Soil, Water Conservation Announces Contest Winners

Youngsters from Plains and Denver City participated in the Poster and Essay Contest sponsored annually by Yoakum County Soil and Water Conservation District. Chosen as winners were Betsy Blair, Jo Lena Powell and Garrick Engle for their essays promoting soil and water conservation. The three winning essays will now be judged in regional competition.

Forty-three essays were considered by judges Beverly and Darrel Lowrey and SWCD Chairman L.J. Sanders. Dr. Mary Keller, assistant superintendent of Denver City High School, and Wanda Smith, Yoakum County Tax Assessor/Collector made the final selection.

Competing in the poster contest were 21 students from Linda Risley's class in Denver City's Intermediate Building and 58 posters by Joyce Pierce's classes in Plains Junior High. Judges were Gary Walker, Sandy Land Water District; Kerry Weinheimer, acting District Conservationist; Eileen Fillipp of Yoakum County Art Associ-

ation; David Turnbough, president of Sandy Land Water District; Junior Cardenas, LaFamilia Restaurant; and Bob White, vice chairman of Yoakum

Soil and Water Conservation District. Winners were Alison Risley of Denver City, Byron Covarrubias and Kipp Blount, both of Plains. Their posters will be forwarded to regional.

Teachers Kim Mock of Denver City and Willie Mae Engle of Plains are participating in the SWCD's tree offer whereby students will purchase trees with planting instructions and thereby help the environment around their homes and communities. The pines will be sold to the youngsters at below cost to encourage their assuming responsibility for the environment.

Emergency Course Offered At SPC

A short course, "First Responder: Emergency Response to Hazardous Spills/Occurrences," is scheduled Feb. 27 and March 4 at South Plains College.

Instructor will be Capt. Alan Breazeale with the Lubbock Fire Department. Each four-hour course will meet from 8 a.m. to noon, 1 to 5 p.m. and 6 to 10 p.m. both days. Cost is \$10 per person.

Deadline to sign up is noon Feb. 26 for the February class and noon March 3 for the March class.

The four-hour course is open to law enforcement and fire officials and other first responders to hazardous spills and occurrences. "The course is designed to enable fire and emergency response personnel to reduce the threat to their community created by hazardous materials emergencies," noted George Lawless, associate professor and coordinator of SPC's two-year program in law enforcement.

"Students will learn the basics needed to recognize the presence of hazardous materials and their potential problems to the community and to identify the associated threatening characteristics of specific hazardous materials," said Lawless.

The course meets the requirements of OSHA's Hazardous Waste Operations and Emergency Response Final Rule (29 CFR 1910.120).

Tillage Workshop To Be Held Feb. 18

A Conservation Tillage Workshop will be held at the Plains School Cafeteria, Feb. 18 at 6:30 p.m. The workshop will be sponsored by the Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District, Soil Conservation Service, Yoakum County Extension Service, and Monsanto. A free barbeque brisket meal will be provided by Monsanto.

Speakers will include Robert Marek, Monsanto Sales Representative; Gary Walker, manager of the Sandy Land Underground Water District; and Dr. Wayne Keeling, Systems Agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Research Station in Lubbock. Also speaking will be three area farmers which will give a brief overview of their conservation tillage operations.

Farm producers attending can pick up two CEU's through the Extension Service.

Mayor, Two Councilmen To Be Elected May 2

During the regular council meeting held on Monday, Feb. 10, Mayor T.J. Miller called for a general election to be held on May 2, 1992.

The purpose of this election will be to elect a mayor and two (2) council members. Those with expiring terms include Mayor Miller and Councilmen Kent Welch and Kevin Guetersloh.

Candidate filing for these positions will begin Feb. 17 and will close at 5 p.m. on March 18. Applications for filing can be picked up at the City Hall at 601 11th Street during regular working hours.

This year, write-in candidates must file a "declaration of write-in

candidacy" by 5 p.m. on the 30th day before the election (April 2, 1992) in order for votes cast for a write-in candidate to be valid.

Absentee voting by personal appearance will be conducted April 13 through April 28, 1992. Mail-in-ballot applications will be accepted from March 3 through April 24, 1992. Polls will be open on election day from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Plains City Hall.

In other action, the Council passed a resolution supporting the Yoakum County Teen Court and approved requested funding to assist in implementing this worthwhile project.

The Cowgirls went cold from the floor in the second half, connecting on 6 of 27 from the field, but kept themselves in the game with good defense and great free throw shooting.
