# LETTER TO HOUSEHOLDS (Multi-Child Meals) NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM/SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM 

## Dear Parent or Guardian:

The Plains Independent School District takes part in the National School Lunch Program/Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day and all Plains I.S.D. students receive free meals from our cafeteria, however, Plains I.S.D. may be reimbursed for meals served to children from families who qualify under the stated guidelines.

In order to claim reimbursement for these meals, a completed application form must be on file for each ELIGIBLE child. If your child/children would qualify for free or reduced price meals, please complete the application form and return it to the school as soon as possible.

## HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult houschold nember. If you are apolving for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamo or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult houschold menber and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you so send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Mearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:

Reporting chanqes: If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than $\$ 50$ per month or $\$ 600$ per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stemps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: school officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Reapolication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in houschold size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapoed: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of whandicappedm will be served, provided a physician has subnitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substizute.
