One of the outlaws, United States, surprised the crowd and contestants alike by jumping the nine foot corral fence. Bull Whiskey jumped out of the chute twice while being saddled.

GOVERNMENT TO PERMIT LIGHT WINES AND BEER

Washington, June 30 .- The department of justice is understood to have decided that sale of light wine and beer shall not be interfered with under the wartime prohibition law.

Instructions went forward today to district attorneys of wet territory that the department would abide by the recent decision in the test case brought in New York and would not prosecute dealers selling beverages containing not more thant two and three quarters per cent of alcohol.

Attorney General Palmer will issue a statement today on the department's attitude on the enforcement of the law, which becomes effective at midnight.

H. Tarton, geologist, has discovered in the beds of rock many domes and arches that may be reservoirs of oil or gas of these substances are present in the regions examined. These flexed beds are parts of formations that produce oil in Wyoming, Oklahoma, Kansas, and Texas, but little evidence of the presence of oil and gas in them has yet been found in New Mexico. A small amount of oil at Dayton and a few seeps and some traces of oil reported in water wells at several other places are the only favorable indications so far reported. Only a few deep wells have been bored in New Mexico, however, and these have been bored in places where the structure was not favorable for the occurrence of oil or gas, or the wells have not been drilled deep enough to make them satisfactory tests. Much of the geologic guidance used in locating the wells drilled has come from incompetent "experts," one "dome' having been deduced from haphazard dips taken from layers of cross-bedded sandstone.
