SANTA ARRIVES SATURDAY Gala Parade Planned

Santa Claus is expected to arrive in Muleshoe on Saturday, December 5, and a gala parade is planned for the occasion. The Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce has announced the Annual Christmas Parade will begin at 3 p.m. next Saturday afternoon, December 5.

Santa will appear in the parade, after which he will receive visits from youngsters at his "Santa's Workshop", to be located on the west side of the courthouse.

Entries are being sought for the festive parade, and cash prizes will be offered for best decorated vehicle or trailer, best decorated bicycle, best individual costume, best costumed pet, and best novelty.

Antique cars, mounted riders, musical groups, industrial units, trucks, and tractors will also be welcomed. The Mighty M Band

is expected to lead the procession.

While Christmas lights are decorative, and fine examples of community spirit, they are also an annual fire hazard. Chief Ladd is confident that any faults in the system will be reported to him at once, so that they may not develop into fires. By the way, Chief Ladd would also like to remind youngsters that turning in a false fire alarm is a violation of the law.

SHE HOLDS IMPORTANT JOB

If an emergency strikes at your home and you dial the number of the Muleshoe City Police, chances are you will be answered by charming Margaret Mercer, Police Dispatcher at Police Headquarters.

Margaret joined the force in August, moving to Muleshoe from Friona with her four children, Venita (13), Neil (11), Melita (9) and Karen (7).

Margaret received her education in Childress and Dimmitt Schools, qualifying for the responsible position she now holds. There are no fewer than eight units on Margaret's circuit; she is thus able to establish immediate contact with the Sheriff's Office, the Highway Patrol, the Ambulance, the Fire Department and, of course, the Police Department. In recent months, many of the accidents which plague our area highways have been handled efficiently.

ently, thanks to Margaret's prompt action in relaying information to responsible officials. As Margaret reminds herself during the lonely hours when she is in charge, a life or lives may well depend on her watchfulness.

A dispatcher's duties may be full of variety. One call may be to the Highway Patrol to intercept a speeding motorist; another may be for assistance in the recovery of a lost dog. Sometimes incoming telephone calls may be so excited and nervous that Margaret must exercise great patience and calm, so that she may relay the message calmly and concisely. You may be sure that if ever occasion arises for you to "Call the Police", and if Margaret is the Dispatcher, your message will pass at once to the proper officer so that he may act immediately.

Yule Mails Speeding Up

Muleshoe area residents are already showing their determination to see that their Service relatives overseas do not receive their Christmas parcels too late for Christmas. Postmaster Spencer Beavers reports that he is pleasantly surprised at the number of "early-bird" parcels from Muleshoe which are already speeding to their destination by surface route or by air. Those who have some last minute packages — and who among us doesn't — are reminded that Air-mail packages are now the only ones which will be certain to arrive overseas in time for Christmas.

Postmaster Beavers does not consider it necessary to increase his staff with temporary help this year. He states that his staff of 16, including City and Rural carriers, will probably be working double shifts, depending on the volume of mail, from this week until Christmas. Beavers and his staff are agreed that this system is more efficient than taking on temporary help, especially in a community as cooperative as ours.

\$50,000 WING FOR HOSPITAL MAYOR OPENS TODAY

Today (Sunday) a new \$50,000 wing will be opened at the West Plains Hospital at Muleshoe. The building will be formally declared open by Mayor, W. B. LeVeque, who will cut a ribbon to signify the event promptly at 12:30 a.m. Also taking part in the ceremony will be Chamber of Commerce President Roger Albertson, City Manager Albert Fields and Chamber of Commerce Manager Roy Davis. All arrangements for the ceremony are under the aegis of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce.

The dedicatory invocation will be delivered by Rev. Don Murray, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Muleshoe.

The new wing of the hospital will house new administrative offices, a Nurses' station, a new patient unit. Each of these new patient units will have individual air-conditioning control; arrangements are also being made for the installation of private telephones, radio and television. Each patient unit will be equipped with a Veri-Hite bed, the most modern type of hospital bed, capable of being raised or lowered electrically with a minimum of manual operation.

Hospital Administrator Ed Faust states that as soon as the new wing is in full operation, and patients now in the older section can be moved to the new building, renovation work will begin on the older section of the hospital.

Dr. B. O. McDaniel, of the hospital, told the Journal that this magnificent addition to the

welfare of our Community is being financed entirely by private effort, with no Federal or State assistance. When it is realized that the new Nursing Home, built at a cost of some \$65,000, was opened as recently as last March, Muleshoe may well be proud of its up-to-date hospital facilities.

