228 Animals Are Already Entered In County Show

Two-hundred and twenty-eight animals have been entered in the Eastland County Livestock Show by over one-hundred 4-H boys and girls of Eastland County. The show will be held March 24-25.

The entries are as follows: 88 fat lambs, 47 fat pigs, 14 beef cattle, 20 sows and gilts, 28 dairy cattle, 18 angora goats, and nine ewes and rams and six fat steers.

Most of the 4-H boys and girls realize that to show an animal requires much preparation before they actually get to the show ring. For example, the fat lambs must be fed about six months, blocked several times and their

CISCO LIVESTOCK SHOW ASSN. EVENTS SET MARCH 13

Registrations are now being accepted at the County Agricultural Agent's office in Eastland from adult and junior breeders of registered Hereford and Angus beef cattle in Eastland County for the annual beef cattle show to be held in Cisco on Saturday, March 18, according to an announcement by J. M. Cooper, county agent.

Sponsored by the Cisco Livestock Show Association, the event is open to any breeder of registered beef cattle in Eastland County. Area breeders who plan to show pens of animals in the show were urged to contact the county agent's office as soon as possible so that the Association can provide a sufficient number of panels to care for the animals.

The rules of the show require that animals be shown in pens of two. They must be entered by 10 o'clock on the morning of the 18th of March and must stay until 4 o'clock that afternoon. Mr. Cooper said that animals do not need to be halter broke or trained to lead.

Entries in the Hereford breed will be accepted in six classes, as follows: Class 1, pen of two heifers under eight months old; Class 2, pen of heifers over eight months old but not over 16 months of age; Class 3, Champion and Reserve Champion Hereford breed; Class 4, pen of two bull calves under eight months old; Class 5, pen of two bulls over eight months old and not over 16 months of age; and Class 6, Champion and Reserve Champion Hereford bull.

Class 7 through 12 comprises entries in the Angus breed, as follows: Class 7, pen of two heifers under eight months old; Class 8, pen of heifers over eight months old but not over 16 months of age; Class 9, Champion and Reserve Champion Angus breed; Class 10, pen of two bull calves under eight months old; Class 11, pen of two bulls over eight months old and not over 16 months of age; and Class 12, Champion and Reserve Champion Angus bull.

Premiums of \$10, \$5, \$3 and \$2 will be won by the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th place champions respectively in each class except that first place winners in the Champion and Reserve Champion Classes of each breed will be awarded \$10 with \$5 going to the runners-up.

Site of the show, the panel of judges and other arrangements were to be announced later. Mr. Cooper stated that "the Cisco Livestock Show Association joins with me in cordially inviting you to show one or more pens of your animals on March 18th in Cisco."

'FARM BUREAU WEEK' IS SET FOR FEB. 5-11 BY GOVERNOR

AUSTIN — Governor Price Daniel has cited agriculture as "the well-spring of our social and economic vitality," and set a state-wide week-long observance in recognition of agriculture's contribution to Texas life.

In a proclamation signed Jan. 12, the Texas governor designated the week of Feb. 5-11 as "Farm Bureau Week" in which he urged all citizens "to cooperate in the recognition and observance of this week in an effort to publicize this important phase of our life."

The special week coincides with the annual membership campaign of the Texas Farm Bureau, largest general farm organization in the state. The 1961 drive was kicked off with a big Chaitman's Rally Jan. 24 in Abilene attended by county FB presidents, and county and community membership chairmen. About 125 counties are planning intensive membership drives during the next two months. It is now largest state Farm Bureau in the South and fourth largest in the nation.

Governor Daniel, who is a Farm Bureau member in Liberty County where he owns farm property, cited the need for an educated, prosperous, and organized agriculture in Texas. He said farmers and ranchers of

Texas, through their various organizations, have worked for improvements in the economy and government of Texas.

Here is the text of the governor's proclamation:

"Greetings: "Agriculture has long been recognized as the well-spring of our social and economic vitality. A vast number of Texans derive their principal income from farming and ranching activities."

"The farmers and ranchers of Texas, through their various organizations, have crusaded by democratic procedures for a voice in the affairs of the State and for improvements in the economy and government of Texas.

"These groups recognize the necessity and supreme importance of having an educated, prosperous, and organized agriculture in our state.

"Therefore, I, as Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby proclaim February 5-11, 1961, as 'Farm Bureau Week' in Texas, and urge our citizens to cooperate in the recognition and observance of this week in an effort to publicize this important phase of our Texas life.

"In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 12th day of January, 1961. (Signed) Price Daniel, Governor of Texas."

