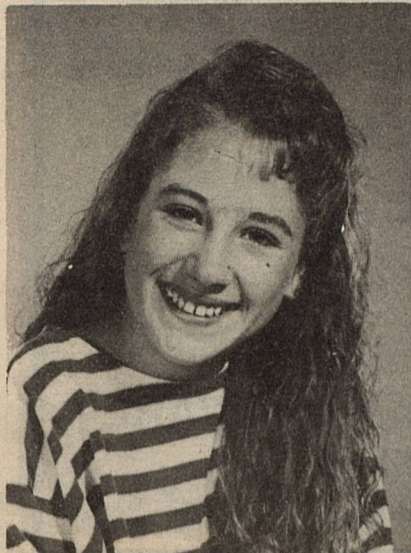

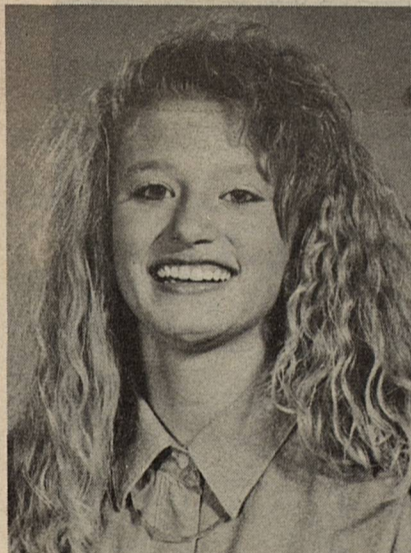

Fortieth Annual Yoakum County Junior Livestock Show will be held Feb. 6-8. Queen candidates are Kelly McGinty, Kaymie Jones, Stacey Jones and Julie Hancock.

Community Classes To Begin Soon

Community education classes are announced by Plains ISD. Courses to be offered are woodworking, oil painting, appleworks wordprocessing, calligraphy, exercises and computerized tax returns.

Persons may enroll in all classes by mail or by calling Jonnie Green or Brenda Canada at 456-7490. Fees must be paid the first night of classes. Fees have been assigned according to the cost of the instructor for a minimum enrollment.

Woodworking will be limited to 15 students. Fee is \$30. Classes will begin Jan. 30 in the high school shop and will continue 10 weeks. Robert Canon is instructor. Classes will be Thursday from 6 to 9 p.m.

Oil painting instruction will be given by Jimmie Bayer for a minimum of five and maximum of eight students. Classes will be held from 6 to 9 p.m. Tuesday evening for four weeks beginning Feb. 4. Fee is \$30.

Appleworks wordprocessing will be taught by Tricia Allman beginning Feb. 3. Sessions will be held in the junior high computer lab Monday evenings from 6 to 8 p.m. for a period of four weeks. Fee is \$15.

Calligraphy instruction will be given three weeks under the instruction of Mary Pettigrew. Beginning Feb. 3, the sessions will be from 5 to 7 p.m. on consecutive Mondays in the Resource Center. Fee is \$10.

Teresa Bell will be instructor for exercise classes. Sessions will be from 6 to 7 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday evenings for a period of eight weeks beginning Feb. 4. Fee is \$20.

Tricia Allman will be instructor for a course in computerized tax returns. To be held in the junior high computer lab, courses will be held Thursday evenings from 6 to 8 p.m. and will continue for three weeks. Fee is \$15.

Weigh-in for the 40th Annual Yoakum County Junior Livestock Show will begin with the weighing of swine from 9 a.m. until noon Thursday, Feb. 6. Lambs will be weighed from 1 to 3 p.m. with steers to follow.

Judging of swine classes will start at 8 a.m. Friday to be followed by lamb judging at 1 p.m. Rabbit check-in is scheduled for 4 p.m. with judging at 5 p.m.

Saturday's activities begin at 9 a.m. with the judging of heifer classes. Steer judging will follow immediately.

The Buyer's Luncheon will be held from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. in the school cafeteria and the awards presentation set for 1 p.m. The 1992 Show Queen will be recognized at this time. Premium sale is scheduled to start at 1:20 p.m.

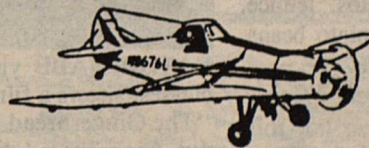

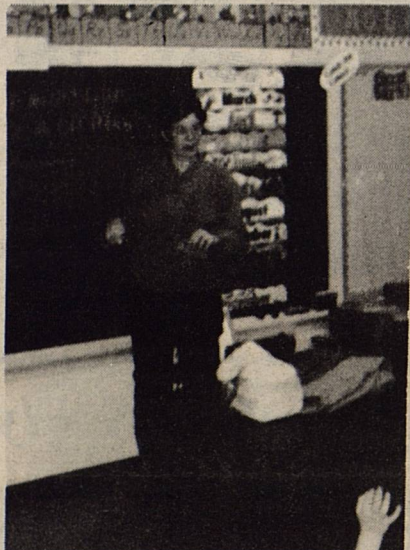

How Can Parents Help?

