Dr. Bernhard Mittemeyer ecutive vice president of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, will be Haragan's TTUHSC counterpart in the administrative
restructuring restructuring approved by regents at a special meeting in Dallas Sept. 2.
Interim Tech President Elizabeth Haley suggested that the restructuring be implemented immediately. The executive VP/provosts will han-
dle the daily operations of their dle the daily operations of their
respective institutions respective institutions, freeing the
president to concentrate on external president to concentr
matters, Haley said.
matters, Haley said.

Louis Gritzo, who obtained his

award April 28 from the National
ascienc FFoundation in Washington,
D.C. Chosen from a field of more
than 400, he is one of 30 recipients
from across the nation. The award provides $\$ 30,000$ a year for Gritzo to investigate and
expand his research entitled "Laser Induced Breakup and Atomization of Small Liquid Jets." Of the $\$ 30,000$ award, Gritzo said $\$ 20,000$ is the actual amount to be