Increase in water - wells this year

The dry and windy spring, plus a dry summer, has led to an increase in Bailey and Farmer Counties of water wells drilled in 1964, reports the Lubbock office of the High Plains Underground Conservation District.

In Bailey County permits were issued for the drilling of 103 wells, of which 88 have so far been drilled, and in Farmer County there were 213 permits and 207 wells already drilled.

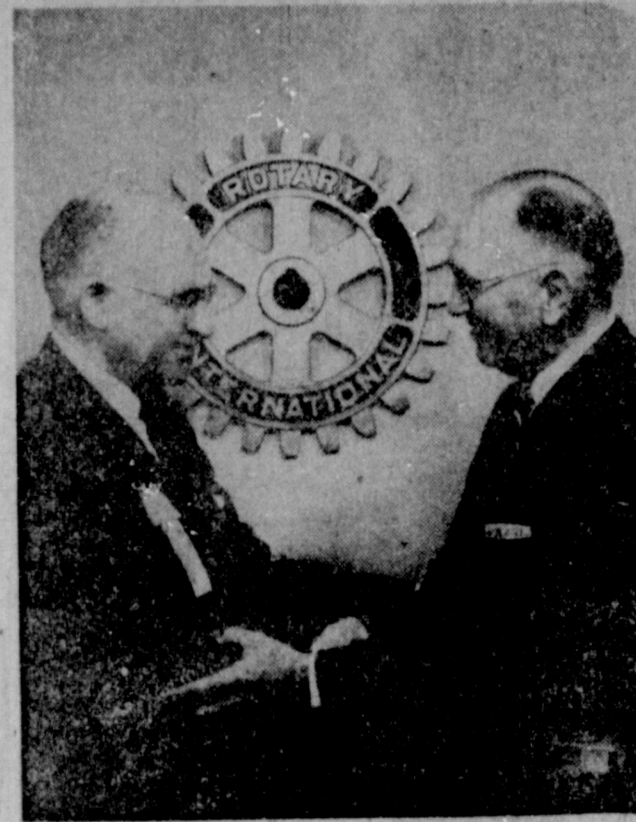

The Clawsons received many pretty and useful gifts for their new home.

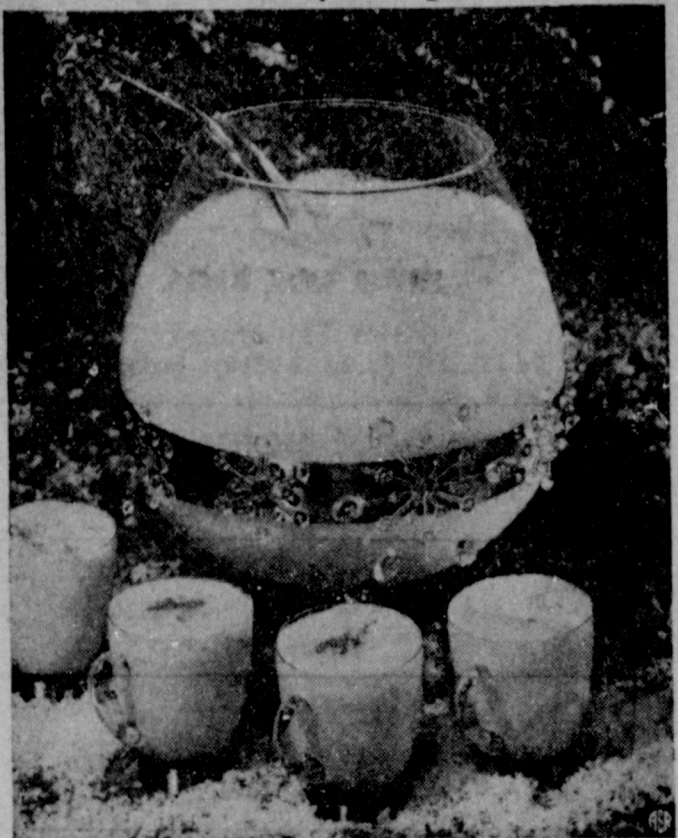
The evening was spent in visiting and viewing the home.

For the inside of the bowl, prepare an easy punch of applesauce, cream, lemonade concentrate and sherbet made effervescent with the addition of sparkling 7-Up. It's light, smooth and delicious!

Snowflake Apple Punch

2 cups applesauce 1 pint lemon sherbet
1 pint light cream 6 bottles (7 ounces each)
1 can (6 ounces) frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed 7-Up, chilled
Nutmeg

Combine applesauce and cream in punch bowl. Slowly stir in lemonade concentrate. Add scoops of sherbet. Slowly add 7-Up. Sprinkle with nutmeg, if desired. Makes about 24 (4 ounce) servings.

