### LAYING UP COAL SUPPLY URGED

(Dallas News, Aug. 25)  
A warning that the public should lay in supplies of coal during the summer months to avoid a possible delay in the height of the cold season was voiced Saturday by J. F. Garvin, general freight agent for the Katy, who is also chairman of the railroad committee of the Southwest Shippers' Advisory Board.

"There is a good possibility that next winter will be a cold, wet one," Mr. Garvin said. "Due to the comparative mildness of last year and slack demand, dealers in the Southwest at this time are only 20 per cent prepared to meet the demands of the winter, stocks being very low."

In order to prevent encountering the rush period which will set in when the mines are deluged with orders this fall and winter, Mr. Garvin urged, the public should buy at the present season.

**Ford Announces Improved Line of Body Types**

Body changes and chassis refinements are more pronounced than any made since the adoption of the Model T chassis were announced here today by the Ford Motor Company. There will be no advance in price, it also was stated. Production at the Dallas Branch will start September 1st, at which time all dealers will be sampled with the improved cars.

Outstanding features of the improvements in both open and enclosed types are lower, all-steel bodies on a lowered chassis, complete new design in most body types, a change from black to color in closed cars, larger, lower fenders, newly designed seats and larger, more powerful brakes.

Longer lines, effected through higher radiator and redesigned cowl and bodies are apparent in all the improved Ford cars, but are especially pronounced in the open types. Wide crown fenders hung close to the wheels contribute to the general effect of lowness and smartness.

While Runabout and Touring cars remain in black, the closed bodies are finished in harmonic color schemes, enhanced by nickel radiators. The Coupe and Tudor bodies are finished in deep channel green while the Fordor is rich Windsor Maroon.

Greater comfort is provided for driver and passengers in both open and closed cars by larger compartments, more deeply cushioned seats and greater leg room.

Many new conveniences are also

incorporated in the improved cars. In the Runabout, Touring Car, Coupe and Tudor, the gasoline tank is under the cowl and filled thru an ingeniously located filled cap completely hidden from sight by a cover similar in appearance to a cowl ventilator. One-piece windshield and narrow pillars in the Tudor and Coupe offer the driver greatly increased visibility and improved ventilation.

Driving comfort is materially increased by lower seats, scientifically improved back seats, and lower steering wheel. Brake and clutch pedals are wider and more conveniently spaced.

Four doors are now provided on the Touring Car and two on the Runabout permitting the driver to take his place from the left side of the car. Curtains, held secure by rods, open with the doors.

Most important in the mechanical changes are the improved brakes. The transmission brake drum and bands have been considerably increased in size which gives the foot brake softer and more positive action as well as longer life. The rear wheel brake drums are larger and the brake of self energizing type.

Cord tires are now standard equipment on all Ford cars.

**N. Y. Cop Must Know His Ford**

To give the motorized police of New York City an intimate knowledge of the construction and operation of the 722 Ford cars recently purchased by the city, a special Ford school has been established by the New York Police Academy at 34th street and Lexington avenue. More than 2,800 police sergeants and patrolmen detailed to the motor division of the police force are enrolled in the Ford school in a course which completely covers every phase of the Ford engine, electrical, clutch and drive system.

"Fords are rapidly taking over the important features of the police department's patrol work," Police Inspector John J. Noonan explains, "and it is our intention to make every officer as familiar with his Ford as he is with his revolver."

Sixty especially selected men of the division, in addition to their week's instruction in the Ford school of the Police Academy, spent a week in the Ford Motor Company plant at Kearny, N. J., to learn Ford methods in shop work and construction. They will have charge of the precinct police garages.

After his training of six eight-hour days in the police Ford school every sergeant and patrolman is competent to make minor repairs on his car which may become necessary while on patrol. The precinct garages will be equipped for all major repairs and each car will be kept "tuned up" to meet the requirements of metropolitan police work.

The only departure from the standard Ford equipment on the police cars will be the use of solid tires which cannot puncture and cripple the car in a critical moment.

There were ripe, red strawberries, cabbage, as big as may be found anywhere, peppers just coming to blossom, and all kinds of small truck.

The front of the two lots is devoted to flower garden and it is a veritable mass of beauty and fragrance. There were roses, geraniums, callas, flox, nasturtiums, and probably a half dozen other varieties. 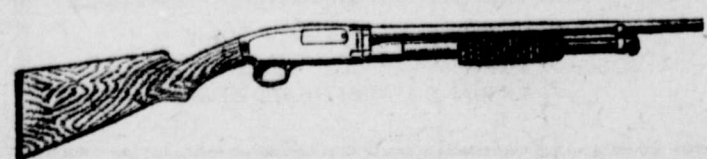
