Texas Safe Driving Insurance Plan Becomes Effective Jan. 1

AUSTIN — Approximately 73% of Texas motorists have had spotless driving records for the past three years. When this is related to insured automobiles, 57% of the insured automobiles will qualify for a 20% reduction on their automobile insurance when the Texas Safe Driving Insurance Plan becomes effective January 1, according to a statement by Penn J. Jackson, chairman, State Board of Insurance.

An analysis of the records of 40,365 Texas drivers showed that 89.05% of the drivers had driven the past three years without an accident and that 79.04% of the drivers were not convicted of moving traffic violation offenses during the same period. The study also disclosed that 72.92% of all drivers had neither motor vehicle offenses nor accidents in their records.

"The vast majority of Texas drivers will be looking forward with great enthusiasm to this new Plan which puts the burden of insurance costs on the careless driver, while giving a just and fair reward to those who have

not had accidents or convictions. The Texas Safe Driving Insurance Plan was adopted after repeated requests from State motorists who felt that their safe driving records, and the safe driving records of the other members of their family, entitled them to a reduction in their insurance rates," Jackson said.

The Safe Driving Insurance Plan applies to all automobiles eligible for insurance under the Family Automobile Policy and provides for a 20% discount from the regular insurance rates when each member of the household has driven without an accident or a conviction for a moving traffic violation for the past three years.

An estimated 57% of all automobiles, now insured under the Family Automobile Policy, will become eligible for a 20% discount after January 1. Approximately 16% of the automobiles will continue to be insured at present rates, as some member of the household will have received one point under the Plan.

"A study of Texas accident records has demonstrated that a relationship exists between highway accidents and convictions for

Vets Questions and Answers

Q — I am thinking of using my right under the Korean GI Bill to attend college this Fall, but am not sure of the course of study I should pursue. Can I get help from the VA in choosing the right course?

A — Yes. You can obtain expert assistance from VA in planning a course of study under the Korean GI Bill. The VA will set up a session of vocational counseling for you, to help you determine scientifically what you do best. You should make application for VA vocational counseling early, if you plan to attend school this fall.

Q — The VA is deducting my GI insurance premium payments out of the disability compensation payments I receive. I am moving and am sending a notice of my change of address to the office which forwards my compensation. Should I also notify the VA insurance office?

A — Yes. In case of change of address, where premiums are being deducted from compensation payments, veterans should notify both the office which sends the compensation checks and the one handling insurance.

CREOLE CHICKEN JAMBALAYA

Ingredients:
8 strips of bacon, coarsely diced
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/2 cup diced celery
1 No. 2 can tomatoes (2 1/2 cups)
2 cups chicken stock (or 2 cups water and 2 chicken bouillon cubes)
1/2 cup uncooked rice
2 1/2 cups cooked diced chicken
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 bay leaf

METHOD: Cook the bacon several minutes in a large saucepan or soup kettle. Add the onion, green pepper and celery. Cook until the bacon is crisp. Add the tomatoes, chicken stock, rice, salt, pepper and bay leaf. Bring to a vigorous boil.

Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover with a lid and leave over this low heat for 14 minutes. Remove bay leaf. Serve hot.

This recipe makes 10 servings.

BAYOU COUNTRY SHRIMP JAMBALAYA

Ingredients:
2 tablespoons fat
1 tablespoon flour
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 clove garlic, minced fine
1 cup canned tomatoes
1/2 cup water
1 green pepper, chopped fine
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon red pepper
1/4 teaspoon thyme
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
3 cups cooked rice
2 cups cooked shrimp, cut in pieces
1 cup tomato juice
1/2 cup grated cheese
2 tablespoons parsley

METHOD: Melt fat in skillet, stir in flour and blend thoroughly. Add the onions and cook until the onions are tender. Add garlic, tomatoes, water, green pepper, salt, red pepper, thyme and Worcestershire sauce. Cook until pepper is tender. Stir occasionally. Add rice, shrimp and tomato juice. Pour into a greased baking dish. Sprinkle the cheese and parsley over the top. Place in a 350° F. oven for 15 minutes.

This recipe makes 6 servings.

