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

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — When I come out of service next month I will be eligible as a Korea veteran for a GI home loan. Will I lose this eligibility if sign up for re-enlistment? A — No. You would not lose

A — No. You would not lose eligibility for a GI loan by reenlisting. However, you would be bound by the February 1, 1965, deadline for such a loan, like any Korea veteran.

Q = If I should add the total disability income rider to my World War II GI insurance policy, and become disabled, would the a mount my beneficiaries would receive from the policy in case of my death be reduced in any way?


A - No. Disability payments

made under the rider in no way decrease payments to beneficiaries of your GI insurance policy. Q - I am applying to VA for compensation for a disability I believe is service-connected. My service was during peacetime. If VA grants me compensation, will it be the same rate as a veteran who served during the war?

A - No. Unless your disability was incurred under extrahazardous conditions, such as simulated warfare, your compensation if allowed would be 80percent of the wartime rate.


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