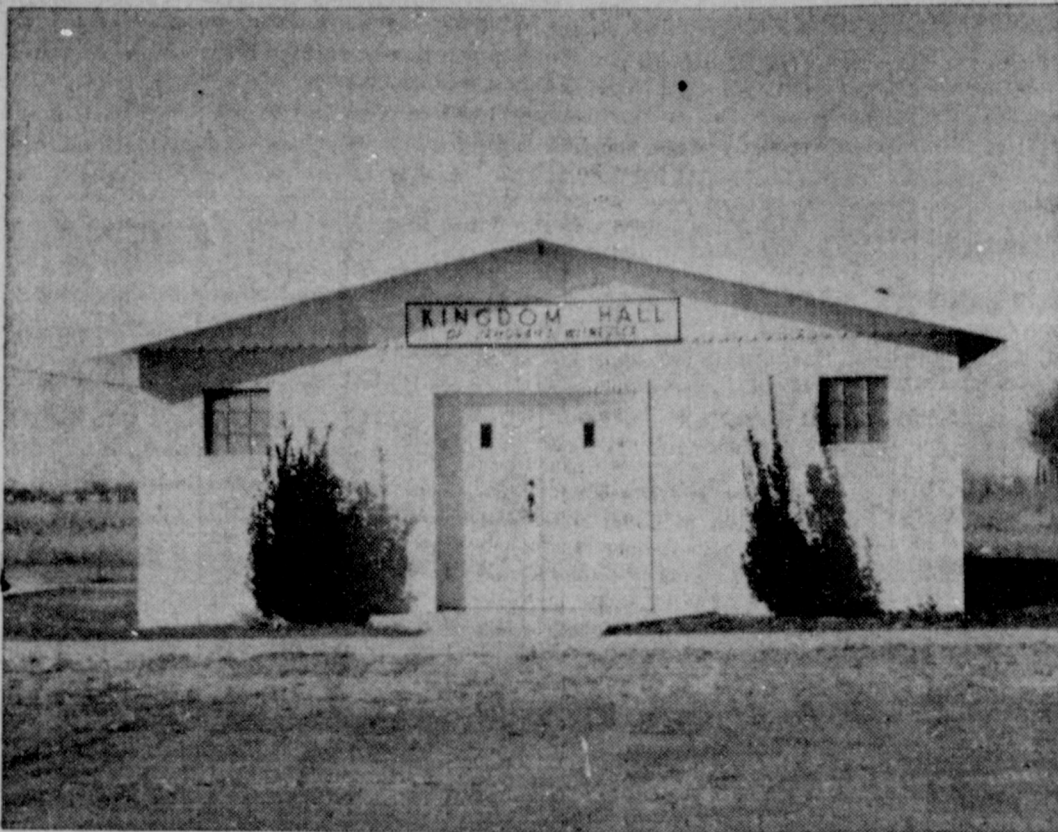

8-1-1 record, losing only to Guthrie, but being tied by Saults 23-28 in the season's first game.

