







1992 Property Tax Rates in PLAINS ISD

This notice concerns 1992 property tax rates for PLAINS ISD. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.







LETTER TO HOUSEHOLDS (Multi-Child Meals) NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM/SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM

Dear Parent or Guardian:

The Plains Independent School District takes part in the National School Lunch Program/Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day and all Plains I.S.D. students receive free meals from our cafeteria, however, Plains I.S.D. may be reimbursed for meals served to children from families who qualify under the stated guidelines.

In order to claim reimbursement for these meals, a completed application form must be on file for each ELIGIBLE child. If your child/children would qualify for free or reduced price meals, please complete the application form and return it to the school as soon as possible.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying H for, the application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

<u>Verification</u>: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Mearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:

<u>Reporting Changes</u>: If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

<u>Confidentiality</u>: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

<u>Reapplication</u>: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

<u>Handicapped</u>: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.






held the first evening in Houston.