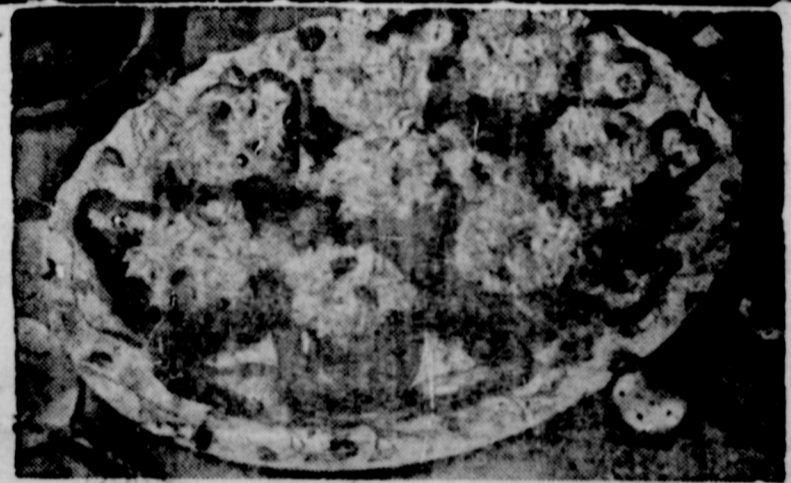

Curried Rice and Tuna Make a Tasty and Thrifty Filling for Luscious Tomatoes

Rice brings together the deep sea goodness of tuna fish and the Oriental excitement of curry in this versatile main dish. The curry powder contributes exotic flavor and intriguing color enhanced by the bits of green pepper and the brilliant red of the tomatoes.

Served piping hot from the oven or cold and refreshing on a bed of greens, this "something special" for the family is also something quick and easy for Mom to fix.

INGREDIENTS:
8 medium sized ripe tomatoes
4 tablespoons minced onion
2 tablespoons minced green pepper
4 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 7-ounce can tuna fish
2 cups cooked rice
1 teaspoon curry powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup water

PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE: To make 3 liberal cups of fluffy rice, put 1 cup of uncooked rice, 2 cups of cold water and 1 teaspoon of salt into a 2 quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover saucepan with a lid and leave over this

low heat for 14 minutes. Do not remove lid nor stir rice while it is cooking. Turn off the heat.

Use exact measurements of uncooked rice and water. Time the cooking accurately.

For real convenience and economy of time and effort, keep unused rice in the refrigerator in a covered container at all times. Use it for many quick, delicious and inexpensive soups, salads, casserole dishes, hot breads and desserts.

METHOD: Peel tomatoes easily by scalding, plunging into cold water and then peeling. Slice off stem end of tomatoes. Carefully scoop out pulp. Cook onion and green pepper in the butter or margarine until tender. Add the tuna fish, rice, curry powder, salt, pepper and water. Mix thoroughly. Fill the tomatoes with the tuna and rice mixture and bake at 350° F. about 15 minutes or until the tomatoes are tender. Serve hot. Garnish with green pepper rings if desired.

For a cool and refreshing salad, chill the tomatoes after they are stuffed and serve on salad greens.

This recipe makes 8 servings or 3 cups of the curried tuna and rice mixture.

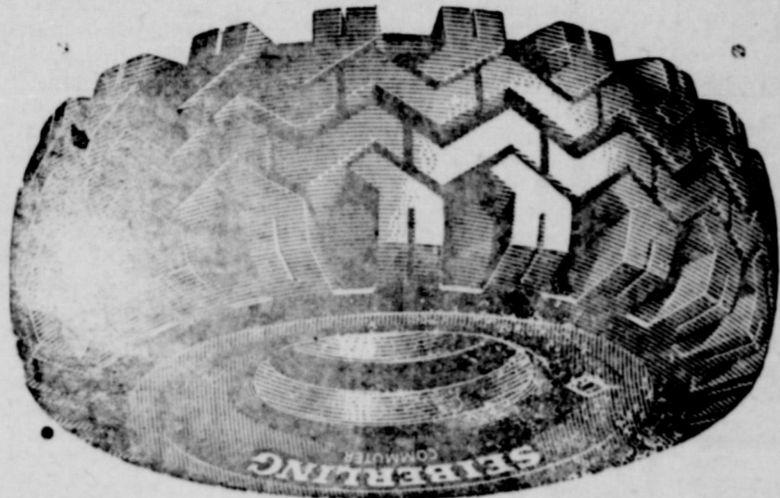

hoofs should be trimmed. The fat steer is probably the most work of any show animal since he must be washed some 15 to 30 times, must be brushed daily, trained to lead, hoofs must be trimmed and fed over about a nine month period to properly finish out for a show. Also the steers head must be trimmed and touched up over his body with the clippers. All of the show animals require various amounts of grooming and feeding to get ready for shows.

The deadline for getting entries in is February the 15th.

The breeding classes are open to 4-H boys and girls; F. F. A. members and adults of Eastland and adjoining counties and the same is true with the fat classes except that adults cannot show fat animals.
