tions as well as participated in food preparation activities. Extra cookbooks are available for those who were unable to attend. They are free and may be picked up at the Extension Office located in the old courthouse.

Conservation tillage methods explained by SCS Conservationist

Conservation Tillage is an effective way for producers to stay in compliance with their FSA plans. It is sometimes referred to as "farming ugly", because instead of having a bare, clean field - a person leaves plant residues on the soil surface throughout the year.

Some people may ask what is conservation tillage? Technically speaking, it is any tillage and planting system in which at least 30 percent of the soil surface is covered by plant residue after planting. One of the purposes of the residue is to reduce soil erosion by water and wind. Where soil erosion by wind is the primary concern, the minimum residue requirements for dryland and irrigated are 1,500 lb/ac and 1250 lb/ac respectively. These amounts are required to be maintained on the soil surface until April 1.

There are several types of Conservation Tillage Systems according to the District Conservationist Mario Avila. These include no-till, in which you plant in undisturbed cover such as wheat with special knife planters. Another type strip-till, is used in undisturbed cover except for a strip 1/3 of the row width, that is pushed aside to plant into. Ridge-till is still another method of planting into existing cover that includes no-till or strip-till, and planting is done on ridges 4 to 6 inches higher than the row middles. The last method of conservation tillage is

mulch-till. This method doesn't use any previous residue, but instead the soil surface is disturbed, and then mulch is spread on the surface, for example cotton burrs are used.

An additional benefit of these methods described, is that they can improve water quality and quantity, by reducing runoff of sediments and increase infiltration of moisture into the soil. 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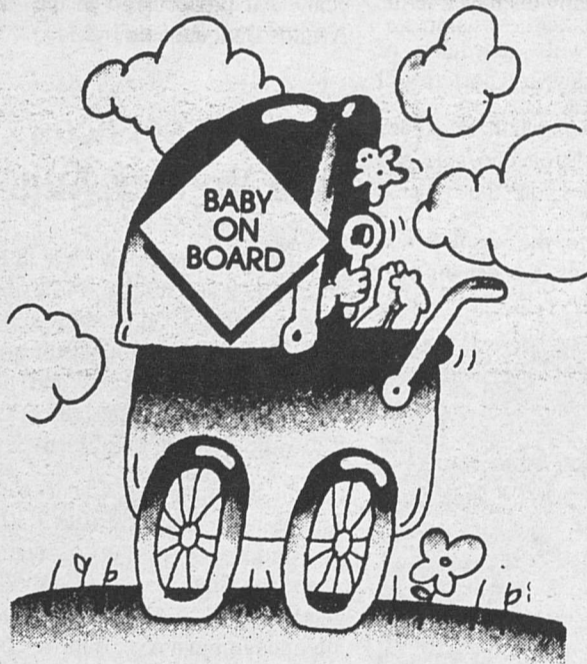

Kitchen Korner

Recipes are shared this week with Pride cooks by Mrs. Paul (Louise) Cobb. The Zucchini Bread is just in time for the squash that is so prolific in summer gardens. Potluck Chicken is an easy dish that wins compliments and Yum Yum Cake makes one hungry just reading the recipe.

ZUCCHINI BREAD

3 eggs
2 c sugar
1 c oil (I use peanut oil)
2 t vanilla
1 t soda
1/2 t baking powder
1 t salt
3 t cinnamon
2 c grated zucchini
1 c chopped nuts
3 c plus 2 t flour

Beat eggs, sugar, oil and vanilla until fluffy. Sift flour, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. Add to egg mixture. Mix well. Add squash and nuts. Cook at 350 degrees for one hour in two loaf pans.

POTLUCK CHICKEN

Use 8 chicken breasts, boned or not. Shake in flour, salt, pepper. Brown in butter. While chicken browns, make sauce, reducing the fat to 2 T. Arrange breasts in baking dish, one layer in the pan. Add one pound fresh sliced mushrooms. Cook mushrooms slightly. Add 1/2 pint sour cream, 1/2 cup dry wine and pinch of rosemary. Pour over chicken, cover and bake one hour and 15 minutes at 350 degrees. Serve with rice or noodles.

YUM YUM CAKE

2 c flour
2 c sugar
1 t soda
1 t vanilla
2 eggs
1/2 c cooking oil
1/4 t salt
No. 2 can of crushed pineapple, juice and all

Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees. Mix ingredients; beat well. Bake in oblong greased and floured pan for 30-35 minutes or until done.

FILLING

1 small can evaporated milk
1 stick oleo
1 c sugar

Cook over low heat until thick (don't overcook). Add one cup chopped pecans and pour over cake while it is still hot. Ready to eat - YUM YUM!

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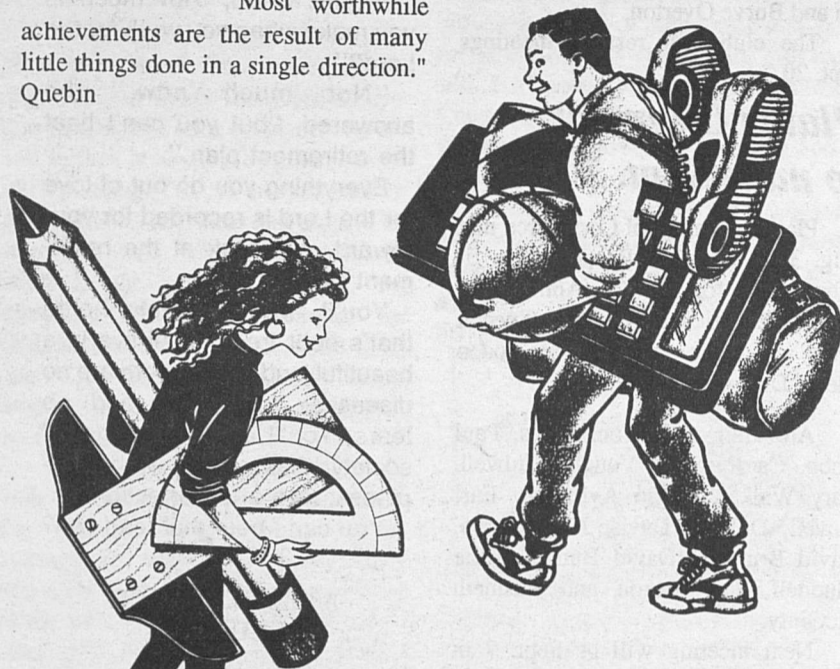

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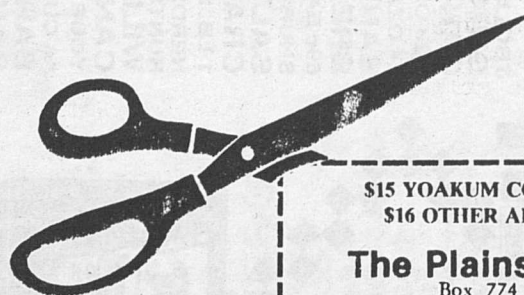
