House Approves Combest Plan For Speeding FmHA Loans

tives late Tuesday evening approved Congressman Larry Combest's approach to shortening and localizing Administration Home (FmHA) loan approval time for farmer-borrowers. Combest's provisions are contained in H.R. 4906, "The Agricultural Credit Improvement Act," requiring that if FmHA does not act on loan applications within 14 days, local banks are free to make the loan.

Under the Certified Lender's Program, the government would guarantee 80 percent of the loan. Currently, the FmHA loan application process suffers tremendous delays from the agency's duplicative review of paperwork from the local level.

"In farming, timing is critical," said Combest. "Farmers have told me horror stories about waiting months while FmHA decides on their loan. I know this can be done more efficiently closer to home. The bankers and farm-

The U.S. House of Representa- ers are neighbors, they talk at the local coffee shop every morning. These bankers know the farmer's personal financial and lending situation better than any government agency possibly

> If the measure is approved in the Senate, local banks certified by the Secretary of Agriculture would be allowed to use Combest's FmHA loan processing plan. Participating lending institutions will be permitted to make FmHA loans based on a farmer's creditworthiness and lending regulations.

> "A lot of farmers out there depend on knowing the financial score promptly so that they can adjust their management plans'" said Combest. "While FmHA will still get first shot at the loan process, my streamlining provisions requires they focus quickly on the farmer's application. I will continue to actively pursue improvements in the FmHA lending Program."

Statewide School Budgets Compared To Plains ISD

fall of school budget cuts, trustees adopted the largest spending increase in history - \$1.8 billion more. Classroom teachers received one dollar in six of the additional spending.

Spending was \$1.4 billion more than budgeted revenue, and trustees increased school taxes by a billion dollars. However, when the beginning balance of \$4.2 billion is included, resources far outpaced expenditures.

The figures come from latest issue of Bench Marks 1991-92 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

An average of \$3,979 per student for current operations was budgeted last year plus \$337 for repayment of debt and \$617 per student for capital

Plains ISD's budget provided \$7401.95 per student for current operations, \$.00 for debt service, and \$586.36 per student for capital outlay based on the 528 students enrolled in October 1991.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by Plains ISD in October 1992 was \$30,952 plus supplements for the career ladder. The average for administrators was \$47,026 and \$37,673 for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.)

Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$3,236 per student, as compared to \$5,494.41 in Plains ISD. Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 11.5 students in Plains ISD while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was

School districts and county education districts imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.274 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 98.8% of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.259 (\$1.274 times 98.8%) statewide. Locally, the Plains ISD imposed a rate of \$1.020 including \$.782 by the county. Property was appraised at 102.7 percent of its market value making the true rate \$1.047 per \$100 of market value (selling price).

Despite widespread reports last market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other

> The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Plains ISD would have been \$816. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$602. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$998 and \$793 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

> Last year Plains ISD's revenue from the property tax increased by 24.1 percent for 1991-92 as compared to a 12.0 percent increase statewide.

> Local property taxes plus state aid totaled \$7,846 per student in Plains ISD as compared to \$3,969 statewide.

> The state and the county education districts will fund the total cost of the foundation program, which averaged \$2,784 per student last year and was \$4,192 in Plains ISD. Local school districts can levy property taxes to enrich the foundation program. Enrichment last year averaged \$831 per pupil to which the state added an average of \$354 per student to guarantee the tax yield in property-poor districts. Enrichment by the Plains ISD was \$3,654; the state guarantee added

> For the coming school year, there will be \$1.3 billion more for 1992-93 school budgets without any tax increase by school trustees other than the 10-cent increase by county education districts. That will consist of \$627 million from the county tax plus \$684 million more state aid already appropriated by the legislature, the report concludes.

MONEY TALK

Kay Bailey Hutchison Texas State Treasurer

Editor's Note: Texas State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison addresses various issues related to personal finance and state government. However, these views are not intended to replace the advice of reputable financial advisers or other professional counselors.

Q. I have been married for five years and never officially changed my name. I work full-time and pay taxes under my maiden name but my social security number lists my married name. Am I getting social security credit for the payments I am making?

A. A primary function of the Social Security Administration is to maintain a history of your earnings and keep a record of the social security taxes you have paid. They recommend that the name you list on your W-2 form be the same name you have on your social security card. Problems can result if there is a discrepancy. For example, the Internal Revenue Service may delay the processing of your income tax return because the name under which you pay employment taxes does not match the name on your social security account.

To determine if you are receiving credit for your social security tax payments call the Social Security

Administration at 1-800-772-1213. They will send you a form to complete which authorizes the release of a personal earnings and benefits estimate statement. This statement will show your earnings from the time you started working as well as the amount of social security tax that has been paid on your behalf. It also will include a projection of your social security benefits based on your current earnings. To qualify for social security retirement benefits you must work 40 quarters or 10 years and pay social security tax.

In order to qualify for social security you must have worked a minimum of 40 quarters, which is equal to ten years, and paid social security tax throughout that period. Your benefits upon retirement are based on the number of quarters you contributed and the amount of social security tax you paid. As you can see, it is extremely important that you receive all the credit to which you are entitled. This will assure that you qualify for benefits and will determine the level of your payment. Retirement benefits can range from \$1 to \$1,088 per month.

This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.
