





Census indicates people leaving state reversing oil boom pattern of decade

WASHINGTON — More people left Texas than migrated to the Lone Star State in 1987, reversing the decade's oil-boom pattern, according to Census Bureau figures released Wednesday that show the population still managed to grow 0.6 percent.

The 1987 county-by-county estimates show greatest population growth along the central corridor between Dallas and San Antonio and troubling losses in rural counties.

For the first time this decade, the state had a net outmigration of about 90,000 people, although births made up the loss and accounted for the growth, the census shows.


Increasing by just 100,000 between July 1986 and July 1987 for a total population of 16,785,000, the state lagged behind the national growth rate of 1 percent, said Census Bureau demographerstatistician Ed Byerly. Texas is still the third most populated state, after California and New York.

It was the state's slowest growth of the decade, Byerly said, dropping dramatically from the high of 4.1 percent at the height of the oil boom in 1981-1982 and dipping from the 1.8 percent increase in 1986.

Demographers say the Texas slowdown mirrors downturns in oil, agriculture and service industries, just as the oil boom in the early part of the decade accounts for a parallel population spurt that put

State Population Decline

Despite sharp declines last year in population growth, Texas still remains third in the nation behind California and New York. The U.S. Census Bureau revealed 53% of Texas 254 counties lost population in 1987 and 64% had net outmigration. Texas still managed to grow .6%, the slowest of the decade. Texas' total population for 1987 was 16,785,000.

the overall growth rate between 1980 and 1987 at a substantial 18 percent, an increase of 2.6 million.

Demographer Steve Murdock, a professor of rural sociology at Texas A&M, said the 18 percent growth rate is deceiving because of losses in recent years.

"It's the half-empty, half-full glass routine," said Murdock, who works with the Census Bureau.

Murdock said 53 percent of Texas' 254 counties lost population in 1987 and 64 percent had net outmigration. Rural counties and especially the Panhandle are suffering "extensive problems in population retention" while the suburbs appear to be doing the best

at keeping their population. Some of the shift could reflect a flow back to the Rust Belt of migrants who headed into Texas to find work in the oil patch, Byerly

Murdock said the decline of the past few years has been pervasive and reverses growth patterns of the 1970s and early 1980s, bringing the state closer to trends of the 1960s, when 57 percent of counties had population declines .



Killer bees to reach U.S. in 1990

WESLACO - Swarms of potentially aggressive Africanized bees should reach the United States by early 1990, a scientist reported Wednesday.

Other researchers at the American Bee Research Conference reported that the bees are not losing their African genes as they edge their way northward.

The bees are moving north at the rate of about 300 miles per year, Jose Villa of the U.S. Department of Agriculture said at a conference at Texas A&M University's Agricultural Experiment Station, 12 miles from the Mexican border in the Rio Grande Valley.

Scientists have been concerned since the accidental release in 1956 of 20 to 30 swarms of African bees in

Brazil. In colonies, Africanized bees tend to be more defensive of their hives and will more aggressively attack humans and pursue them for longer distances than the European bees common in the Americas.

Villa projected that the Africanderived bees will reach Brownsville at the southern tip of Texas by March

Bee researchers had believed the African genes would be diluted as they mixed with the European

But Glenn Hall, a bee researcher at the University of Florida, reported studies of bees in South America and Mexico showing that the African variety in the wild retains its genetic

The bees had "virtually a total absence of European mother lines" after 1,000 generations, Hall said.

Economists say Soviets could adopt IRS system to decrease black market

MOSCOW — Another Western influence may soon follow rock music and fast food into Soviet society the ritual of filing annual financial returns and paying a progressive income tax.

A pair of economists said in articles published Wednesday that a complete reform of the Soviet tax system is necessary to expose those who have made fortunes in the multibillion dollar black market, and spread income more equitably.

scientific approach in our system of taxation is useless," Deputy Finance Minister Viktor Semenov told the weekly Moscow News.

Semenov and economist V. Yaroshenko, writing in the Communist Party daily newspaper Pravda, both said a yearly statement of income and expenditures


was essential. Currently, Soviets pay a flat 10 percent of their income in tax if they make less than \$320 a month, the average industrial wage. The rate increases a few percentage points for higher incomes. Most taxes are deducted at the work

place and workers don't need to file annual tax returns.

Black marketeering and other organized crime saps the economy of more money every year than is paid out in benefits to pensioners, invalids, students, families with many children and orphans, he

It is so well-organized that it constitutes a "government within the government," he said.

