





The answer to funding public education in Texas is very simple: pass a law making it a felony to be between 6 and 18 years of age. Then we can send all of our school children to jail where the state will spend \$35,000 a year to help them instead of a paltry \$2,300. That way, every child could grow up having his own teacher. Talk about test scores going up!

In November, voters will be asked to pass a \$1 billion prison bond issue to increase capacity by 20,000 beds (\$50,000 per bed, not counting interest which will probably double or triple the cost). Of course, if we borrow the money (instead of appropriating the needed amount) we are spending tomorrow's tax dollars today and there are two distinct benefits:

No. 1-- The politicians of today can be heroes in their hometowns by bragging that they have prisons in 88 locations across the state.

No. 2-- Politicians can write articles and tell the world they did a great job of increasing spending by only 12.9 percent (8 billion) this biennium after an increase the previous two-year cycle of 32.4 percent (\$15.5 billion) and did not have to raise taxes. Of course, at the same time, it was necessary for the Legislature to NOT fund even enough money for the growth of the student population of the non-voting school children of Texas. I believe all of this falls under the heading of false economy.

When the governor of Texas increases her staff from some 185 persons to 345 and when state employees increase during her regime by 34,000 through the first quarter of this year, there is going to be a day of reckoning and it is steamrolling down the track toward the taxpayers of Texas--full speed ahead.

On top of all of this frivolous activity, let me now note and all of us long remember that \$1 billion was budgeted for the schools when a minimum of \$1.2 billion was needed for the growth in enrollment alone.

In addition, after the voters rejected Robin Hood by some 60 percent to 40 percent--even after being threatened with school closure, consolidation and state income tax--the Legislature then passed a law and presented to the courts a solution which arguably is the same thing as Robin Hood.

Where is the threat to our schools? Our Legislature has attempted to legislate the school children's permanent school fund to make investment decisions that could cost the students \$1.7 billion over the next 10 years, so the politicians will not have to fulfill their financial responsibilities for this biennium. What is the answer? At some point, we need our elected representatives to do what you and I do at home. They need to say: "This is a good idea, but we cannot afford it." We, as taxpayers, cannot afford all of these good ideas either.

Again, local school boards will have to raise local taxes because of state legislative action. When, are we as taxpayers, going to yell "calf rope?"



If you are new to the Plains community and have a student or students who wish to attend Plains Schools during the 1993-94 school year, please check with the appropriate campus office during the week of August 9-13, 1993. Any student who was not enrolled in Plains Schools during the last week of school (May 17-21, 1993) should also check with the office.

Each student should present a birth certificate, social security number, and immunization records in addition to any records you may have from a previous school. If you have a child who may qualify for pre-kindergarten or Headstart programs, please bring proof of income in addition to the other documents. It is not necessary for students who pre-registered in Pre-K or Kindergarten to come to the office unless you have questions. The income guidelines are printed below. Pre-K classes will be one-half day in length only - (half of the students attending the morning class, the other half attending in the afternoon)

#### INCOME GUIDELINES FOR FREE/REDUCED MEALS AND FOR PRE-K QUALIFICATION

#### LETTER TO HOUSEHOLDS (Multi-Child) NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM/SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM

Parent/Guardian:

The Plains school takes part in the National School Lunch Program/Breakfast Program. Meals are served every school day and all Plains students receive free meals from our cafeteria, however, Plains ISD may be reimbursed for meals served to children from families who qualify under the stated guidelines.

In order to claims reimbursement for these meals, a completed application form must be on file for each ELIGIBLE child. If your child/children would qualify for free or reduced price meals, please complete the application form and return it to the school as soon as possible.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income.

#### HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's ``personal use'' income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word ``none'' if the adult does not have a social security number.

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<u>Verification</u>: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:

<u>Reporting Changes</u>: If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

<u>Reapplication</u>: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of ``handicapped'' will be served, provided a

physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

IN THE OPERATION OF THE CHILD FEEDING PROGRAMS, NO CHILD WILL BE DISCRIMINATED AGAINST BECAUSE OF RACE. SEX, COLOR, NATIONAL ORIGIN, AGE OR HANDICAP. IF YOU BELIEVE YOU HAVE BEEN DISCRIMINATED AGAINST, WRITE IMMEDIATELY TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, WASHINGTON, D. C. 20250.

Any person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the proposed facility may request the Board to hold an informal public meeting and/or contested case hearing on the permit application pursuant to Section 382.056(d) of the Texas Health and Safety Code.
