



\$150,000 Loss In **Groesbeck** Auto Fire

Groesbeck, July, 28 .--- Fire, which Monday at midnight destroyed the Oliver Garage here,, with 30 automobiles and all equipment, caused a loss of \$150,000, the largest in the history of the city.

Lack of water, due to the drought, hampered firemen in fighting the blaze which for a time threatened the entire town. The fire department of Mexia, 12 miles from Groesbeck, materially assisted in checking the blaze. Adjoining buildings were damaged.