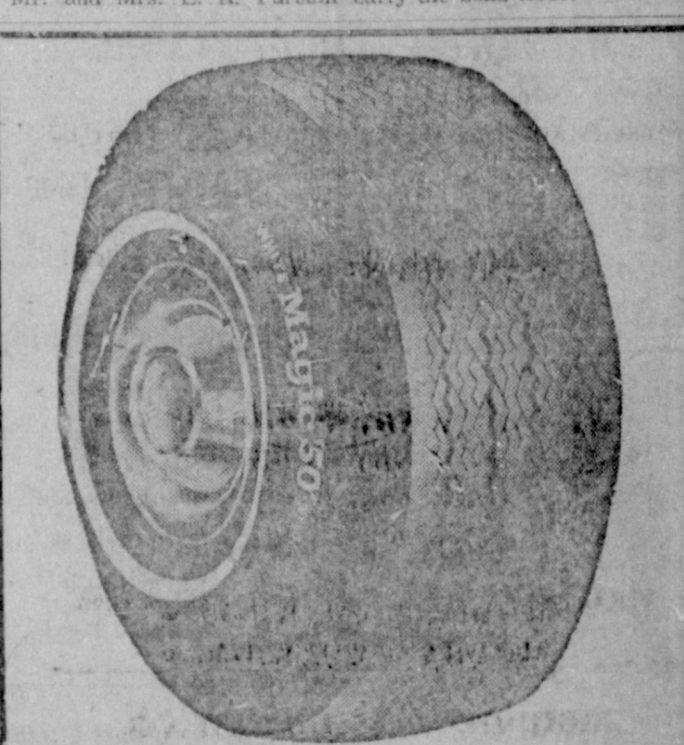
Loans available To Farmers

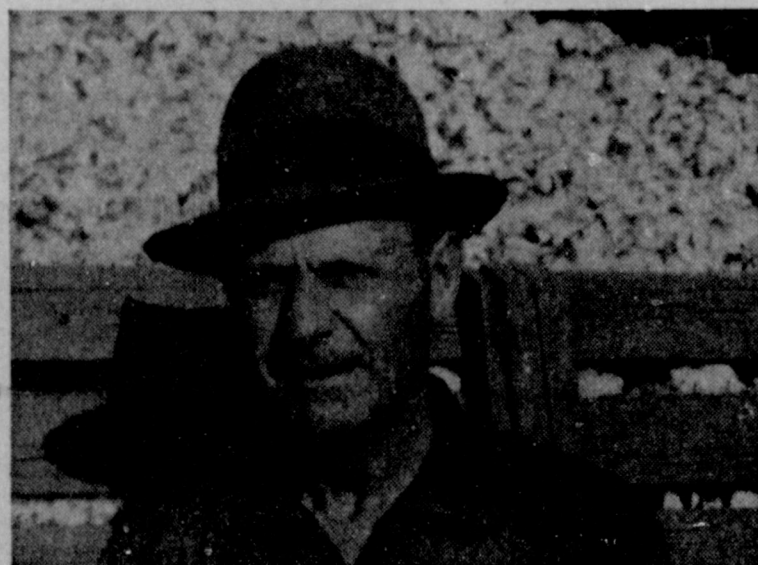

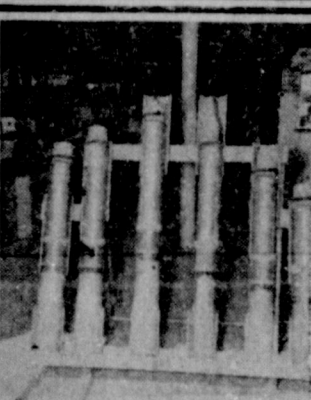

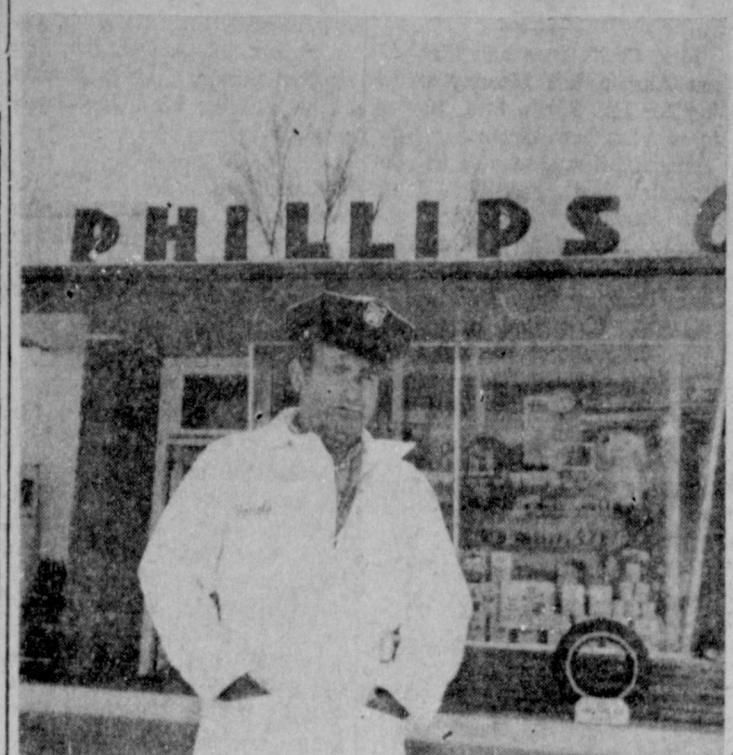

state law cut the jurors allowed in a criminal trial from 12 to 8. The U. S. Supreme Court said that no such law could apply to past crimes. A person accused might be put to a disadvantage.

The ex post facto clause applies only to legislative acts, not to new court interpretations. One law changed the punishment for murder from hanging to electrocution. The courts held the law valid. It did not change the punishment.

The procedure for the trial, or the rules of evidence may be revised if they do not add punishment or take away a protection.