SOUTHERN JAMBALAYA

Ingredients:
2 tablespoons fat
1 cup finely chopped onion
1 cup finely chopped green pepper
2 cloves garlic, minced fine
1 cup diced cooked chicken
1 cup diced cooked ham
12 tiny pork sausages, cut in pieces
1 No. 2 can tomatoes (2 1/2 cups)
1 cup uncooked rice
2 1/2 cups chicken stock (or 2 cups water and 2 chicken bouillon cubes)
1/2 teaspoon thyme
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
1/4 teaspoon chill powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon black pepper

METHOD: Melt fat in a large saucepan. Add onion, green pepper and garlic. Cook slowly, stirring often until onions and pepper are tender. Add chicken, ham, sausages. Cook 5 minutes longer. Add tomatoes, uncooked rice, chicken stock, thyme, chopped parsley, chill powder, salt and black pepper. Place this mixture in a large greased cas-

serole. Cover and place in oven at 350° F. for 50 minutes or until rice is done and liquid is absorbed.

This recipe makes 8 servings.

RICE VEGETABLE JAMBALAYA

Ingredients:

1 cup uncooked rice
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 pound mushrooms, sliced
1/2 cup sliced onions
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/2 cup chopped celery
3 cups broth, stock, canned bouillon or consommé, or water
2 cups canned tomatoes
1/2 bay leaf
1/2 teaspoon chili pepper
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of red pepper
1/4 teaspoon thyme

METHOD: Heat butter or margarine in a heavy skillet. Add dry, uncooked rice. Cook, stirring constantly about 10 minutes or until lightly browned.

Add mushrooms, onion, green pepper and celery. Cook until vegetables are soft and lightly browned.

Add remaining ingredients. Simmer over low heat, only partly covered, about 40 minutes or until the rice is tender. If a thicker mixture is preferred, remove cover entirely and continue cooking for a few minutes longer until the liquid has cooked down to the desired thickness. This recipe makes 8 servings.

PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE:

To make 3 liberal cups of fluffy rice, put 1 cup of uncooked rice, 2 cups of cold water and 1 teaspoon of salt into a 2 quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover saucepan with a lid and leave over this low heat for 14 minutes. Do not remove lid nor stir rice while it is cooking. Turn off the heat.

Use exact measurements of uncooked rice and water. Time the cooking accurately.

For real convenience and economy of time and effort, keep uncooked rice in the refrigerator in a covered container at all times. Use it for many quick delicious and inexpensive soups, salads, casserole dishes, hot breads and desserts.

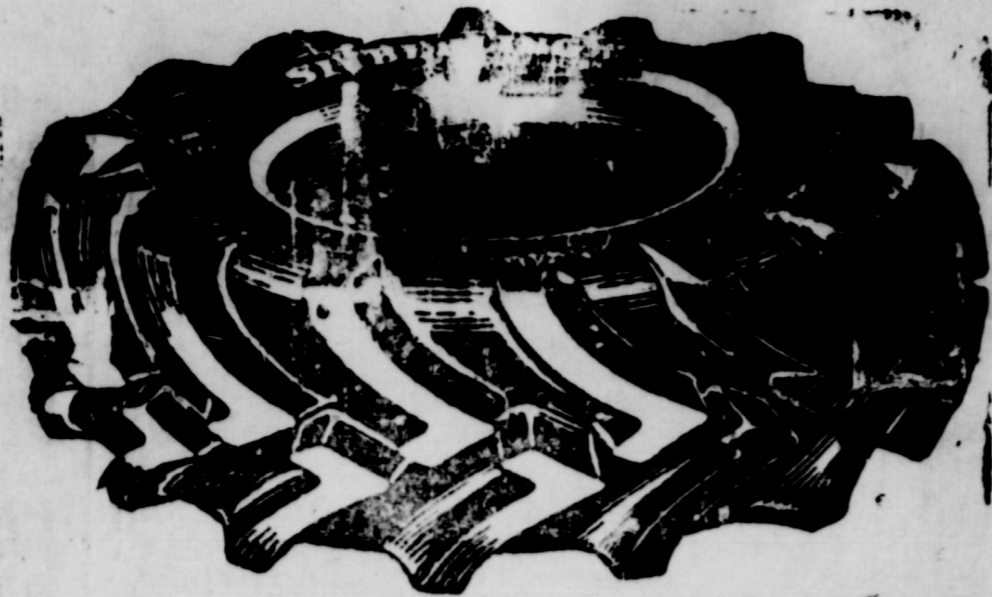
DEEP SOUTH CRAWFISH PIE

Ingredients:

