Nov. 8 Deadline For Overseas Surface Mail

Postmaster Arduth Been announced dates for mailing parcels to armed forces personnel overseas, in order to assure delivery by Christmas.

For parcels sent by surface transportation, mail between Oct. 13 and Nov. 9.

SAM (space available parcel airift) mail between Oct. 20 and Nov. 22. (SAM carries the same rates as surface transportation, but parcels must not be more than 60 inches in combined length and girth or weigh more than five pounds.)

PAL (parcel airift), mail between Oct. 27 and Nov. 23. (PAL is surface transportation rate, plus a dollar. Parcels must not be more than 60 inches in combined length and girth or weigh more than 70 pounds.)

Airmail, sent between December 1 and December 13.

The Garden Spot

Over 200 4-H members in Eastland County and about 100,000 other 4-H'ers in Texas observed National 4-H Club Week, Oct. 5-11.

The purpose of 4-H work is to give equal training to the Head, Heart, Hands and Health of young people and to help prepare them to be better leaders and citizens who will fit into society where their life's work may take them.

4-H is a part of the educational program of the Texas A&M Extension Service and is supervised on the county level by the county extension agents along with help of 19,000 local volunteer 4-H leaders who are outstanding men and women in their local communities.

Congratulations to three Eastland County 4-H boys who won premium money for doing the best job managing their swine projects. Jack Jackson of Gorman won first, Robert Lewis, of Dadecona, second and Clay Keller of Olden, third. They won \$12, \$9, and \$8, respectively. The swine program has been sponsored by the Sears Foundation. Over 200 Eastland county 4-H boys have been helped by being given registered pigs over the past 30 years.

The Sears Foundation has cancelled the program so the popular and valuable program ends with the presentation of the best management awards this week.

Three Cisco girls are exhibiting livestock at the State Fair in Dallas Oct. 13-17. Lynne Pippen and Caryn Lee are showing steers while Debbie Wheat is exhibiting lambs. Many of the earlier

planted peanuts are being harvested now. The higher the quality of the crop the higher the price it can command. Because of the importance of the quality in determining the final price here are some suggestions for handling the crop.

Wait until the crop is fully mature before harvesting. There will be fewer damaged nuts, less harvesting and drying trouble and quality will be better. Mature peanuts ready for digging have darkened veins and brown stains inside the shell and have pink and papery seed coats.

Curing is a critical step in the production of quality peanuts. Curing reduces the moisture content of the nuts. It allows completion of normal ripening, produces optimum flavor and resistance to mold damage.

The peanut combine needs regular adjustments. In the morning when vines are tough, the combine should be set to give more picking action. As the vines dry the picking action should be reduced to minimize mechanical injury and shelling. Excessive shelling and injury increases the chances of mold growth.

During the last half of October Eastland County farmers will receive crop questionnaires from Gary Palmer of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers for providing an accurate picture of Texas agriculture. Each farmer receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin.

Farmers Asked To Return Crop Reports Sought

During the last half of October some 35,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop questionnaire from Cary Palmer, state statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin. This is a joint endeavor of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, U.S.D.A., to provide a program of county estimates for Texas, it was explained.

There are 254 counties in Texas and each farmer in each county is an important part of the state's agriculture. Reports are needed from farmers receiving questionnaires to provide accurate estimates for Texas crops.

Each farmer was urged to fill out his questionnaire carefully and return it promptly in the self-addressed envelope to the agriculture statistician. This will do much to provide the accurate data needed for the State.

County data bulletins for 1963 are now available by writing the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Box 70, Austin, or by writing John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, P. O. Drawer BB, Capitol Station Austin, Texas.

It Has Been

Editor's Note: The following item is taken from *The Rising Star*, a column written by Vada Arnold and titled "It Has Been."

When the "Ward School Wildcat Kittens" news from the Grammar School for 1933-34 was printed in the *Rising Star Record*, Mary Louise Bradley was editor-in-chief.

Assistant editors were Lee Ella Howell and Neil Barnes; Edward Watkins was sports editor; Willie Jack Smith was joke editor and Miss Madelle Joyce was advisor.

During the month of March of that year the Sixth grade asked various people to write letters about their school days for publication in the "Kitten Tales." The first letter to appear came from the late Tom Butler, father of Roy, Ray and Keith Butler. Mr. Butler wrote: "Dear Students: My first school days were spent at

Hickman school, a one-room building four miles west of *Rising Star*. This room was divided into two rooms by means

of ducking curtains. There was only one entrance to the building so the "High School" pupils had to pass through the

Ward School in entering and leaving the building. You can well imagine the confusion and disadvantage this caused.

Our drinking fountain was very sanitary—it being a five-gallon tin bucket with a long handled dipper. These were located in one corner of the room on the floor. Everyone drank from the same dipper.

The teaching facilities consisted of two long pointers (when they could be found) and an armful or hackberry switches which could be found any time and used frequently.

The desks were handmade and seated a dozen or more children, depending on size. The boys sat on one side of the room and the girls on the other. This rule prevailed during play time also.

Friday afternoons the last period was spent in what was known as spelling matches or "speeches", this being the only entertainment we had.

Some times due to lack of time, the teacher would ask me to hear a lesson in the lower grades. One instance, I Hodnett's spelling lesson and being anxious to report a perfect lesson, I assisted him by letting him look on the book as I gave out the words. That was years ago. I'm sure the methods of teaching have changed.

School 'took up' at 8 o'clock and 'turned out' at 4 in

the afternoon provided we didn't have to stay in for something or other. Some of us were more fortunate than others for we had lots of over-time to our credit.

Some of the teachers who taught at the Hickman school were A. L. McDonald, Burette Gray, Mrs. Sam Graves, Hob Gray and John Canafax.

On March 9, a letter from Levi McCollum, father of the late E. B. (Bulis) McCollum, addressed to the Sixth grade, described his school days.

Dear Pupils: When I was a little boy and lived with my parents in a big white house by the side of the road at the mouth of a hollow with hills on either side of the hollow, on one hill was a family cemetery and on the other was a Negro cabin. There were poplar blossoms, walnuts, chestnuts and nearly all kinds of nuts and all kinds of grapes and berries growing wild, and we boys had lots of fun gathering and eating these wild fruits. On the other side of the house was a field and at the far side of the field was a creek where we had oodles of fun fishing and going in swimming.
