### Dr. William J. Bryan Shares Tips On Pitching

Young baseball players aspiring to be the next Nolan Ryan should worry less about arm strength and more about pitching technique, says an orthopedic surgeon and sports medicine specialist at the Methodist Hospital.

"Teenagers think if they get stronger with weight training, they can throw harder," Says Dr. William J, Bryan, who is also a team physician for the Houston Astros. "That's not true at all. Arm strength has nothing to do with being able to pitch well. If that were true, Arnold Schwarzenegger would be Nolan Ryan.

"Pitching is kind of like golf,"
Bryan continues. "You don't hit the
ball farther because you're stronger,
you hit it farther because your mechanics are better."

Ironically, Bryan says, pitchers usually have the weakest arms and the strongest legs on major-league teams.

He says parents of young players should encourage their kids to learn the fundamentals and forget about throwing fast. Trying to throw beyond one's ability is a frequent cause of injury and soreness in pitchers, especially adolescents.

"It's rare for a seven or eight year old to hurt himself by throwing too hard because kids that age can't throw very fast anyway, and Little League regulations prohibit throwing too frequently," says Bryan. "But when a kid turns 13 or 14 and is able to throw faster, there's a good chance of injury."

Bryan encourages parents to use

instructional videotapes to teach kids proper pitching techniques. Some of those techniques include:

\*Having a definite pause at the "gathering point" of the pitch, when leg is up, to gain momentum for the delivery;

\*Fully extending the arm behind the back before delivering the pitch;

\*Keeping the body "closed" and using the entire body, not the arm, to throw the pitch:

\*Keeping the chin and the shoulder opposite the pitching arm "tucked in'; \*Landing smoothly, not bouncing, after delivering the pitch.

For players who ignore the warnings and injure themselves trying to throw too hard, Bryan says rest is the best therapy.


The following five steps should be followed to protect your househol applicances:

- Unplug and discontinue operation of unprotected equipment during a electrical storm or severe windstorm.
- Buplug all non-essential equipment when not in use or when you leave for a vacation.


#### Shower To Fete **Engaged Couple**


Miss Melissa Welch, bride-elect of Jeff Roper, was complimented with a bridal coffee Saturday morning in the home of Mrs. Jim Warren.