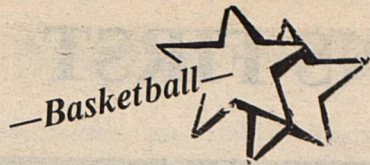
School, of course, is the major source of learning for your child. However, research has found that what parents do to help their children learn is one of the most important factors in a child's academic success. Parents are their children's first and most influential teachers and have the opportunity to make an enormous difference in how much and how well their children learn.

Children's chances for academic success can be improved if parents follow a few simple tips.

1. Read, talk and listen to your children. Discuss school events and talk about school problems as well as successes. Conversation is important.
2. Encourage reading. Read to them and let them read to you. Ask questions that require thinking.
3. Teach your children to listen. Good listeners usually become successful readers.
4. Be a role model. Encourage your children to be like others they admire.
5. Be positive.
6. Emphasize the importance of education, hard work and responsibility through your actions and comments.
7. Praise your children often. Let them hear you tell others of their successes.
8. Treat school and homework as if they are important jobs your children are doing.
9. Monitor television programs and time. Show preference for educational channels and good children's programs.
10. Attend parent-teacher conferences and communicate often with the teacher. Don't wait until there is a problem. Visit school for positive reasons.
11. See that your children get plenty of sleep and have a good breakfast each morning.
12. Provide a quiet place for homework and schedule time for it daily.

Holding a 9-4 lead the first quarter, Plains extended their lead to 24-15 by half and a 35-23 lead entering the last stanza. In the last period, Plains built a 14 point lead in the closing minutes, but saw their lead cut to 4 in the last minute. Still the Cowgirls held on to even their district record to 1-1 and a three way tie for second place in District 6A.

Daphne Lowe led in scoring with 19 points followed by Rena McElroy with 13 and Ashlee Winn with 10. Ogla Ramirez and Rhonda Cowart each hit 2 points to round out the scoring. Daphne led in field goal percentage with an excellent 78% followed by Rena with 50%. Daphne also led in free throw percentage with 67%. 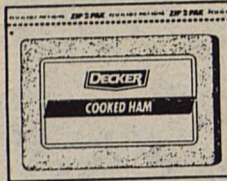

Superintendent Pete Simmons Is Guest Speaker At Lions

Superintendent Pete Simmons and members of the Robin Hood Forum presented a program on Plains schools and the status of school financing for members and guests of Plains Lions Club Thursday.

Plains students continue to post strong test scores, he noted. Enrollment has remained constant and "about the same budget maintained as last year," he said, "in spite of the new financing method.

Simmons reported that he and school board chairman Jerry Parrish and local members of the Robin Hood Forum, Johnnie Fitzgerald, Carolyn Culwell, Gayle Craft, Jack Cobb and David Guetersloh attended a Robin Hood Forum meeting in Austin last week. The Forum, he explained, is a group of more than 50 property rich districts that are challenging the new law. The meeting was attended by outstanding business leaders, school administrators and school board members, he said.

"The Forum group believes the present financing law where property values are pooled and taxed by CEDs is unconstitutional. They believe that poor schools should be brought up to the level of rich schools instead of bringing rich schools down as is done under the present law. They believe poor schools have not been helped to any extent under the present law while schools like Plains have been hurt with much higher taxes," said Simmons.

Simmons added, "The Forum group believes that ultimately school financing will see poor schools receiving additional money through state-wide efforts such as increased sales tax or a personal and/or corporate income tax."

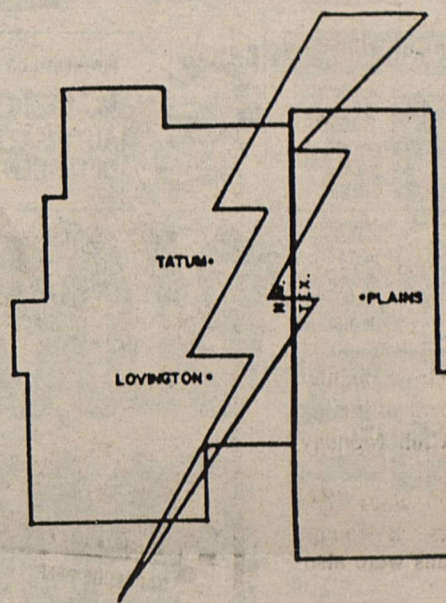
