

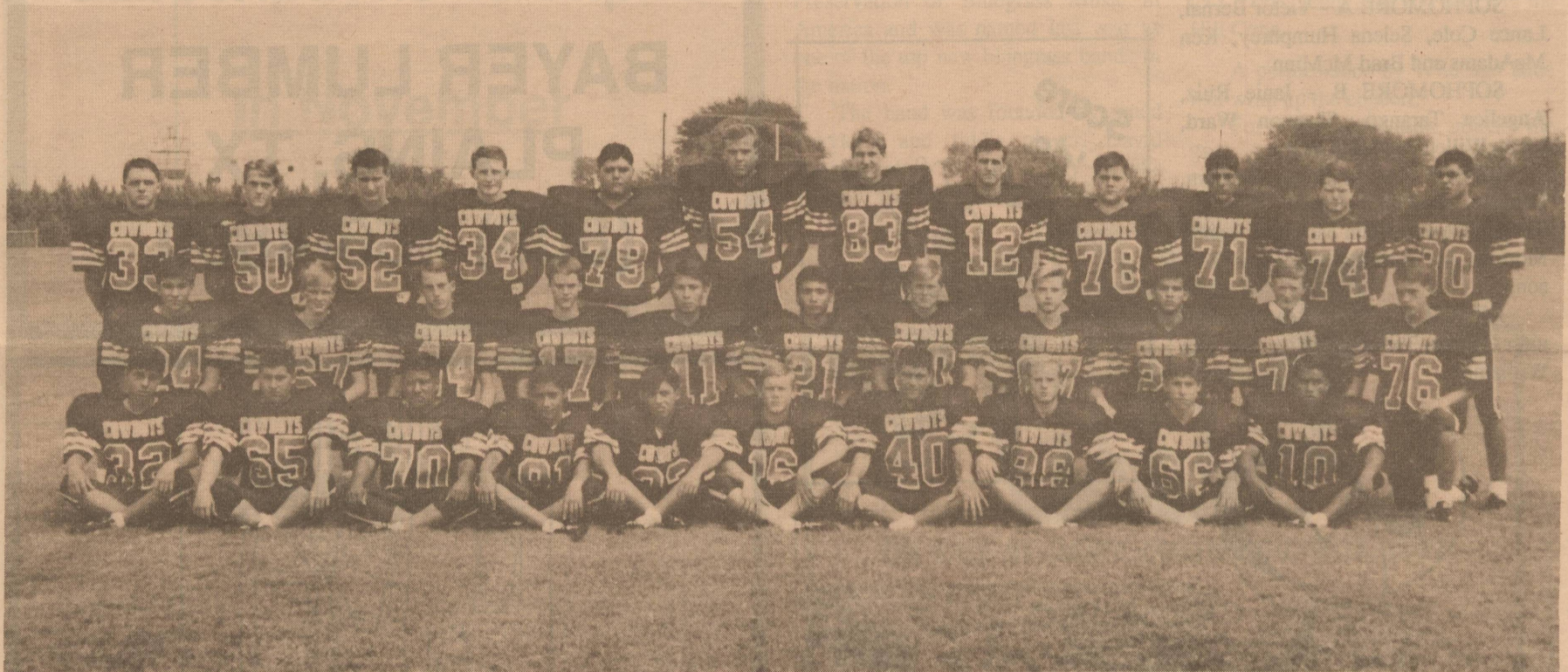

## Plains Wins District



### Cowboys To Play Wildcats Friday Night

The Cowboys earned a spot in the district play-offs with their 26-20 victory over the O'Donnell Eagles Friday, Nov. 6; and then went on to whip Whiteface 46-6 to claim the title and continue in the finals. The Cowboys are scheduled to challenge the Wink Wildcats Friday, Nov. 20 in Stanton. Kickoff time for the Bi-District clash is 7:30 p.m.

The following is a re-cap of the last two Friday night games.

#### Plains 26...O'Donnell 20

The Cowboys locked up the district championship with their 26-20 victory over the O'Donnell Eagles.

O'Donnell ran the opening kick back for their first touchdown, and the only time during the game that they would lead. The PAT was good.

Jr. Lira returned O'Donnell's kick to the 34 yard line. Jose Ramirez rushed for 13 yards, then six. Shannon Ward made a first down gaining the

O'Donnell 40 yard line. Ace Williams had a first down to the 28, then he added five more yards. Ramirez took the Cowboys to the ten. Williams

made four more. Ramirez scored the TD on a six yard run. The kick went wide.