3 cups meat from crawfish, lobster or shrimp
3 cups cooked rice (see recipe above)
1 10 1/2 ounce can condensed cream of mushroom soup
1 cup water
1/4 cup celery leaves, chopped
2 bay leaves
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 egg yolks, hard cooked
3 slices of bread spread with butter or margarine
Paprika

METHOD: Mix together the hot meat, rice, mushroom soup, water, celery leaves, bay leaves, salt and pepper. Pour into a greased baking dish. Arrange the egg yolks over the top. Remove the crusts from the slices of bread and cut each slice into four triangles. Arrange the eight bread triangles in a circle on top of the meat and rice mixture. This makes an interesting design on top of the dish. Sprinkle paprika over the top of the dish. Place uncovered in a 350° F. oven for 40 minutes or until the mixture is thoroughly heated and the bread is toasted. This recipe makes 8 servings.

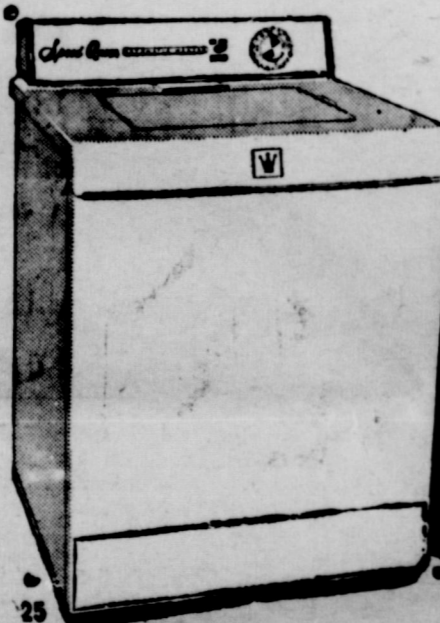

Continued from first page moving traffic violations. A driver who runs up a record of convictions has a much greater chance of being involved in a serious accident than the motorist who drives his car in a lawful manner. The group of drivers with three motor vehicle offenses in their record had six times as many accidents as drivers with no traffic violations. Drivers whose record contain six or more motor vehicle offenses had nine times as many accidents as those drivers without any moving traffic violations," Jackson concluded.

Under the Texas Safe Driving Insurance Plan four points are assigned for convictions of any of the following moving traffic law violations:

1. Driving while intoxicated;
2. Hit-and-run;
3. Negligent homicide involving a motor vehicle.

One point is assigned for other moving traffic violations, but no points are assigned for defective lights, defective mufflers, parking violations and other relatively minor offenses.

Basically, two points are assigned for each accident involving \$25 damage to property or the injury of a person. No points are assessed for accidents involving:

1. Medical payments coverage only.
2. Damage to your vehicle while you are legally parked.
3. Accidents for which you have been reimbursed by or on behalf of a person responsible for accident.
4. Accident in which only the other party has been convicted of a moving traffic violation.
5. Rear-end collision in which you have been struck in rear by another vehicle and in which you have NOT been convicted of moving traffic violation.
6. Hit-and-run accident in which your car is damaged by "hit-and-run" operator IF you report the accident to proper authorities within 24 hours.

All companies writing automobile insurance at rates prescribed by the Texas State Board of Insurance must use the Texas Safe Driving Plan when insuring automobiles eligible for the Family Automobile Policy.

TB Association Urges Regular Chest Checkups

MCALLEN — "If there were a hundred thousand unknown people running around with delayed action bombs in their pockets, the whole country would be in a panic," Zeb Rike of McAllen, president of the Texas Tuberculosis Association, commented. "Well, in a way there are. There are that many people, unknown to health authorities, who have infectious cases of tuberculosis and are passing this extremely dangerous illness on to others.

