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South Korean leader to meet with Seoul rioters

SEOUL, South Korea - President Chun Doo-hwan made a dramatic reversal Monday after nearly two weeks of violent street protests, agreeing to meet with opposition leaders and consider demands for democratic reform.

His opponents insisted all political detainees be freed before the talks, expected later this week. Police say at least 8,000 people have been arrested since antigovernment agitation began June 10 and thousands remain in jail.

There were fewer reports Monday of protests and fights with riot police. Most of the violence occurred at

universities.

Thousands of students hurling firebombs and rocks battled police around at least four Seoul campuses and protesters briefly overran at least one riot squad. Police fired volley after volley of tear gas and attacked with ar- many of the people detained since June 10, when the rulmored cars.

The president said he would be willing to meet with Kim Young-sam, head of the Reunification Democratic Party, and other opposition groups and would consider opposition.

News reports said the government would release ing party endorsed Roh's candidacy and protests began, and that Chun and Kim were expected to meet in two or three days.

The political violence is the worst since Chun gained demands for reform. Kim's party is the main political power after President Park Chung-hee was assassinated in 1979. The United States, which has 40,000 Chun's foes demand direct presidential elections, but soldiers in South Korea, has urged both sides to resume talks and avoid violence.

Gaston Sigur, assistant secretary of state and Washington's top Asian policy official, was due in Seoul

on Tuesday.

Roh, who heads the ruling Democratic Justice Party, announced the president's switch of position after holding what he called "frank talks" with Chun.

"I recommended it is desirable that the president meet political elders and opposition leaders to work out settlements," he told reporters, adding the government is preparing a package of reforms.

The newspaper Chosun Ilbo reported in its Tuesday editions the package would include renewed debate on changing the constitution and presidential election system.

Kim insisted that opposition leader Kim Dae-jung be released from house arrest, which was imposed April 8, and that all people detained in the protests be freed.



AUSTIN — The Texas Legislature convened its budget-writing special session Monday with the speaker of the House saying lawmakers would try to override a gubernatorial tax to debate the bill Tuesday. veto if necessary.

Former Gov. John Connally brought the same message to the Texas Tech campus Monday that he delivered to the Texas Legislature 24 years ago in his opening address.

"Education," he said, "is the talisman of a new age."

Connally, accompanied by members of the Friends of Education, spoke to more than 50 local and univeristy officials at University Center.

Friends of Education is a statewide organization of business and civic leaders dedicated to protecting higher and public education. The group formed about two months ago specifically to focus on budget decisions made during the special session, which convened Monday.

Connally said it is important that Texans understand what has already happened in order for the state to resolve future financial problems.

In 1984, state lawmakers made a commitment to higher education with the passage of educational reform. Since giving approval to the reform, the Legislature has appropriated only 60 percent of the mandated funding.

Connally said legislative higher education appropriations have been reduced by \$645 million since 1985, resulting in lost faculty, services and industry to universities and the state.

Connally stressed the important role that education plays in the cultural, social, economic and industrial growth of the state, and called on businessmen around the state to get involved in the funding battle for higher education.

Though Texans don't want more taxes, Connally said, citizens would vote in favor of taxes to maintain quality education.

"We are here to face reality," he said. "We have 30 days to get something done. Texas needs to mandate a return of educational funding to the appropriation levels of 1985."

Connally urged West Texans to communicate their support for higher education to state lawmakers.

"Paradoxically, only one person in West Texas is all out for appropriations to higher education," he said. "That is Sen. John Montford. I implore all of you to tell Montford that you are grateful for his support and tell all your representatives that you will support a vote for increased taxes for higher education."

House member considers Clements impeachment over scandal

AUSTIN - A member of the Texas House of Representatives said Monday he is studying the possiblity of impeachment proceedings against Gov. Bill Clements in the wake of the Methodist bishops' report on the Southern Methodist University football scandal.

"I think that report that came out from the bishops can't be defended by the governor," said Rep. Paul Moreno, D-El Paso.

A report issued by four United Methodist bishops said Clements, as chairman of the SMU Board of Governors, knew improper payments were being made to football players and allowed them to continue even though the school already was on NCAA probation for

similar violations.

