





# Winds force delay in space shuttle launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Fierce winds and a stubborn hatch bolt forced NASA on Monday to again scrub the launch of Challenger with schoolteacher Christa McAuliffe aboard, the second straight shuttle mission hindered by fickle Florida weather.

Although the weather was perfect at the scheduled launch time of 8:37 a.m. CST, the problems with the hatch started about an hour before that. They were not resolved until

shortly before noon when workers used a hacksaw on the bolt after contending with the late delivery of tools, a drill with a dead battery, and broken drill bits.

By the time the repairs ended, the winds strengthened and sent gusts of 30 mph whipping across a runway where Challenger would land if there were an emergency after liftoff. Winds of more than 17 mph are considered dangerous for a landing.

Launch director Gene Thomas called off the effort about 11:30 p.m., the third weather postponement in as many days for the flight.

Officials rescheduled the launch for 8:38 a.m. CST today.

The seven astronauts, including 37-year-old McAuliffe, the first ordinary citizen named to a space flight, had grim looks on their faces as they returned to their quarters.

The problems began when microswitches failed to confirm that the shuttle's hatch was closed properly. Technicians put a ring of tape around the circular opening and an engineer climbed in the cabin to verify the door would shut.

The workers then were unable to

remove a "frozen" bolt that holds a hatch handle that is not needed in flight. They called for a portable drill and a hacksaw, but only a drill was sent, and it took 35 minutes to reach the launch pad.

When the technicians tried to use the drill, they found that its battery was dead. Ten minutes later, the hacksaw and a second drill with a spare battery pack arrived. But the bolt was too hard and it chewed up the drill bit, and the bolt was finally cut away with the hacksaw after two hours of frustrating labor.

# U.S. to transmit TV programs to non-communist countries

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration plans to use satellites and cable television to get its message across to a big slice of the non-communist world.

Last April, the United States Information Agency, moving away from what one of its officials calls its "backwater" status, embraced TV technology and started beam-

ing two hours a day of television programming to European cable television systems. USIA claims it now reaches more than a million Europeans through a number of cable companies.

By the end of next year, USIA will extend the service to Latin America, Africa, the Middle East and Asia.

USIA calls its TV service "Worldnet."

Faculty members of the Texas Tech department of entomology are looking for more students to enter their master's degree program.

"Right now, we're not getting the number of applicants we would like," said James Wangberg, department chairman.

Several opportunities are available for students seeking a master's degree in entomology.

"We'd like to think more people would apply right now because we have so many openings," said Harlan Thorvilson, an assistant professor of entomology. "I have funding for at least four more (students). We might

have five or six openings immediately."

Normally, 12 to 15 students are enrolled in the graduate program, Thorvilson said. Master's degree projects may involve lab or field work in Lubbock and other parts of the state.

"Historically we've been field oriented, but that's changing a little bit as we've tried to develop some of our laboratories," Wangberg said.

"I'd say most of our research is done outside of Lubbock," Thorvilson said. "We have people working down at Justiceburg, the Tech Center at Junction, in the Kerrville area and Houston."

Thorvilson said the best opportunities for entomology research right now are in rangeland projects, horticulture and studies on the red imported fire ant.

"Some of the areas we're looking at (in horticulture) are insect pests of grapes, because grapes are an expanding industry here in West Texas, and we're studying an insect complex that spreads oak wilt (fungus) disease," Thorvilson said.

Since 1977, the Tech department of entomology has conducted research on the fire ant, a nuisance to cattle, sheep and machinery in agricultural areas, and to people and pets in urban areas. Thorvilson said that after accidentally being imported from about 1920 to 1940, the fire ant has spread from Alabama into East and Central Texas.

He said the Texas Department of Agriculture funds Tech each year to study the biology and ecology of the red imported fire ant. "One of the assignments we have from the Texas Department of Agriculture is to find out where (the fire ants) are in the

state, how extensive the population is, and so forth," he said.

Although research in that and other areas has been carried on for several years, master's degree programs usually are set up to last two years.

