## 3-County Meet On Peanut Vote Set At R. S.

Detail<sub>3</sub> of the referendum to be held on September 24, when peanut growers will vote on a self-assessment program, was

discussed at a meeting in Rising Star Thursday night, August 21, it has been announced by County Agent DeMarquis Gordon. The meeting **w**.s held in the American Legion Hall beginning at 8 p.m. Gordon says the meeting was planned by farmers in Brown, Callahan, and Eastland Counties to inform the peanut growers of the important election. He says other meetings will be held in Gorman, Desdemona, and Carbon in the

near future. Ross Willoon, Teanager of the Southwester Peanut Growers Association, discuss ed the assessment program and answer questions.

Free coffee and donuts will be provided by the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce.

The county agent says the proposal would allow peanut producers to assess themselves a maximum of \$1.00 per ton of production and permit them to elect a nine-man commodity producers board to administer the proceeds.

Qualified voters may place their names in nomination for positions on commodity producers board by filing an application with the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association by no later than August 24. Applications must be signed by the individual and 10 other eligible voters.

The money would be used for research, disease and insect control, education and promotion for production, marketing, and use of peanuts.

# Sweeping Changes In MV Inspection Laws

AUSTIN — The most sweeping changes ever to be made in the State's Motor Vehicle Inspection Act will become effective September 1, according to Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Speir said the amended act.

recently adopted by the Texas Legislature, will place Texas on a 12 month inspection period. The measure increases the inspection fee from \$1.75 to \$2.00, and moves the location of the inspection sticker from the right of the windshield to the left. It also adds exhaust emmission systems on 1968 or later vehicles, and exhaust systems on all vehicles, to the list of items to be inspected.

"The new stickers will expire 12 months from the date of inspection, and will contain a large number tab showing the month of expiration," Speir noted. "For example, a : sticker issued in September will contain a number nime, and will expire on the last day of September, 1970; A sticker issued in January will contain the number one and will expire at the end of January, 1971," ne added.

The DPS director urged all motorists to have their cars inspected early to get ready for fall and winter driving, and to avoid long lines which may develop in April as the deadline draws near.

In addition to the new items to be inspected, inspection stations will check brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirr or s, windshield wipers, end front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's criginal equipment on the vehicle. The inspection also includes steering and wheels and rims.



### Pioneer Boom

Egitor's Note: The followng item is taken from The Rising Star, a column written by Vada Arnold and titled "It Has Been."

During the hey-day of the Pioneer boom, dozens of

Model T's, trucks, wagons, and teams bogged down in sand or mud, on the roads leading into the town or oil field. Between Rising Star and Pioneer farmers hauled loads of sorghum and maize stalkes, piled them into the boggy places in the road to fill up holes. Several farmers along the road made good money by pulling bogged conveyances out of deep ruts, off of "High Center."

Every day in the week resembled a holiday at Pioneer. Crowds moved up and down the streets and board walks, continually. Some were working men, some peddlers, crying out their wares in loud, strained voices, sight seeing crowds, and loafers hunting for a place to pilfer, along

with some women and dirty children.

Today Pioneer is a small community town where many fine intelligent and prosperous people live in quietness and peace, where older citizens tell their descendants tall tales of the Boom days in Pioneer back in 1921 and 22. and flags were flying from every conceivable building, telephone pole, trucks, on the bridles of heavy Percheron horses used to haul oil well supplies, and cars and trucks. There was a rodeo, a carnival, baseball games and other amusements along with a world of drunks. There was a patrictic raily under a brush arbor. The Hon. H. P. Brelsford of Eastland spoke to an overflow crowd. Everybody celebrated.

The term, ballot, meaning "little ball," stems from classical Greek jury practice. White balls meant acquittal, black balls, banishment.

community said some of his peanuts were so damaged by the borer that they will not be worth harvesting.

Leaf worms have caused more damage this year than usual the county agent said. Most producers are having to spray to control the leaf eating pests.

Gordon said that leaf spot, a fungus disease of peanuts, is increasing rapidly and will cause considerable loss in yields if not controlled. Most producers do not realize the damage caused by leaf spot Gordon says. Tests in East-land County have shown that income can be increased by as much as \$28.00 per acre when leaf spot is controlled. Gordon says that fungicides should be applied at he first signs of leaf spot and continued at 7 to 14 day intervals until harvest.

# New Traffic Laws Into Effect Sept.

AUSTIN — A number of changes in the State's traffic laws, some of which are highly significant to Texas motorists, were made by the Texas Legislature during its regular ses-

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, noted that the new laws will all be in effect by September 1, and pointed out that Department of Public Safety patrolmen will begin enforcement on that date.

While the measures range from one establishing new motor vehicle inspection procedures to allowing the owner

of a parking lot to remove cars parked on the lot without his consent, one of the most important is the new "emplied consent" law covering breath testing of drivers.

Under the terms of this law a motorist is "deemed to have given consent" to a breath test if arrested for any alleged offense arising out of his actual operation or physical control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Refusal to take the breath test may lead to suspension of the suspect's driver license for up to one year.

Another measure which involves drivers is on which requires that slow-moving vehicles, that is, vehicles, traveling at less than the normal speed of traffic, be driven in the right-hand lane or as close as practicable to the righthand curb or edge of the roadway except when passing.

Also effective on September 1 is an act which establishes a new intersection right-of-way law for the State of Texas. Under this, there are four rules governing the right-of-way at intersections. In cases of collision, it will be presumed that the driver did not yield the right-of-way if the four conditions have not been satisfied.

The Legislature also made changes in the "following too closely" law. Drivers, after the effective date, must give due regard to the speed of the vehicles, traffic upon and condition of the street or highway, to insure that their motor vehicle can be safely brought to a stop without colliding with the preceding vehicle or bearing into other vehicles, objects or persons.


