Check Insurance Rights, Vets Told

Veterans of Korean and post-Korean conflict period are losing valuable GI insurance rights because they are filing applications for special five-year term policies four months after separation instead of within 120 days.

The law grants only 120 days in which to apply for this non-convertible term policy without medical examination, the Veterans Administration said today.

One hundred and twenty days, VA explained, can be and usually is less than four months. So, when a Korean veteran counts on a four-month leeway and thus files his application one, two or three days late, he cannot be granted insurance under the law.

Not only must the application for this special term policy be filed with VA within the 120-day period after separation, but the first premium also must be paid within the same period, VA said.

A longer period of time in which to apply is granted to Korean or post-Korean veterans who are found by VA to have service-connected disabilities. These veterans must apply within one year from the date VA finds their disabilities to be service-connected and they must pass a medical examination to show they are otherwise insurable except for their service-connected disabilities.

Any VA office will be glad to assist Korean and post-Korean veterans applying for the GI insurance to which they may be entitled.

*KARFIOL (Hungarian Cauliflower with Cheese Sauce)

- 1 large head cauliflower
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 egg yolks
- 1/2 cup grated American cheese
- 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine

Place cauliflower and one-half cup water in saucepan. Season with 1 teaspoon salt. Cover and boil 15 to 20 minutes, or until tender. Drain. To make sauce, melt 3 tablespoons butter, add flour and blend. Add milk and cook on medium heat until thick. Add Parmesan cheese, lemon juice, salt, pepper, and blend thoroughly. Beat egg yolks and gradually add several spoonfuls of sauce, then combine with remaining sauce. Divide cauliflower into flowerets and place in buttered 1 1/2 quart casserole. Add sauce. Sprinkle with American cheese, then mixture of crumbs and melted butter. Bake uncovered in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes. 6 servings.

GRASS IS KEY TO SUCCESS FOR LIVESTOCK FARMS IN THIS AREA

(Editor's Note: This article was prepared by the Upper Leon Soil Conservation Service.)

Successful livestock farming depends on grass. As ranchers in this area look to the future and consider the land and its management, they think, as never before, in terms of "grass." Grass is needed, an abundance of grass, both as feed for livestock and cover for the land.

After several years of drought grass has become scarce. With forage limited cattlemen through necessity have reduced their herds, and spent their profits on feed to maintain basic herds. At the same time few have been able to maintain adequate cover on their range. In spite of these conditions most ranchers have held on, and look forward to the future when rains will come again.

Most ranchers realize their immediate need is to get their range land covered with a litter of grass. Bare range land in this area generally has a water intake rate of less than one inch per hour. Range well covered with deep rooted grass will often absorb as much as eight to ten inches of water per hour.

On the bright side of the livestock picture is the native drought resisting grasses found in this area. Examination of most ranges reveal at least a seed source of good grasses are still present. Such valuable grass species as side-oats grama and little blue stem have survived our current drought as they have survived drought throughout the ages. In fact drought is characteristic of the prairie savannah type vegetation natural to our range country. Without drought our natural or climax vegetation would likely be forest, and the great ranching industry could not have been developed here. The future of ranching depends on how land owners care for their key climax plants.

Since the spring growing season is the time of fastest growth, many landowners plan spring deferments or at least light use this spring to regain cover as quickly as possible. Others plan summer

deferments on at least part of their range so key grasses will develop vigor and mature seed this fall. Due to the limited supply of native grass seed only a few land owners will be able to artificially reseed depleted range land, however several are sowing seed at the present time.

Regardless of his livestock program the conservation minded land owner watches his key grasses to guide his ranching operations.