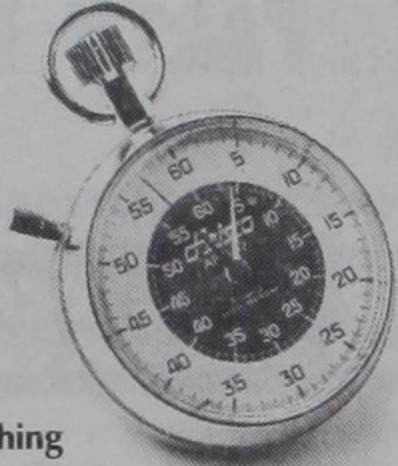
"That doesn't mean someone can't complete it in a shorter period of time," Wangberg said. "It has been done in well-planned laboratory studies that went without a hitch. Or it may take a little bit longer."

Graduate students who participate in the program receive a salary of about \$6,500 per year, and their research is funded, Thorvilson said.

Besides state funding through the college of agricultural sciences, the department receives money from the USDA, private industry and limited amounts from commodity groups, Wangberg said.

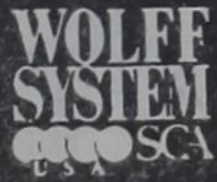

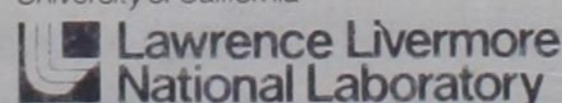

# Tech nears midway point, Myers fears 'slippage'

The Texas Tech basketball team is about to turn a corner. Tech coach Gerald Myers just hopes he doesn't see a dead end sign when the turn is completed.

Tech, 9-9 for the season, 4-3 in the Southwest Conference, will wrap up the first half of its league schedule against the Texas Longhorns Wednesday night at the Municipal Coliseum. A win would keep the Raiders in strong contention for the SWC title; a loss could put the skids on Tech's

championship run.

In his weekly press conference Monday, Myers expressed concern with his team's progress after recent losses to A&M, SMU and TCU.

"After this week, I felt like we've probably slipped a little," Myers said. "Confidence gets better if you win a one-point game, and if you lose a one-point game, it gets worse."

"Sometimes when you lose a close game or two, you have a little slippage in some areas. We've got to get ourselves back together."

The Raiders have lost three straight conference games, including a 58-57 loss to league-leading Texas

A&M Jan. 18. Since then, Tech has lost by four to SMU and eight to TCU.

"I think we went backward in these last two games and did some things that we were doing back in December and should have eliminated by now," Myers said.

Myers specifically mentioned inadequate play from the forward positions as an example of an area where Tech is lacking in offensive production.

Tech's starting forwards, Dewayne Chism and Tobin Doda, played sparingly in the Raiders' 63-55 loss to TCU. Doda logged 13 minutes of playing time against the Horned Frogs.

Chism played only one minute. Neither player scored in the game.

"I thought they (Chism and Doda) continued to make some mistakes that they should have eliminated, and I thought it was time to let somebody else play," Myers said when questioned about his starting forwards' lack of playing time.

Tech, with three league losses, is locked in a three-team tie with SMU and Houston for fourth place in the conference. Of that group, SMU has the best overall record at 12-6. Houston is 10-7 for the year after winning its past four contests.

"The race looks like six teams still have a chance," said Myers. "There's two or three at the bottom of that six that are just hanging in there with three losses—that's us and SMU. But anything can happen."

Myers said A&M's second-half schedule favors the Aggies down the stretch.

"A&M's definitely got an advantage in the schedule. They've won a couple of big road games, and they've got a good schedule in front of them," he said.

The Aggies will close out the first half of the season Wednesday against Arkansas in College Station. A&M then plays home games against contenders SMU, Tech (Feb. 19) and Houston. Myers hasn't conceded the season to the Aggies, however.

"They could stumble, and there's going to be two or three teams that should have more than four losses," he said. Mentioning possible assistance in Tech's drive for the SWC title, Myers noted two teams that could hand A&M additional losses.

"Houston played very well this week, and of course TCU looked impressive against us," he said.

# Tech tries to defy odds against No. 1 Longhorns

The Texas Tech women's basketball team must feel like the New England Patriots did Sunday before what proved to be the biggest mismatch in Super Bowl history.

The Chicago Bears were overwhelming favorites to win Super Bowl XX, and they proved the pre-game hype was more fact than fiction.

Tonight at Lubbock Municipal Coliseum, the No. 1-ranked Texas Lady Longhorns are overwhelming favorites to beat Texas Tech in a 7:30 p.m. Southwest Conference matchup.

The Raiders hope to escape with a different fate than the Patriots, but they are facing similar odds. Many observers are saying the Lady Longhorns may be the best women's

Texas' wins have come against teams ranked in the Top 20.

