Federal Income Tax Returns Due From Most People

ABILENE — Word on who must file a Federal income tax return for 1960 came today from Arthur E. Fogle, Jr., Administrative Officer, Internal Revenue Service, Abilene.

Citizens or residents of the U. S. A., including children with gross incomes of \$800 or more in 1960, must file tax returns on or before April 17, 1961, with their IRS district directors, the IRS representative said.

"If you were 65 years or over on the last day of 1960 you need not file a return unless your gross income was \$1,200 or more during the year."

Self-employed people must file a return if their self-employment income was \$400 or more, even though their gross income was less than \$600.

"If your gross income for 1960 was less than \$600 (\$1,200 if you are 65 or over) but it was subject to withholding tax, you should file a return and get a refund of the tax withheld."

"Texas community property law in most cases gives both husband and wife one-half of the total income and withholding credit each one receives."

In this state the husband and wife must either file a joint return including all income, or each report one-half the combined community income on separate returns.

"If they use Forms 1040 and 1040W each may deduct one-half of the total deductions paid with community funds," the IRS representative said.

Members of the Armed Forces also pay federal income taxes. They give their names, service serial numbers and permanent home addresses on the returns.

Many tax problems are solved by using the IRS representative's instructions on the return forms. The office has a special Taxpayers Assistance Day every Monday from 8:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. Telephone information is available by calling OR 4-9146-7-3.

Texas Railroads Paid \$26,779 To County As Taxes For Year

The Texas railroads paid \$26,779 in taxes in Eastland county during 1959 according to the Texas Railroad Association.

That amount was the county's share of the nearly \$10,000,000 the railroads paid throughout the state.

In addition, of course, was the large total in taxes the railroads' approximately 40,000 Texas employees contributed on their own property. The vast majority of railroad workers, many of whom live in Eastland county, own their own homes.

The largest railroad contribution in Eastland county was for the support of education. The school tax for 1959 totaled \$14,981.

City and village taxes amounted to \$4,064, while the share of the county government's operating expenses paid for by the railroads totaled \$5,580. The road and bridge fund gained \$1,506 from the railroads in 1959. All other taxes brought the total for the county to \$26,779.

"With the future of our country and state depending to a great extent upon the education of our youth, I am glad to see that nearly half of the taxes paid by the railroads in '59, a total of \$4,565,103, went to support the schools," said Walter Caven, general counsel of the Texas Railroad Association. "Recognizing this need for education, many of our railroads

also make scholarships available every year."

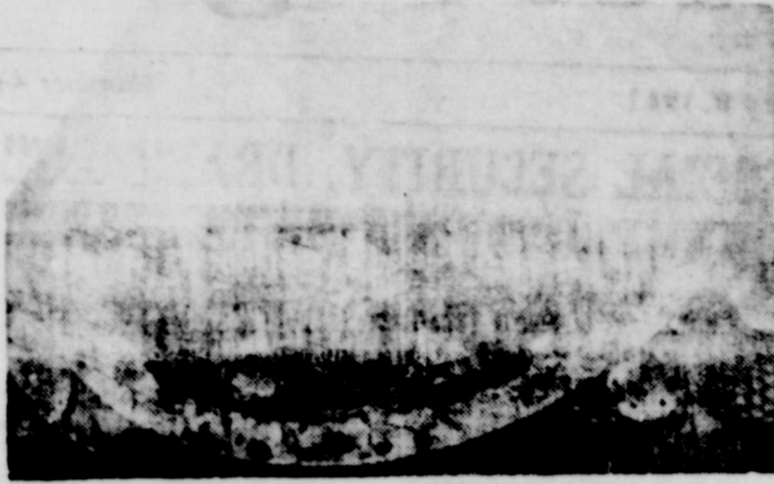

Carried Rice and Tuna Make a Tasty and Thrifty Filling for Luscious Tomatoes

This brings together the deep sea goodness of tuna fish and the original excitement of curry in the versatile main dish. The curry powder contributes exotic flavor and interesting color enhanced by the bits of green pepper and the brilliant red of the tomatoes.