### Cowgirls Lose Bi-District Contest

The Cowgirls ended their 1992 volleyball season at 16-18 with a 13-15 18-20 Bi-District loss to Grand Falls - Royalty in Odessa last Saturday.

The Cowgirls led 3-0 early in the first game until Grand Falls rallied with seven consecutive points. Grand Falls lead the remainder of the game with Plains working to catch up.

Plains closed their deficit to 9-10 and 12-13 and tied the game at 13-13. They held Grand Falls through one

more rotation before they gave up the two points Grand Falls needed for the 15-13 win.

Grand Falls grabbed a 4-0 lead in game two and led 9-2 before the Cowgirls notched five consecutive points to turn the match around with a 10-10 tie. Grand Falls answered with four consecutive points of their own and when a Cowgirl hit landed out of bounds, Plains left the court thinking the match was over. A Grand Falls tip was called on the hit and the Cowgirls hustled

back for another chance. Momentum went back and forth, and there were 18 more rotations before the match was completed. Grand Falls claimed the Bi-District victory with a 20-18 win.

Individual statistics included Rhonda Cowart, two kills, one block; Amy Crutcher, six kills, two blocks; Darce Pierce, two kills, three aces; Brandy Lester, three kills, two aces; Kara Holder, two kills; and Ogla Ramirez, one ace. Brandy Lester led all servers with ten points.

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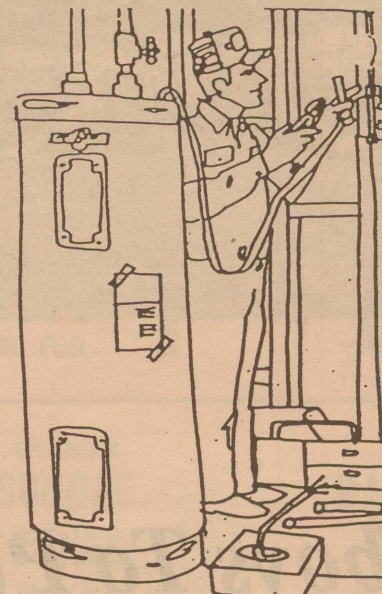
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Hot water is an absolute necessity for most modern day families. But the energy required to provide continual supply of hot water can be costly particularly when we're not attentive to good energy management. In most cases, energy cost for hot water is second only to heating and air conditioning expense. Studies have shown that water heaters account for 17-22 percent of home energy consumption.

Money can be saved through diligent energy management. A "traditional" water heater can be made more efficient by installing an "insulation jacket" around it. Thermostat settings should be no higher than 120 degrees Fahrenheit (or 140 degrees if you have an automatic dishwasher). Repair leaky hot water faucets - a hot water faucet dripping at the rate of two drops per second can waste 2,500 gallons a year, water that you paid to heat. Take showers instead of baths and install a flow restrictor on the shower head. Operate clothes washers and dishwashers only with a full load, and use shorter cycles, and "cold" and "warm" settings for laundering when possible.

And finally, a little common sense goes a long way: Don't use hot water when cold or warm will do!

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## 'Wild & Blue' Bluegrass Band To Perform At Bluegrass Fair

"Wild and Blue," one of the top new bluegrass bands in the nation, will be the featured workshop and concert band Nov. 21 for the annual Bluegrass Fair at South Plains College.

The festivities will include workshops on fiddle, starting and maintaining a bluegrass band, mandolin, banjo and guitar from 1-5 p.m. in SPC's Country and Bluegrass Music Building. An old-fashioned bluegrass concert from 6 to 11 p.m. in the facility's Tom T. Hall Production Studio will wind up the day's activities.

The concert will be broadcast on SPC-TV, cable channel 13.

"'Wild and Blue' is a new group that is aggressively pursuing a career to establish themselves in bluegrass music," says Alan Munde, SPC assistant professor of music. The band was named 1992's Best New Bluegrass Band of the Year by the Society for the Preservation of Bluegrass Music in America and was named last year as one of the top new bluegrass bands in the nation.

The band was founded by noted mandolin and fiddle player, David Harvey, after he left Larry Sparks group, "The Lonesome Ramblers," in

1988. Harvey then drafted the talents of his wife, Jan, and her sister, Jill Snider, to complete the band's rhythm section as well as their vocal trio. John Smith joined the group in 1991 as a banjo player. Jan Snider was twice nominated for Female Vocalist of the Year by SPBGMA.

