

Sudan was able to pick off four Cowboy passes and sack the quarter-back twice. The pokes were also plagued with turnovers, losing the ball twice due to fumbles, allowing them to score a couple of touchdowns in the first half. The score was 12-0.

The Cowboys managed a late safety when the ball was snapped over the head of punter Alex Cruz into the end zone and scored a touchdown when quarterback Victor Bernal connected with Dan Partin for an 11 yard TD pass.

Plains rushed 42 times for 91 yards and finished with 181 yards total offense. The Hornets had a total of 202 yards on the ground.
