City's Pastors In Plea For Sunday Observance Long-Time Bonds Is Solution To Finance City's Needs CITIZENS ASKED TO FOREGO

PROPOSITION AS OUTLINED WILL REDUCE TAX AND MAKE PAYMENTS EASY

In looking over the books of the city of Winters we have complied the following statement of the city's financial affairs for the purpose of showing the necessity of holding an election to convert the city's short time warrants into 40-year bonds. At the time these warrants were issued that appeared to be the only way of solving the city's problems, but now these short time warrants are becoming burdensome and the only way out appears to be to convert them into 40-year bonds which will materially reduce the tax rate necessary to care for them, or will allow some latitude for further progress. We are frank to say we approve of the present administration Left to right: lieve they need more latitude for further development. Following is a list of the bonded indebtedness of the bonds were voted or warrants issued:

In 1911 \$16,000 water works bonds were voted, to run forty- Winters to Have years and bear 5 per cent.

In 1915 \$5,000 water works bonds were voted, to run forty-years and bear 5 per cent.

In 1922 \$30,000 water works bonds were voted, to run forty years and bear 6 per cent.

In 1924 \$49,500 sewer bonds were voted, to run forty-years and bear 6 per cent.

All these bonds required a tax rate of 53 1-2 cents. Here is a list of the short time
