## Class offers beekeeping students sweet thrills

Texas Tech professor Sherman Phillips loves honey bees. Phillips, an assistant professor of entomology who teaches much that he sometimes demonstrates how to make a bee beard.
I've never known anyone with more enthusiasm about bees and beekeeping," said entomology department chair man James Wangberg. "Dr. phes."
Phillips makes a bee beard by putting the queen bee in a small cage under his chin. Someone then takes the hive shakes it on him and the bees congregate around the queen orming a beard.
"Bees won't sting
Pees won't sting when they are taken out of the hive," with nectar."
Although Phillips is not afraid to wear a bee beard, he said is students are not so confident.
"My students usually keep their masks on around the
hives," Phillips said. "I try to convince them that the bees will not stimg, but they don't want to take any chances." will not sting, but they dont want ho take any chances.
Phillips said students receive hands-on experience in his beekeeping class, Entomology 2202. After a morning lecture the students go to the honey bee apiary at the Tech
"Presently we have 11 hives at our apiary," Phillips said "Students in this class want to learn. Even students with senioritis turn into wideeyed freshmen when we work with he bees."
Bees in Bees in a hive are
drone, Phillips said
The queen bee is the leader of a hive and produces eggs. When bees hatch, the larvae are fed nectar called royal jelly If a femele heads of he worker beed.
If a female larva receives more royal jelly than usual, the five years.
"The queen bee is much larger than the other bees, Phillips said. "Usually only four or five that are fed royal je ly in the spring turn into a queen."
Worker bees are also female and are responsible for feeding larvae, collecting pollen and turning the pollen int honey. A worker bee lives for about 45 days.
The male bees, called drones, are the lowest echelon of the bee hive. "Drones are just good for mating," Phillips said "All they do is eat and drink. A drone dies in the matin
"process.'
"Bees, of honey bees are very beneficial to people. people al of course, produce honey," Phillips said. "A lot of people also like to eat bee pollen. Beeswax is used sometimes
