



"Up the creek about a quarter of a mile was the school house where I went to school. It also stood at the foot of a hill and on the second bank of the creek, with a spring close by where we would carry our milk and put it in the water to keep it cool until dinner time.


"Our school house was a log house with a door in one end and a window in the other end. On each side was a window. Most of the cracks between the logs were left oprecall, I was hearing Calvin en which gave good ventilation. There was no special need to stop the cracks as we never had school except in summer after the crops were laid by and before gatheringg time. We played marbles and several kinds of ball games. We loved to play what we called 'fox chase'. One boy was selected for the fox and all the other boys were dogs.

The fox was given a good start ahead of the dogs and then the dogs, consisting of 15 to 20 husky boys would be gin to run and yelp and bark as they chased the fox over the hills and hollows and a cross the fields. Finally the dogs caught the fox. It was pitiful to see the tired, worn out fox try to fight the pack. of dogs. Sometimes the dogs would almost eat the poor fox. But we always came out alive and were soon back in the school house ready to study our lessons.

"In studying we made almost as much noise as we did on the fox chase. Now you wonder how that could be. We studied out loud as we called it. The whole school would be busy, some spelling some reading, others repeating the multiplication tables and doing all kinds of study at full capacity.

"When I came to Rising Star in 1901 the school house stood about where Babe Morrison's Garage now stands. It was a two-room boxed house. The next year a framed building was built where the grammar school now is. With the kindest regards to all of you. "Levi McCollum."

To Mr. McCollum goes the credit for naming the com munity called Okra
