Tech prof says Reagan officials botched hostage efforts

Press' Middle East bureau. Despite several videotapes of Anderson that have been released by captors, no confirmation has been received regarding Sutherland's condition, Murray said.

Although the intentions were good, the Reagan administration pursued the wrong channels in working for the release of U.S. hostages in the Middle East, according to a Texas Tech law professor whose brother-in-law is a hostage in Beirut.

John Murray, whose sister is married to American hostage Thomas Sutherland, said he was encouraged that Reagan was willing to negotiate with his brother-in-law's captors but added that critical errors were made in the dealings.

"Negotiation with arms is simply not something you do," Murray said. "In addition, you do not just give in to terrorists."

Jean Sutherland, Murray's sister, lives in Beirut and is working actively with the U.S. State Department to win John Murray the freedom of the hostages, he said.

PUF profits through stock investments

AUSTIN (AP) - While Texas' economy suffered because of heavy dependence on the oil industry, the Permanent University Fund continued to grow at a vigorous pace because of stock market investments, officials said.

The surge in stock profits was more than enough to offset the drop in mineral revenue, and managers of the fund are aiming at continuing that pattern.

Managers also are trying to further diversify the sources of income for the PUF to replace the large amounts of money that once poured in from 2.1 million acres scattered through the West Texas oil fields.

The fund is the public endowment of the University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems. Its profits from the stock market, in the 1985-86 fiscal year which ended Aug. 31, exceeded its income from mineral royalties for only the second time in the 30 years that the fund has been allowed to invest in stocks.

Committee schedules top Legislature

AUSTIN (AP) - Lawmakers return from a three-day weekend today to find the longest committee schedules of the 1987 Legislature.

Few major issues have reached the debate state yet in the 140-day session.

The House and Senate budget bills have not been prepared, although committees apparently are getting close, and no agreement has been reached between the two houses on raising taxes.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has warned legislators for the second time against counting on a state lottery to bail them out of their budget predicament.

Today's agenda for the Senate Economic Development included 57 measures, 45 of which are in subcommittee.

Swimmer missing after crocodile attack

PERTH, Australia (AP) - A large crocodile attacked an American woman swimming in a remote river, grabbed her and disappeared, police said Sunday. The woman is missing and believed dead.

Police reported that the woman was swimming between a rubber raft and a yacht anchored in the mouth of the Prince Regent River in the northern part of Western Australia when the attack occurred. The area is known for its large salt-water crocodiles.

The 9-foot-long beast had not been sighted since the attack, said a police official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.



Schools deny 'dangerous' label

Campus crime

Michigan State officials, in the wake of five sexual assault cases in four weeks, have been kept busy denying that their campus was the most dangerous one in America even as University of California officials were denying that their campuses, too, were the most dangerous.

A series of local newspaper reports charged that Federal Bureau of Investigation statistics proved MSU had the highest campus crime rate in the nation in 1985.

Yet on the West Coast, a California state commission was claiming Berkeley and UCLA had the nation's highest campus crime rates.

The FBI, which compiles nationwide campus crime statistics in its annual "Crime in the United States" report, said both sets of critics may be wrong.

comparing apples and oranges, said J. Harper Wilson, the agency's crime reporting program chief. Each school seems to have "vary-

ing procedures reporting and taking care of crime," Wilson said. For that reason, said FBI editor

Ann Graham, "We don't rank (campuses) or make comparisons."

A footnote in the FBI report cautions against using the data - in which campuses are listed by state, together with the number of crimes that were reported on them - to make "any inter-campus comparisons," Graham said.

"We have no control over how people draw conclusions from our statistics," she said.

As a result, the Commission on California State Government Organization and Economy - also called the Little Hoover Commission - three weeks ago issued a Comparing campus crimes from report calling the Berkeley and Los Angeles campuses of the University of California system the most crime-ridden in the nation.

Commission Chairman Nathan Shapell said he was shocked to learn the California system spends only \$12 million a year to keep its nine campuses secure.

But campus administrators were quick to disagree.

"The people who study and work here don't face a high risk of becoming victims of crime, despite what has been said and written lately," Berkeley Chancellor Ira Heyman wrote in an open letter two weeks ago.

The Little Hoover Commission's report, said UCLA Assistant Vice Chancellor John Barber, was wrong because it focused solely on state universities.

Such a focus, he said, left out private campuses such as Columbia in New York and the University of Chicago, both of which are located in high-crime areas.





Tech women turn back Raiders dominate Invitational

A stadium record and two qualifications for the NCAA Outdoor Championships in May were just a sampling of the performances turned in by the Red Raider track teams at the Texas Tech Invitational Saturday at the R.P. Fuller Track.

Although no official scoring was kept, the men's team battled strong winds to win 10 of the 17 events in its division, which included teams from Abilene Christian, Angelo State, Lubbock Christian, UT-El Paso, Wayland Baptist and Tech. The women's team came away with five victories against ACU, Angelo State, LCC, Ranger, UTEP and Wayland.

In the men's 100-meters, Leonard Harrison broke the meet record and track record held by former Tech track and football standout Carl Carter with an electronic time of 10.20. Harrison's clocking also was fast enough to eclipse the NCAA qualifying standard of 10.29.

"I didn't think it was that fast at all," Harrison said.
