterans?

A - There are several benefits already established for peacetime veterans. Any VA office can give you, ian perfeculars. How-ever, the proposed legislation you mean concenting educaion, home loane, etc., has not yet been passed by Congress.

Q - I am the unremarried widow of a World War II veteran jewelry, who never used his home loan guaranty benefits. Is it true, as I've been told, that I may be eli-

gible to apply for VA guaranty on a home loan?

A -- An unremarried widow of a World War II or Korean Conflict veteran is eligible for this benefit only if her husband died in service, or following separation from service, he died of a serviceconnected disability.


### **Fishing Contest Open For Texas Species Of Bass**


AUSTIN - White bass (sandies) fishermen of Texas may have a good opportunity this year to rank in top place in the 51st an-nual FIELD AND STREAM fishing contest. Texas waters are among the best in the nation for white bass fishing, according to Howard D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. In the contest, \$8300 in U.S.

bonds will be awarded for big fish caught and checked under the contest rules. The first prize will be for largemouth and spotted bass. However, there will be special prizes for white bass. Ed Bonn, fishery biologist at Lake Texoma, for years has been

attempting to get the white bass placed in the top list of prizes, but as of now the largest white bass will bring but a \$25 bond.

When a large fish is caught it must be weighed and measured in the presence of witnesses. Information is then sought on the type of equipment used and the manner in which the fish was caught.