To make the balance sheet even more unbalanced, Texas owns a 21-0 series record against the Raiders and has won 105 consecutive games against SWC teams. Since women's basketball became recognized as a conference sport, the Lady 'Horns have seen victory in 47 straight games while winning three league titles. The last time Texas fell to a SWC team was in 1978, when Texas A&M posted a 59-52 win in College Station.

Tech is 13-4 for the season and 6-1 in SWC play, having dropped only a narrow 62-60 decision to Arkansas in Fayetteville. A victory tonight could tie the Raiders with Texas (7-0) for the league lead. Tech is unbeaten at the Coliseum in six tries this season.

"We are approaching this game with as much confidence as we can, but at the same time trying not to put any more importance on it than we need to," said Tech coach Marsha Sharp. "Winning or losing against Texas doesn't necessarily make or break the season for us."

"We're certainly going to play as hard as we can and, hopefully, do some great things. But at the same time, we realize it is not more important than any other conference game."

Texas' All-America guard Kamie Ethridge, a former standout at Lubbock Monterey, may not play against the Raiders. The 5-11 senior has suffered from a sprained right ankle much of the year and chipped a bone in her left ankle Friday before the Lady 'Horns downed Brigham Young, 111-78.

X-rays Sunday revealed no stress fracture in her left ankle, she said, but both ankles still are stiff. "But nothing I can't play on," Ethridge said. "It feels a lot better now than it

did Friday. We'll decide (today) whether I'll play."

Audrey Smith, a 5-7 senior, will substitute for Ethridge should Ethridge not play. Other Texas starters should be 6-0 senior forward Fran Harris (13.6 points a game), 6-2 junior forward Andrea Lloyd (8.2 rebounds a game), 5-8 sophomore guard Beverly Williams (10.3 ppg) and 5-11 senior center Annette Smith (10.9 ppg), a 1984 All-America who missed last season with a knee injury.

Tech will counter with 6-1 senior post Tricia Clay (18.9 ppg, 7.5 re-

bounds per game), 6-6 junior post Julia Koncak (9.8 ppg, 6.5 rpg), 5-7 senior guard Sharon Cain (13.3 ppg), 5-6 senior guard Camille Franklin (10.1 ppg) and 5-9 junior forward Lisa Wood (6.3 ppg).

Texas coach Jody Conradt said she doesn't think the Lady 'Horns will be taking the Raiders lightly.

"We have too much respect for Texas Tech and their coaching staff to do that," Conradt said. "We aren't complacent because we know that we can't play any less than our best to win."

## Bears receive hero's welcome in Windy City

CHICAGO — The triumphant Bears returned home Monday to a ticker-tape parade through the downtown financial district, where they were greeted by thousands of cheering fans who clogged the streets, waved from windows and poured tons of confetti on their heroes.

The Bears, who arrived about an hour later than expected from New Orleans, were ferried down LaSalle Street on buses as children climbed trees to catch a glimpse and paper fluttered like swirling snow in the arctic temperatures.

Fans jostled to see the players as the team headed for a rally in the downtown Daley Center.

The parade was led by Bears Coach Mike Ditka, who rode in a car with an open sun-roof. Ditka stood in the opening, raising his hands triumphantly.

Originally, plans had called for the Bears to be taken through the city in convertibles, but buses later were substituted with the downtown temperature at 8 degrees and the wind-chill factor at 29 degrees below zero.

Linebacker Brian Cabral was the first player to climb through a hatch onto the roof of one bus and begin waving to the fans. More players soon joined him, waving, passing around beer and tossing handfuls of confetti at each other.

The paper already was knee-deep in spots before the arrival of the buses, enabling fans to stage mock snowball fights with armloads of it.

Walter Payton was the only one of the Bears' nine Pro Bowl players who turned out for the homecoming celebration. Not attending because of the Feb. 2 game at Honolulu were Jimbo Covert, Jay Hilgenberg, Richard Dent and Mike Singletary, all Pro Bowl starters, and Dave Dueron, Otis Wilson, Dan Hampton and Jim McMahon, all reserves for the all-star game.

Robert Kelley, director of the Bureau of Management Information for Chicago's public schools, acknowledged that some students would opt for the parade instead of afternoon classes.

"I think if I were a kid, I'd do it," he said.
