GRAIN DRILLS RUNNING FULL SPEED TO PLANT COVER CROPS

Nodules growing on legume roots. Nodules bacteria extract nitrogen from the air for the benefit of soil organisms and plant growth. Winter legumes are a profitable method of maintaining nitrogen and organic levels in soils in this area. Organic matter and nitrogen are essential for profitable crop yields.

Recent showers have made conditions ideal for cover crop seeding. Livestock farmers have their grain drills running at full speed in hopes of getting early small grain pasturage. Peanut farmers will be drilling rye as soon as they get their crop out of the ground to hold their soil from the winter winds which are sure to come. Small grain for winter cover and grazing has become in recent years a major crop in our local farming systems.

In recent years due to dry falls legumes such as vetch have not been used to supplement small grain cover crops so extensively as in the past. Where moisture conditions are favorable in early fall, however, as they are at the present time, vetch is a crop that pays big dividends in forage, soil protection, and in the improvement of soil tilth.

To get maximum growth and benefit from vetch, farmers have found it necessary to follow several essential steps in its culture. Many vetch failures are caused by carelessness in the seeding operation. Vetch should be drilled in a well prepared yet firm seed bed with adequate moisture for quick germination and growth. In this area vetch is cus-

tomarily seeded at the rate of ten pounds per acre mixed with rye or oats.

The seed should always be carefully inoculated with culture C even if vetch has been grown previously on the land. Our long hot dry summers frequently reduce the number of legume bacteria in the soil. Careful inoculation along with placing the seed in moist soil where the inoculant culture can survive is an essential step in growing vetch.

Another essential factor in growing vetch is a moderate application of phosphate fertilizer. Phosphate fertilizers should be placed in the soil preferably banded with the seed. In general vetch does not respond to nitrogen fertilizer although balanced fertilizers are often used successfully.

To maintain profitable crop yields it is essential that the organic matter in the soil be maintained. Vetch has been proven in this area to be a profitable method of maintaining organic matter and increasing crop yields. Where vetch or other legumes are not used in the crop rotation extra nitrogen fertilizer should be used to properly decay heavy residue from such crops as small grain or grain sorghum.

County Pecan Show, Bake Sale Is Planned Dec. 14-15 In City

The home demonstration club will hold a bake show and sale in conjunction with the annual Eastland County Pecan Show to be held in Cisco this year on December 14 and 15, according to an announcement by Ben McKinnis, secretary of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. The county's pecan crop is bigger and better than last year's, and a large number of entries is expected for the show.

Members of the ECPGA recently voted to hold the Show in Cisco this year. The invitation was extended by Anton White and Jim Taylor, members of the agriculture committee of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, at a meeting with Association officials in Rising Star last month.

Ribbons and prizes will be awarded to the winning entries among the various varieties, and the first place winners in each of the varieties are eligible to be shown in the State Pecan Show, which will be held sometime in January at Texas A&M College.

B. G. Hancock, a state extension horticulturist who has work-

ties over the state, will head the team of judges for the show. The judging will begin on Wednesday, December 14, and continue through Thursday, December 15.

The Eastland County Pecan Show is held to stimulate and focus interest in the pecan business in the county; to publicize the various improved varieties grown throughout the county; and to call attention to the tremendous potential of commercial pecan production in the country.

Some 12 county pecan shows are held over the state each year, many of which are patterned after the Eastland County Show. Mr. McKinnis invited the people to attend.

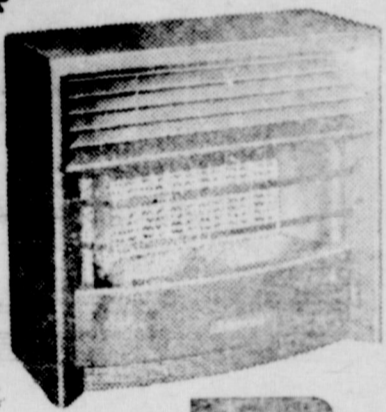