"Some of these people are the derelicts of Skid Row, the drifters, the hoboes. It's a tough job to get hold of them long enough to give them tuberculin tests and chest X-rays. But with some of the money contributed for Christmas Seals, efforts are being made to find some of these walking TB threats in the flop houses where they sometimes stay.

"But many others are responsible citizens, no different from you or your neighbors. They can be warned and urged. But they, too, are difficult to get hold of for tuberculin tests and chest X-rays. And so they, too, never find out that they have tuberculosis.

When recognizable symptoms finally show up, it may be too late for life-saving treatment, or so much lung damage may have been done that the patient will never be really well again. That's why you are so often urged, from all sides, to get an annual medical check-up, with a tuberculin test or chest X-ray, to detect this insidious disease in its early stages. When TB is found early, treatment is almost always successful and may take only a few months. And there is little danger of infecting those around," Mr. Rike concluded.

'Dimes' Opens First Birth Defects Center

A birth defects study center, the first of its kind designed to combine clinical treatment with research and teaching, has just been officially opened at Columbus, Ohio. It is supported by funds from the New March of Dimes, which is now engaged in its January campaign for contributions to fight three major crippling diseases including, besides birth defects, arthritis and polio.

Medical experts say that birth defects are the biggest unmet childhood medical problem in the United States today. There are more than 600 different kinds of birth defects, or "congenital malformations," as they are called by doctors. They range all the way from harelip and clubfoot to mental retardation.

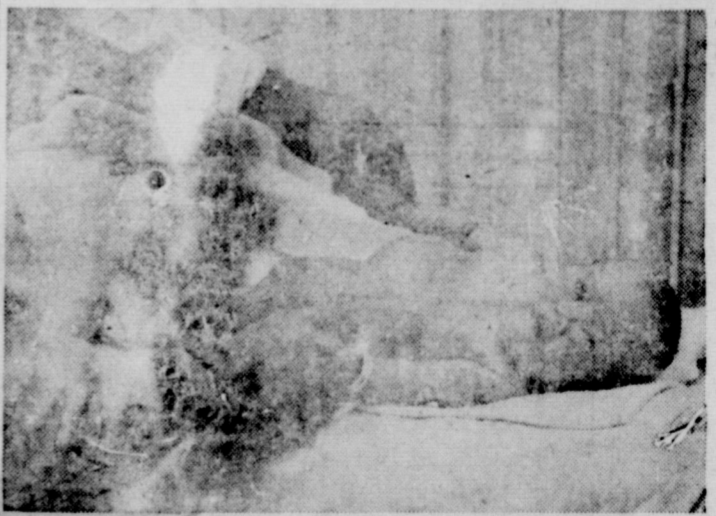
Some 250,000 American babies are born each year with one or more significant birth defects; and about half of this number are doomed to a lifetime of serious illness or crippling. About 34,000 infants each year are stillborn because of these afflictions, or die within the first month of life. Medical science as yet has few clues to the causes of these disorders that occur before birth; and there are few known methods of prevention.

Shrouded in Superstition
The study center in Columbus' famed Children's Hospital thus represents the beginning of the New March of Dimes attempt to solve a medical problem that has heretofore been largely neglected by research. It is a problem that has for centuries been shrouded in fear, superstition and shame. By tackling this issue with a three-pronged program of research, patient aid and training of skilled medical professionals, the March of Dimes organization seeks to bring hope to the hundreds of thousands of parents whose lives have been blighted by bewildering grief and heartbreak following the birth of a malformed child.

This hope is bolstered by the best record of the March of Dimes organization in fighting baffling diseases. It was March of Dimes funds that encouraged Dr. Jonas E. Salk to become a virologist and that

produced his world-celebrated vaccine against crippling polio.

Some Can Be Helped
Certain major birth defects, such as "water on the brain" (hydrocephalus) and "open spine" (spina bifida), can now sometimes be corrected by new techniques of surgery, medical experts at the March of Dimes organization report.

Through the combination of treatment, teaching and study at the Columbus Birth Defects Study Center and others the March of Dimes hopes to establish and support, it is believed that new knowledge will be obtained and spread so that the devastating effects of these disorders may eventually, for the most part, be prevented or controlled.
