

Lady Texan Basketball Camp to feature Lady Raider Swoopes

Former South Plains College standout Sheryl Swoopes will make a special appearance during the Lady Texan Basketball Camp, which will be held July 18-23.

The camp, under the direction of South Plains College women's basketball coach Lyndon Hardin, is open to all girls in fifth grade through high school.

"We feel we have one of the better camps around," Hardin said. "We try to keep a small ratio between instructors and campers. It's a good environment to learn fundamentals."

The purpose of the camp is to provide an opportunity for girls and young women to improve their basketball skills in a fun environment. The fundamentals of basketball are stressed, with sportsmanship, team play and self-confidence emphasized as well.

"We're not going to make them great players in a week," Hardin said, "but we give them a good foundation. We're going to work hard on basketball skills. It's not a recreational camp, but they have fun too."

Swoopes played for the Lady Texans during the 1989-90 and 1990-91 seasons, and was selected as the National Junior College Player of the Year by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association in 1991.

Swoopes twice earned National Junior College Athletic Association All-American recognition at South Plains, and also was a two-time Kodak All-American. The Brownfield native set 15 school records at SPC, including most points in a career, most points in a season and most points in a game.

The camp will be held in Texan Dome on the SPC campus. Other facilities for use by the campers are indoor swimming pool, indoor racquetball courts and tennis courts. In addition, campers also may spend time at the SPC Student Center, which features a video arcade, pool and ping pong tables and a giant-screen television.

Camp participants may commute daily from their homes or spend the week on campus in a college residence hall.

The cost of the camp is \$200 for overnight campers, \$165 for day campers who eat in Texan Hall and \$100 for day campers who do not eat in the dining hall.


Steve Jones was appointed to fill the position vacated by Rick Ramos. He was first runner-up in the general election held May 1.





Spring dead spot in grass often blamed on grub worms

Examination of lawns reflect that many of the problems that are attributed to grub damage are actually of other concerns....one of which is Spring Dead Spot (SDS).

The first turfgrass disease making an appearance is SDS. It is considered the most damaging disease of bermudagrass in North America. SDS is caused by the fungi Letosphaeria horrae and Leptosphaeria narmari. It occurs mainly in the northern limits of the bermudagrass range, where it is cold enough for the turf to go dormant.

SDS appears as roughly circular, bleached, dead spots during spring "green up." These spots range in size from two inches to three feet in diameter. Spots may remain for a year or more, but most often the turf grows over the spots by August. In some cases, weeds invade this area without competition from the grass. Sometimes the spots develop into rings, which may reappear and enlarge each year.

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SDS is common in "Tif" and Texturf 10 bermudagrass lawns although

it also occurs in common bermudagrass. It is often associated with compacted soil, close mowing, late fall nitrogen fertilization and heavy fall watering. High fertility and water in late fall delay dormancy and sets up the turf for damage with the first fall freeze. It has been noted that very cold winters, in general, are association with sever SDA.

Controls for SDA include aerifying the soil to reduce compaction, maintaining balanced fertility, avoiding late season nitrogen applications, having well drained soil and applying the fungicide Rubigan in the fall.

Apply a single application of Rubigan at four ounces per 1000 square feet in September. If you wait until October or November, make one application at the higher rate of six ounces per 1000 square feet. After applying, irrigate with one half to one inch of water.

Fungicide application is done in the fall ONLY. When you see symptoms in the spring, fungicide applications will not be effective.
