## Deadline Is Near To Have Your Auto Safety Inspection

April 15, 1961, is the deadline for displaying the 1961 Motor Vehicle Inspection Stickers.

It has been observed that a large percentage of vehicles in Eastland County have not been inspected, according to Carl E. Boushock, Motor Vehicle Inspection Administrator of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Vehicles operating on public streets and highways after April 15, 1961, and not displaying the 1961 Inspection Sticker will be in violation of the state law, Boushock announced.

## Cotton And Peanut Allotment Method Announced By ASC

Area cotton and peanut farmers whose acreage has been released in 1959 and 1960 must plant acreage in 1961 or lose their allotment due to a recent change in preserving a history of cotton and peanut acreage, according to a report by Emmett E. Powell, manager of the Eastland County Agriculture and Stabilization office.

At least 75% of the allotment must have been planted one year within the past three years. Mr. Powell said that if the allotment is not going to be planted the acreage should be released so that someone may use it and at the same time the farm receive credit for the acreage.

Applications are now being accepted from producers who wish more acreage. Anyone who has a question regarding the allotment on his farm may contact the County Office so that details can be explained, it was stated.

At least 75% of the allotment must have been planted one year within the past three years. Mr. Powell said that if the allotment is not going to be planted the acreage should be released so that someone may use it and at the same time the farm receive credit for the acreage.

Applications are now being accepted from producers who wish more acreage. Anyone who has a question regarding the allotment on his farm may contact the County Office so that details can be explained, it was stated.

At least 75% of the allotment must have been planted one year within the past three years. Mr. Powell said that if the allotment is not going to be planted the acreage should be released so that someone may use it and at the same time the farm receive credit for the acreage.

## Texas Exchanges Quail For Chicks With Nebraska

AUSTIN — Greater prairie chickens from Nebraska will be given an opportunity to get a foothold in Texas, according to H. D. Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. Twenty of these birds were flown into Texas last week and released on the Flat Top Ranch, southwest of Fort Worth.

More of these birds will also be brought in as they are trapped in Nebraska, according to the secretary. Texas is giving scaled quail in exchange for the prairie chickens. These quail are being trapped in the Trans-Pecos country, where there is an abundance of birds and a short supply of feed.

On another exchange, more than 100 Rio Grande wild turkeys from the King Ranch have been shipped to Hawaii. This also is

on an exchange basis, and will give the newest state a start of Texas propagated birds.

In recent months there has been an import of stripers from California, which were planted in Kemp Lake near Wichita Falls. And on the Black Gap area in the Big Bend, reports are that the Big Horn sheep imported from Arizona during the past two years are doing really well in the 600 predator-proof enclosure.

## File Tax Return If Your Income Was \$400 In 1960

Individuals with self-employment income of \$400 or more during 1960 must file an income tax return and pay a self-employment tax.

According to Arthur E. Fogle, Jr., administrative officer, of Internal Revenue Service, Abilene a self-employment tax must be paid by persons who have a business as a sole proprietor, a member of a partnership, or who render service as independent contractors.

Under Texas community property laws and for self-employment tax purposes, all the gross income and related deductions are usually considered gross income and deductions of the husband.

The Internal Revenue Service representative added: "In cases where the wife actually exercises substantially all the management and control of the business, all the gross income and related deducts are treated as belonging to the wife."

Unless a wife has her own business, or is an active member of a partnership, she is not considered a self-employed person by Uncle Sam.