During the Bluegrass Fair workshops, David Harvey will conduct a fiddle workshop at 1 p.m., starting and maintaining a bluegrass band at 2 p.m. and a mandolin workshop at 3 p.m.

Banjo and guitar workshops are scheduled for 4 p.m., conducted by Munde on banjo, and Joe Carr, SPC assistant professor of music, on guitar.

SPC bluegrass ensembles featured during the concert will include The Judahs, Ed Gale and the Cajun Crawfish, BJ and the Lost Boys Band, Richard and the Pickled Turn Ups, Dawning Bluegrass, Bucket of Notes, The Skillet Lickers, Jenny Rae and the Over the Hill Gang.

A performance by Wild and Blue will wrap up the concert.

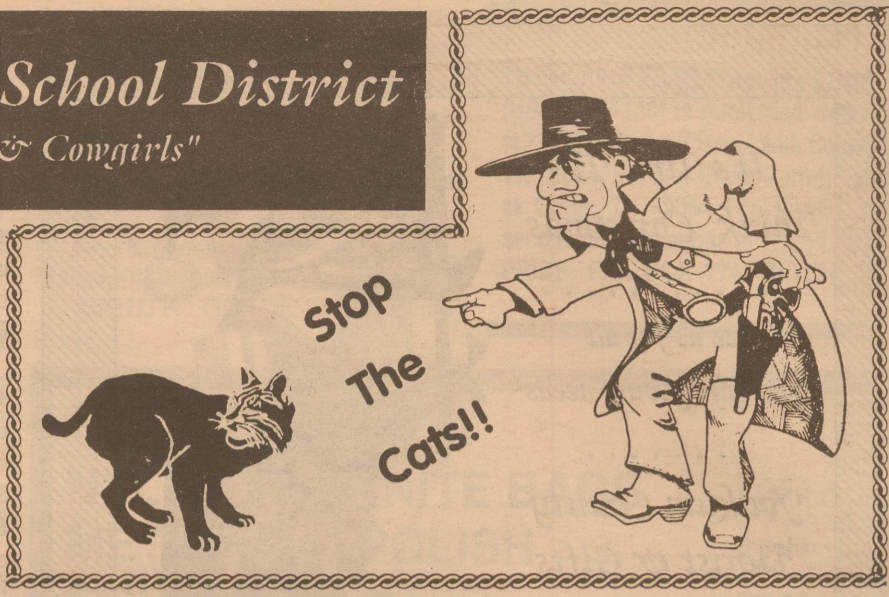

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## 'Great American Smoke-Out' Set For Thursday, Nov. 19

When the news reports a killer is on the loose, most people lock their doors. Yet millions of Americans let a killer into their lives every day - whenever they light a cigarette.

Everyone knows smoking causes cancer. The main problem for smokers, though, is getting themselves to stop. Potential quitters who pledge to stop smoking "next year" often let their best intentions go up in smoke.

"You might have a little more success if you try to make quitting as much fun as possible," says Larry Laufman, Ed. D., stop smoking coordinator at the Institute for Preventive Medicine in The Methodist Hospital in Houston. "And, the best time to try is the 'Great American Smokeout,' sponsored by the American Cancer Society Nov. 19."

Last year, a record 5.8 million smokers were able to stay off cigarette smoking for longer than 24 hours.

Laufman stresses, to be successful at giving up smoking, people must want to quit for themselves. Nagging a friend or loved one will only defeat the purpose.

However, once you're ready to take the plunge, here are some tips on how to avoid smoking: 1) Plan ahead by targeting a quit day; 2) Write down situations that make you want to smoke and change your normal habits connected with smoking. For example, leave the dinner table soon after eating to avoid the desire to light up; 3) On quit day, throw away all cigarettes, matches, lighters and ashtrays; 4) Stay busy. Hold a pencil or pen instead of a cigarette; 5) Drink lots of water and fruit juice to flush out nicotine; 6) Go places where smoking is not allowed; and 7) Reward yourself for successes.

"Remember take one day at a time, and if you slip up that's okay. Just keep trying and remember your goal," says Laufman. "Eventually, you will be able to kick the habit. It's toughest getting through those first few weeks."

