## Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by extreme freezing weather conditions, which occurred between October 1, 1991, and December 31, 1991 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Plains, FmHA County Supervisor Trueman Murdoch said today

Yoakum County is one of five in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the freeze.

Mr. Murdoch said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan
needed to continue in business or $\$ 500,000$, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.
"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," the supervisor said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.
"Applications for loan under this emergency designation will be accepted until December 10, 1992 but farmers should apply as soon as possi-
ble. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr Murdoch said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Plains is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.