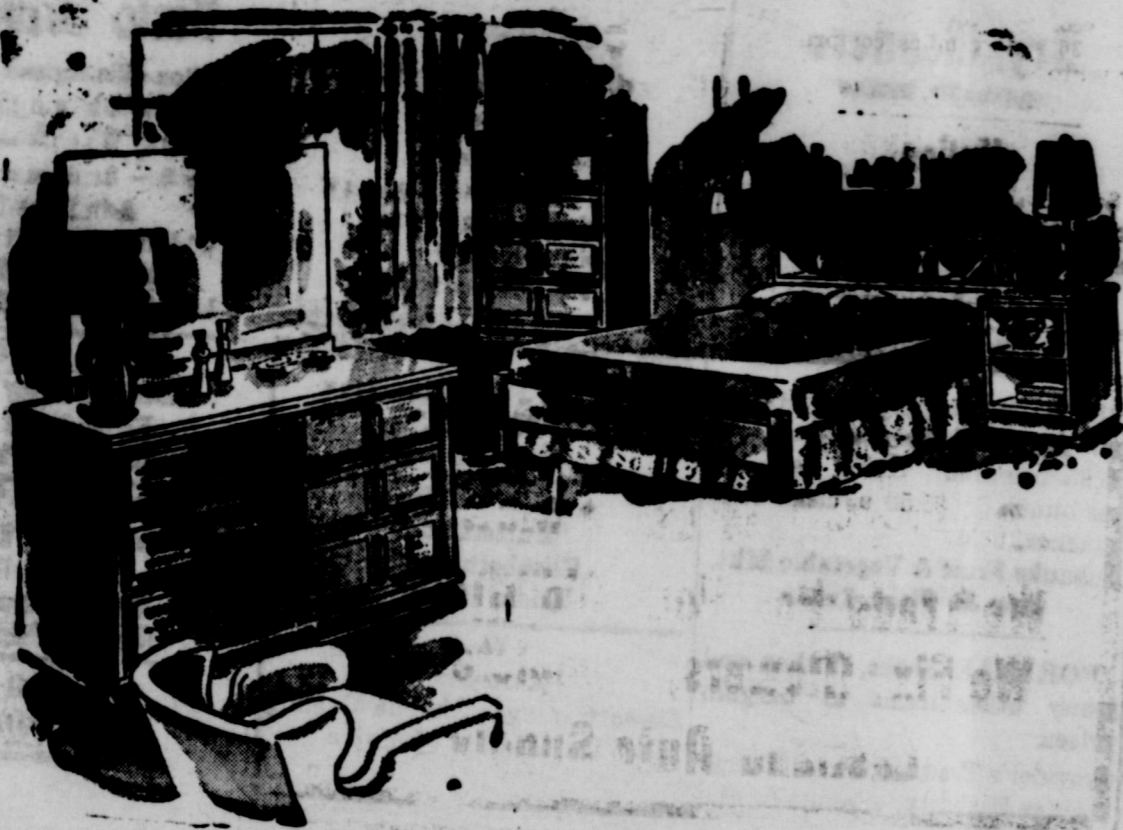

## TWO NEW OIL PRODUCERS CAUSE EXCITEMENT FOR RISING STAR

Two oil wells that were deepened recently in the Marble Falls south and east of Rising Star, causing such an unexpected success to the operators that a considerable amount of leasing activity has been stirred in the area, according to information here. Several new wells are projected for immediate drilling.

The Joyce Interests Bond No. 1 was deepened some three feet on Friday, Feb. 21, causing such a strong flow of oil that a Halliburton unit was called from Cisco to close it in. The operators were surprised as the original completion depth of about 2,900 feet had not produced any results.

Earlier, the same operators Oscar White located half a mile south of the Bond No. 1 gushed oil in such surprising quantities

after being deepened about three and a half feet into the Marble Falls that some eight hours were required before it could be shut in and tubing run.

Included among new operators moving into the area is L. A. Warren, a former Ciscoan who now resides in Abilene. Mr. Warren drilled the wells which set off the Cross Plains and southern Callahan county development ten years ago. He and his associates have taken a lease on an 80-acre tract from County Commissioner J. L. (Buck) Collins. New leases in the vicinity of the White have also been acquired by the four Joyce brothers.

Observers stated there was a definite possibility of extensive oil and gas development near the eastern and southern limits of Rising Star.

## Grain Survey Is Planned By ASC Office In County

Survey data on the amount of corn or grain sorghum produced on farms in Eastland County during 1959 and 1960 will be collected by the Eastland County ASC office beginning Monday, March 6, according to an announcement by Emmett E. Powell, manager.

Due to pending legislation in the Congress of the United States concerning feed grains it is mandatory that a survey be made in all major feed grain producing counties in the country, Mr. Powell said.

Eastland County has been classified as a major feed grain producing county. Feed grains shall include only field corn and grain sorghum which was harvested by combining or threshing, the manager stated.

It is important that this data be supplied each farmer, Mr. Powell said. "The data will be used to establish base acreages for each feed grain producing farm in the county as a basis for determining price support eligibility and cash payment rates for producers who desire to participate," he added.