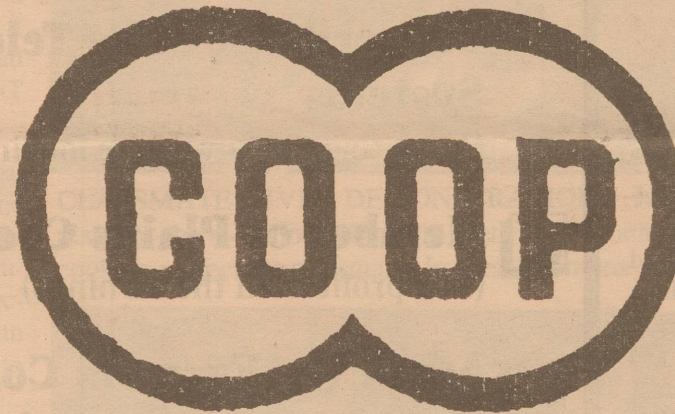
### PISTACHIO MICROWAVE FUDGE

1 box (1 pound) powdered sugar  
2/3 cup cocoa  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup milk  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
1/2 cup butter or margarine, sliced  
1/2 cup chopped natural California pistachios

In large microwave-safe bowl, combine powdered sugar, cocoa and salt. Stir in milk and vanilla; mix well. Place butter patties on top of mixture. Microwave at HIGH (100%) 3 minutes. Beat with mixer or wire whisk until smooth; stir in pistachios. Spread in foil-lined or buttered square baking pan. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons finely chopped pistachios. Refrigerate at least 1 hour or until firm. Cut into squares and serve

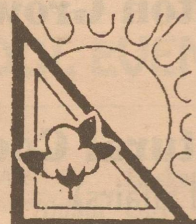

The game was a see-saw battle until late in the second quarter. Lenny Morrow returned an O'Donnell punt to the 50. Ward ran for three. Victor Bernal got six and a half yards on a quarterback keeper. Ramirez made the first down and gained nine yards on the next carry. Williams covered five yards to the 23. He scored on a 15 yard run. The PAT was no good.

Halftime score was Plains 12, O'Donnell 7.

Lira fielded the kickoff and returned it to the Cowboy 45. Williams scampered into the end zone on the next play, only to have it called back on a holding penalty. Ramirez carried to the Eagle 30. Bernal connected with Ward for a play that took the Cowboys to the 15. Ramirez made a first down on a run to the four. He carried to the one and then scored. The two point conversion pass to Brad McMinn was good.

Undaunted, O'Donnell took the ball and moved down field. The Eagles scored on a short run. Stoney Garland blocked the kick on the extra point try.

Not to be out-done, Plains mounted their one drive. Starting at their own 36, Williams gained two yards. At the beginning of the fourth quarter, Ramirez ran to the Eagle's 49, then gained two more yards. Ward picked up 32 yards on a good run to the 15. Ramirez made two more and Williams gained a first down at the five. Ramirez leaped over the top and into the end zone for Plains final TD. The PAT failed.

The Cowboy defense held and O'Donnell was forced to punt. The punt was muffed at the five and the Eagles recovered the ball in the end zone for a touchdown. The kick was good.

Cowboy fans had an anxious moment when the ball was fumbled in Cowboy territory, however, the Eagles fumbled the ball back to Plains on the next play.

The game ended with Plains 26, O'Donnell 20.

Ramirez was the leading rusher with 149 yards; Williams was second with 100. Ramirez and Garland led the defense in tackles.

**Plains 46... Whiteface 6**

According to the Lubbock Avalanche Journal, quarterback Victor Bernal threw for three touchdowns and Jose Ramirez rushed for 142 yards on 20 carries as Plains rolled past Whiteface 46-6 in the District 6-A finale for both teams.

Bernal propelled the Cowboys to a 13-0 first quarter lead on scoring passes to Shannon Ward and Brad McMinn.

Bernal scored a pair of second quarter touchdowns and tossed a 24-yard scoring pass to Dan Partin as the Cowboys (8-2, 5-0) increased their lead to 34-0 at halftime.

Whiteface (1-9, 0-5) finally got on the board in the third quarter on an 80-yard scoring run by Greg Romero.

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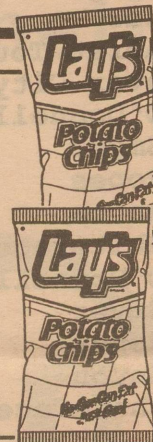
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
