
Volleyball Clinic Slated June 1-5






CHAD GUETERSLOH Chad Guetersloh To Graduate

Mrs. Scott died Wednesday, April 22 in Santa Rosa Hospital North after a long illness. TE



An arrangement of peach and white silk flowers in a peach vase adorned the party table. Cake, mints and punch were served by Mrs. Culwell and Brenda Canada.



When To Call An Ambulance **Tips Given By Plains EMS**

guidelines to aid persons in knowing when to call an ambulance.

ered are:

* Is the victim's condition lifethreatening?

* Could the victim's condition worsen and become life-threatening on the way to the hospital?

* Could moving the victim cause further injury?

* Does the victim need the skills or equipment of paramedics or emergency medical technicians?

* Would distance or traffic conditions cause a delay in getting the victim to the hospital?

If the answers to any of these questions is "yes" or if one is unsure, it's best to call an ambulance. This is true even though you can sometimes get to the hospital faster by driving than by calling an ambulance, state EMS aides.

Paramedics and emergency medical technicians communicate with the physician in the emergency department by radio. They are trained to begin

medical treatment on the way to the hospital. This prevents any delay that could occur if the patient is driven to the emergency department. Ambulance






