E. L. Weaver Taken By Death

Funeral services for Elbert Lee Roy Weaver, 80, were conducted from Carbon Methodist Church Friday at 3 p. m. with Rev. John Mood, local pastor, Rev. H. R. Hall, pastor Deidemona Methodist Church and Rev. Roger Butler, pastor Carbon Baptist Church, officiating. Interment was in Carbon's old cemetery with Higginbotham Funeral Home of Gorman directing.

Born Jan. 2, 1878 near Gateville Coryell County, Texas, he moved to a farm near Carbon in 1892 and has lived in and near Carbon ever since except for 10 years in Levelland. His father, F. T. Weaver, who came to Texas from Mississippi, was a Methodist Minister.

Lee Weaver, as the deceased was known, was a strong layman in the Methodist Church. He was a long-time member of the Board of Stewards and was superintendent of Sunday School at the old Wesley's Chapel south of Carbon. When that church merged with the Carbon Methodist Church he came right along with it and found an honored place for all of his active years. He went to his reward Thursday Feb. 23, 1936 at 2 p. m.

He is survived by his wife, Mary Weaver, and four sons: Vernon and Chester of Fort Worth and Clyde and Woodrow of Levelland and one daughter, Mrs. Lettie May Worley of Levelland. Also 3 brothers: R. D. of Levelland, F. E. of Southland and J. H. of Carbon; 6 sisters, Bell Thomason and Nannie Thomason of Spur, Ella Rankin of Gorman, Sophronia Linder of Fort Worth, Tennie Jordan of Eastland and Mae Collins of Arizona; 10 grandchildren and 15 great grandchildren.

Census Bureau Gives Retail Sales Report

Retail sales in 1954 of 376 stores in Eastland County totaled \$22,547,000, according to preliminary 1954 Census of Business figures announced by the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. This was a decrease of 0.1 percent under sales in 1948 of 428 stores at \$22,567,000.

Stores with payroll in 1954 numbered 232, had 857 paid employees in November 1954, reported payroll of \$1,682,000, and accounted for sales of \$20,253,000. Proprietors of unincorporated businesses number 396.

Self Employment Tax Should Be Paid By Farmers

Thousands of farmers have not paid their 1955 self-employment tax in filing their 1955 income tax return, according to Ellis Campbell, Jr., district director of the Dallas district of Internal Revenue Service.
 Farmers became subject to paying the self-employment tax during 1955 for the first time. Mr. Campbell stated that it appears that many farmers feel that self-employment tax coverage is optional for farmers. This is not true. Under the provisions of the new self-employment tax law, the farmers became subject to this tax on the same mandatory basis that they are subject to income tax.
 Farmers should carefully review the self-employment tax instructions before filing their tax returns. These instructions require careful study before the farmer can determine whether he is subject to self-employment tax and, of course, whether he will eventually be eligible for Social Security benefits under the law, Mr. Campbell said.

Area HD Camp To Be Held At Lake Cisco This Year

The Eastland County Home Demonstration Council recently met with 24 women present and eight of the ten clubs in the county represented. Mrs. York Eberhart, council chairman, presided.
 Two committees — health and safety and consumer education — presented recommendations to the council. The standing rules were adopted for 1956.
 It was decided that the Tri-County Home Demonstration Camp held each summer by the club women in Brown, Comanche, and Eastland Counties would be held July 26 and 27 at Lake Cisco. The camp is usually held in Brown County.

Mrs. M. W. Grieger had a home demonstration club news sheet ready for distribution to each club member in the county. Mrs. Grieger is the council reporter.
 Following the regular council meeting, there was a County THDA meeting with the county chairman, Mrs. John Love, presiding. A training meeting was given on the organization of the Texas Home Demonstration Association and the rules and by laws governing it.
 Mrs. M. W. Sheffield, North Star club; Mrs. Cecil Bostick, Nimrod club, and I. L. Lassiter, Word club, were elected delegates to the District THDA meeting to be held in Hillsboro April 23 and 24.

Social Security Checks May Be Due Many Here

A good-sized number of the people who read this newspaper could get Social Security checks by applying for them, but don't know of their eligibility, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for Social Security.
 Tuley explained that these people are eligible:
 1. Insured persons between 65 and 72 earning \$1200 or less in a year can draw their full benefits. They can get some checks even if their earnings are as high as \$2030 in a year. Income from investments, rentals, interest, etc., do not count as "earnings." The word "insured" means having credit for a certain amount of Social Security work. Those 65 before July 1, 1956 are insured

with as little as 1½ years work. Those just now reaching age 65 need two years of Social Security credits.
 2. Anyone now 72 or over who has as much as 1½ years work covered by Social Security can get full benefits regardless of present earnings.
 3. There is a special rule for survivors of persons who died between 1940 and September 1, 1950. If any such person had as much as 1½ years of social security credits at the time of his death, benefits may now be paid to his widow at age 65, or to any unmarried child still under the age of 18.
 Tuley urged anyone who thinks he or she may qualify under one of the above provisions to get in touch with his office promptly. He emphasized that no Social Security benefits can be paid until a claims application has been filed and that he has no means of identifying and notifying all those who may be eligible.

Children Cautioned Of Flying Kites

Safety rules for boys and girls who fly kites were outlined by L. D. Stewart, manager for Texas Electric Service Company, in anticipation of the opening of the 1956 kite flying season.
 As explained by Mr. Stewart, the five safety rules in order of their importance are: 1. fly your kite out in the open where it won't get caught in wires or trees. 2. use only strings made of cotton, silk, linen, nylon or rayon. 3. use only wood in your kite frames. 4. fly kites only in good weather. You don't want to get them rained soaked. 5. if your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Co. They will send someone to get it for you.
 "Local youngsters have been very careful in the past about when and where they flew their kites" Stewart said. "We had a perfect record last year with not one boy or girl being injured and only a few kites demolished. This year, I fully expect that even the number of kites lost will be reduced because it seems that every year, our boys and girls listen more carefully to our warnings and cooperate better in making kite flying a feat."