The bishops said Clements and several other members of the board of governors participated in an elaborate scheme to keep Clements' involvement a secret.

"It seems to me that a person of that background does not belong in the office of governor of the state of Texas," said Moreno, who first began studying impeachment last March when Clements admitted

Gunfights follow Syria's vow to free Glass

BEIRUT, Lebanon - Gunfights broke out in south Beirut's Shiite Moslem slums, where foreign American journalist Charles Glass that will be accomplished soon." and the son of Lebanon's defense minister "at all costs.".

Police said 17 people were wounded during shootouts in the Shiite Moslem slums of Ghobeiri, Hay Madi and Haret Hreik between the Mokdad Shiite clan and supporters of Akel Hamieh, military commander of the mainstream Shiite Amal militia.

Neither faction has been linked to abductions of the 25 foreigners still held. Amal leader Nabih Berri, also Lebanon's justice minister, ordered his militia Saturday to join the search for Glass, 36, and Ali Osseiran, 40, whose father Adel is defense minister.

Street battles in the south Beirut slums began at midday, eased at midafternoon and picked up again before sundown, police reported. The sound of gunfire and rocket-propelled grenades could be heard in both Moslem and Christian sectors of the city.

The Christian-controlled Voice of Lebanon radio station said those holding Glass and Osseiran demanded a guarantee that West Germany would not extradite alleged TWA hijacker Mohammed Ali Hamadi to the United States.

Lebanese police and sources close to the Syrian command in west Beirut denied such a demand was made.

Security sources in Bonn said West Germany would not extradite Hamadi, a Lebanese Shiite, because of fear for the lives of the West German hostages kidnapped in Beirut last January.

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Army helicopter crash kills reservists

FORT HOOD (AP) - A military helicopter flying at low altitude crashed in rugged terrain Monday during training exercises, killing 10 people, authorities said.

One of the victims died at Darnall Army Community Hospital about an hour after the crash about 9:45 a.m., said base spokesman Maj. George Creach.

Reports on the number of victims have been revised, said base spokeswoman Jeanie Kitchens, because of earlier discrepancies when officials were not at the scene.

Most of the victims were apparently Army reservists, said Creach.

Korean-American protest in Austin

AUSTIN (AP) - An estimated 100 people, mostly Korean-Americans, staged a peaceful demonstration on the steps of the Texas Capitol, asking the United States to withdraw support of the military-dominated government in South Korea.

The Austin demonstrators were among thousands who rallied Sunday across the nation to support anti-government protestors in South Korea and call for the removal of President Chun Doo Hwan.

Otwell rallies against Human Services

AUSTIN (AP) — A minister running as in independent candidate for governor led a Capitol rally Monday to abolish the Department of Human Services, which he described as a wild beast run by third-class people.

Approximately 25 supporters, half of them children carrying placards, listened to Pastor W.N. Otwell of the Community Baptist Church in Fort Worth.

Otwell ran afoul of the law in 1986 when he refused to close his unlicensed church home for boys. He was found in contempt of court but Attorney General Jim Mattox agreed to drop the case when the preacher said he would close the illegal home.

In April a release from Otwell's church announced Otwell as the first 1990 gubernatorial candidate.

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

The University Police Department June records show an increase in the number of harassing phone calls reported. The most recent incident occurred Friday. According to UPD reports, the victim said the harassing phone calls began about two weeks ago. The caller is described as a white college-age male. Reports indicated the caller would whisper and try to distort his voice. All of his calls are sexually-oriented. TIP:

UPD offers the following tips when dealing with harassing phone calls: Don't talk. Silence discourages the caller who is looking for an audience. The victim can control the situation by refusing to talk. Hang up immediately. Don't slam the phone down because this gives the caller the desired reaction. Report harassing phone calls to UPD or the Lubbock Police Department. If the phone calls continue and increase in frequency. keep a log of the calls. Include the time, day, sex of the caller and any other identifiable actions. The log will help law enforcement officers locate the caller.

Pink Floyd fanatics will not get the expected legendary story with mystical music.


What you get is the unexpected; a new-wave, techno-pop sound and the same background sound effects as heard in "Dark Side of the Moon" and "The Wall."

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
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