Semenov said the tax system will be reformed in the early 1990s, when economists also are aiming to implement a comprehensive system of price reform.

Tech police discourage vandalistic acts

Each semester the Dean of Students Office and the Lubbock County Criminal District Attorney's Office process numerous cases involving vandalism of Texas Tech property.

Since January, 19 vandalism incidents at the university have been reported to the Tech Department of Police Services.

Vandalism, defined as any willful or intentional act of defacing or destroying property, can start out as a college prank. No matter how harmless a deed may seem, any property damage is cause for criminal

Punishment for vandalism ranges from disciplinary action by the Dean of Students Office to fines and/or jail time if the offense is tried by the district attorney. The severity of punishment depends on the amount of

Damage to university property becomes a problem for all students because replacement costs or repair charges are passed on to students in the form of higher fees.

Vandals should think before committing acts of destruction to determine whether the consequences and possible criminal repercussions make the deed worthwhile.

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

Llano Estacado Winery has put Lubbock back into the spotlight with two Best of Class awards at the 1988 International Eastern Wine Competition in September at Watkins Glen, N.Y.

Llano Estacado's 1987 Gewurztraminer and 1987 Chenin Blanc both won silver medals and were honored with Best of Class awards.

"We were really surprised by the Best of Class awards," said John Lowey, president and chief executive officer of Llano Estacado Winery. "This winery made an excellent performance for such a stringent competition."

Five other Llano wines were recognized with bronze medals: 1987 Llano Blush, 1987 Chardonnay, 1987 Llano Red, 1987 Heritage Red and 1987 Johannisberg Riesling.

Lowey said the winery works daily to build on its reputation.

"By design, Llano markets 95 percent of its production within Texas," Lowey said. "We have succeeded spectacularly in Texas.

Lowey does not see expansion of coastal sales soon with such a great response by Texas wine lovers. Production has been increased 45 percent with still nothing left to be

distributed beyond the state's borders, according to Lowey.

More than 45 judges participated in evaluating a total of 1,661 wines, said Lowey, making the '88 competition the largest in the event's 12-year

Lowey predicts the upcoming 1988 vintage to be the best ever produced. He said he sees quality wine grapes with excellent character as the key to an extraordinary vintage for '88.

"We have had a good growing season coupled with more experienced growers," said Lowey.

The 1986 Cabernet Sauvignon and the 1987 Chardonnay will be revealed from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday at a Llano open house, Lowey said.

According to Eastern Wine Competition chairman Richard Vine, "For Llano Estacado to emerge among that many excellent wines is nothing short of spectacular. It is certainly one of the leaders in the growing Texas wine industry."

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Falcons cornerback ingested lethal dose

SUWANEE, Ga. - Falcons defensive back David Croudip ingested a fatal does of cocaine in one dose just hours before his death, according to a Georgia Crime Lab report released Wednesday.


The report, released to the office of Dr. Joesph L. Burton, medical examiner of several metropolitan Atlanta counties, said Croudip's death Monday was definitely caused by an overdose of cocaine.

Dean Browning, an assistant medical examiner, said the quantity found indicated the drug had been taken in one dose, and not over a period of time.

Croudip died early Monday after he was taken to a suburban Atlanta hospital following seizures at his home. He was 29.

Secretary of Navy may deny Robinson's release

DALLAS - Secretary of the Navy William Ball was noncommital Wednesday when asked about a request made on behalf of David Robinson that he be granted an early dismissal from his military duty.

Robinson, a 7-foot center taken by the San Antonio Spurs with the first pick in the 1987 National Basketball Association draft, is on assignment with the Navy at the King's Bay, Ga., Trident submarine training facility. His naval commitment runs until May 1989.

Washington-based agent, asked in a letter sent on the player's behalf that Robinson be dismissed early from the commitment.

"He wrote a personal letter to me, and it was a private communication," said Ball, in Dallas to address a joint session of the Dallas Council on World Affairs and the Rotary Club of Dallas. "I'll respect his request for privacy. I'll respond to him directly.

There was some confusion over who actually sent the letter. Ball said he had seen Tuesday a letter sent from Robinson, but a Navy official in Washington said he had seen only Fentress' letter, which arrived Friday.

Robinson, an All-American who set 33 records while playing at the Lee Fentress, Robinson's Naval Academy, signed an eightyear, \$26 million contract with the Spurs last Nov. 6 with the outside chance that he would be granted an early release.

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
