NUMBER OF NEGROES PARDONED FOR '19TH' OTHERS GET FREEDOM

Austin, Tex., June 17 .- Thirteen negroe cinvicts will remember June 19, emancipation day, as an emancipation day in truth because just this many pardon proclamations for "for-gotten negroes" were signed today by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson to be placed in effect on the holiday so popular among negroes.

The governor intended to issue about 30 in all but the clerical force in the secretary of state's office was unable to meet the unprecedentd demands and the other negroes will be forced to accept their "Juneteenth" reward on a latter date.

The governor's executive clemency record for a single day's order was increased to 28 proclamations shortly before noon when she granted 13 additional pardons, a parole and a restoration of citizenship, the second quota being desibnated "the usual list." The first quota was to negroes exclusively in honor of June 19.

The full pardons were granted to H. B. Ward, Tarrant, theft over \$50 five years; Henry Smith, Titus, burglary, two years; Falonda Butsamen ta, Gonzales, rape, 10 years; T. H. White, Harris, theft, two years; W. H. Maddox, Robertson, "A felony," two years; Clarence Thompson, Howard, selling liquor, two and half years; Bill Edwards, Lubbock, theft, two years; R. D. Woods, Brown, selling liqour, two years; Maria Ortega, El Paso, theft, two years; Fred Douglass, Nueces, liquor charge, one year; and Jack Webb, Lamarr, burglary, two years.

36,512 Unfilled Chevrolet Orders

Detroit, Mich., June 17 .- The Chevrolet Motor company shipped 52,853 motor cars and trucks during May which displaces April as the second highest production month in the history of the company. The April production was 52,236 cars and trucks. Of the May production, 42,783 units were for domestic sale and 10,070 were for Canada and exports. Production in both April and May closely approached October of 1923 the boom year when Chevrolet production reached its highest point. Retail sales during May were

48,176, this being the fourth largest delivery month in the company's history. April of this year was the largest delivery month exceeding May only by 5,107 sales.

At the end of April Chevrolet had on its books 36,512 unfilled orders. At the end of May there were 30,-709 unfilled orders.






