Many Qualify For Social Security **Under New Rules**

On November 4 or 5 many people across the nation received their first social security benefit checks - checks made possible for the first time by the 1960 amendments to the social security law, reports R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration. Receiving checks for the first time were working people and their dependents (and also some

survivors of workers who have died) who became eligible for benefits. The amount of social security credits required was reduced by about one-third, Tuley said.

Also receiving benefits for the first time were some widows whose husbands died after March 31, 1938, with at least 1½ years of social security credits. Before the changes in the law enacted in September, no monthly benefits were payable to the survivors of any person dying before 1940.

If you believe you qualify for benefits under the amended law, it is still not too late for you to apply, and receive benefits dating back to the month of October. Additional information about specific cases can be obtained by asking your Abilene social security office. For general information on the 1960 amendments, ask the Abilene social security office for the new leaflet on the 1960 changes.





The State Highway Department has allocated some \$955,000 to be spent on construction of 15.7 miles of pavement for State Highway 206, which will connect Cisco with Coleman via Cross Plains, according to information here. The program will be com-pleted in 1961-62.

As of now, State Highway 206 extends from the intersection with U. S. 67 at Coleman to Cross Plains. The program will extend the highway on to Cisco where it will intersect with Interstate 20 (Highway 80).

The program is broken into four projects, as follows:

From a point near Burkett in Coleman County to the Brown County line, five miles at an estimated cost of \$250,000.

In Brown County, one and three tenths miles at a probable cost of \$65,000.

From the Brown County line to the Eastland County line in Callahan County through Cross Plains, seven and four tenths miles at an estimated cost of \$540,000.

In Eastland County, two miles at an estimated cost of \$100,00.


All four projects may be handled in one contract letting, according to an opinion expressed by H. O. Woodword of Coleman, a member of the Texas Highway Commission. Surveying was expected to start soon.

In addition, the program calls for improvements and reconstruction on the existing farm-tomarket road in Eastland County so as to conform to the standards of the remainder of Highway 206. This part of the highway will be straightened.

A new section of State 206 from Coleman to Burkett, now in the process of being completed, already is in use. The balance of 206, from Coleman to U. S. 67, is said to be in good condition.