INGREDIENTS:
4 medium sized ripe tomatoes
4 tablespoons minced onion
3 tablespoons minced green pepper
4 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 7-ounce can tuna fish
2 cups cooked rice
1 teaspoon curry powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup water

PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE: To make 3 liberal cups of fluffy rice, put 1 cup of uncooked rice, 2 cups of cold water and 1 teaspoon of salt into a 2 quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover saucepan with a lid and simmer for 15 minutes.

low heat for 15 minutes. Do not remove lid for stir rice while it is cooking. Turn off the heat. Use exact measurements of uncooked rice and water. Time the cooking accurately.

For real convenience and economy of time and effort, keep uncooked rice in the refrigerator in a covered container at all times. Use it for many quick, delicious and inexpensive soups, salads, casserole dishes, hot breads and desserts.

METHOD: Peel tomatoes easily by scalding, plunging into cold water and then peeling. Slice off stem end of tomatoes. Carefully scoop out pulp. Cook onion and green pepper in the butter or margarine until tender. Add the tuna fish, rice, curry powder, salt, pepper and water. Mix thoroughly. Fill the tomatoes with the tuna and rice mixture and bake at 350° F. about 15 minutes or until the tomatoes are tender. Serve hot. Garnish with green pepper rings if desired.

For a cool and refreshing salad, chill the tomatoes after they are stuffed and serve on lettuce leaves. This recipe makes 3 servings or 3 cups of the carried tuna and rice mixture.

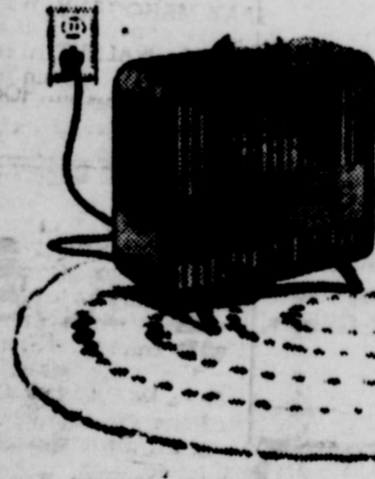

Vets Questions And Answers

Q - A neighbor of ours, a veteran holding GI insurance, has been hospitalized for some months and another person has been handling the payment of his insurance premiums for him. Does that person have the right to make any change in the way the premiums are paid, or to modify the beneficiaries of the policy in any way?

A - He definitely does not. The policyholder himself is the only one in a case like this who can make any changes affecting premiums or the payment of proceeds to beneficiaries.

Q - I went on VA's pension roll this year, under the new system effective July 1, 1960, and I understand I will receive an income questionnaire soon, which also will ask about my net worth. Will you explain this term for me, please?

A - Net worth for VA pension purposes is the market value of all the property you own except your home and personal belongings necessary for your day-to-day living, such as your automobile, clothing, household furniture, jewelry and the like - anything necessary for your day-to-day living.

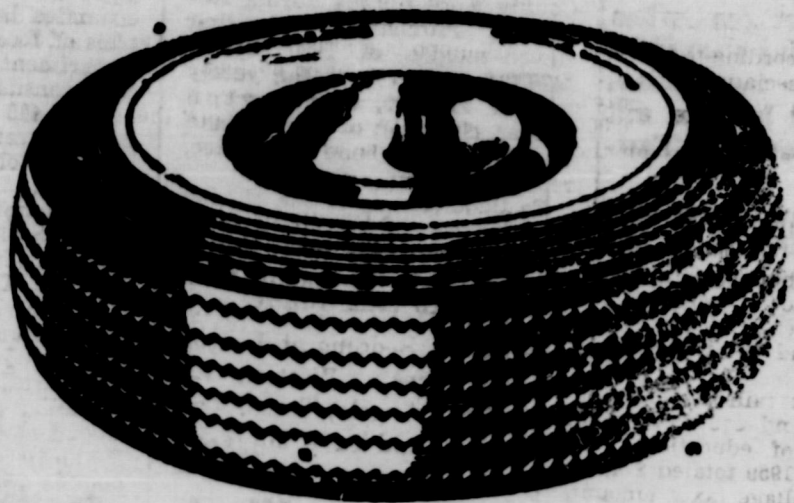
Q - Does the VA have any sort of a Christmas gift certificate arrangement whereby I could give a patient friend the certificate and let him choose a gift himself, up to the value of the certificate?

A - Yes, only the certificates are coupons, sold in books. The Coupon Books are sold for as little as fifty cents or as much as five dollars, for each book. The patient spends the coupons at his hospital canteen, picking out whatever pleases him. Just write a letter to the manager of the VA hospital your friend is in. Tell him what you want.

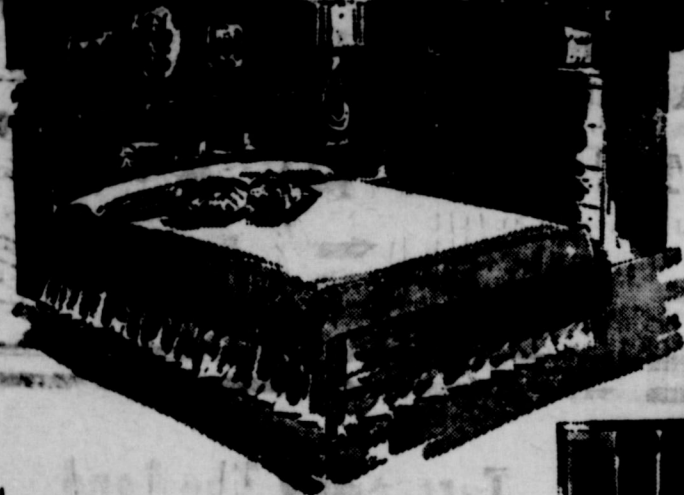

Sale Of Savings Bonds 91.7% In Eleven Months

Savings Bonds sales in Eastland County were \$29,384 during November. Purchases for the first eleven months of 1960 totaled \$476,721 or 91.7% of the yearly goal of \$520,000, Guy Peyton Parker, chairman of the Eastland County savings bond committee, reported Friday.

Eastland County is one of nine counties comprising District 13. Chairman of the District is Dan Jones Castles. November sales in District 13 were \$213,644 with cumulative sales of \$3,544,776. This represents 93.5% of the total goal of \$3,790,000 for the District.

The cumulative sale of E and H series bonds in Texas during 1960 amounted to \$139,283,903. This represents 84.2% of the Texas 1960 goal of \$165,500,000. November sales in Texas totaled \$9,782,650.

According to William H. Neal, national director of the Treasury Bond Program, "November marked the eleventh consecutive month in which the savings bond program has shown growth. We are especially encouraged by the continued downward growth in redemptions, a major factor contributing to this sustained growth," Mr. Neal concluded.

District 13 will hold its annual meeting on Feb. 9, 1961. Approximately 86.1% of the national goal of \$4,650,000,000 has been achieved.

Americans Ate Good Supply Of Foods In 1960

College Station — Americans ate well in 1960. The year-end estimates indicate plentiful supplies of food for 1961. The U. S. Department of Agriculture said food consumption for 1960 averaged 1,488 pounds per person based on retail weights of all food products of farms, ranches and fisheries.

Consumption of dairy products led, with 414 pounds per person—the equivalent of about 250 quarts of milk. The total includes fluid milk and all other forms of foods made from milk except butter. It is included in fats and oils.

The fruit and vegetable group—excluding potatoes—was a close second at 409 pounds per person. Potato consumption was 168 pounds per capita.

The third ranking group was meats. The average was 179 pounds per person and included poultry and fish as well as the red meats, beef, pork and lamb.

Consumption of other food groups included 146 pounds of flour and cereal products per capita, 108 pounds of sugar and sirup, 67 pounds of fats and oils, 41 pounds of eggs (about 26 dozen), and 17 pounds of coffee, tea and cocoa.

The Department said estimates of consumption per person are based on the disappearance of food products. The quantity of each group is divided by total population.

A hard-working 200-pounder, of course, eats more of the foods than infants, invalids, and older people, yet they all count equally in figuring per capita consumption.
