It Happened In November Back in 1924

Editor's Note: The following item is taken from 'The Rising Star, a column written by Vada Arnold and titled "It Has Been."

Once upon a time three Rising Star men went hunting down in the Marathon Hills in the Big Rend area. Those men were Frank Bucy, Wallace Anderson and Dewey Anderson.

The time was November, 1924. Hunting coats were taken out of storage, and the car was packed for a joyous hunting trip, and three happy, expectant men had visions of bringing home well filled game bags.

The trio drove into Marathon and were getting out of their car when a man walked up and started a conversation, he asked if they were going hunting and where they planned to go. There was not a slight suspicion as to who the man was until he asked to see their thunting license, then the realization came — A Game Warden.

Frank Bucy reached into his pocket and brought out the authentic piece of paper and all of the things to cling to that paper were two honest to goodness full sized quail feathers. At that time the warden searched the other two men and found feathers in the pocket of Wallace Anderson along with his license. Dewey Anderson had planned to buy hunting license as soon as they ar-rived, but the game warden failed to believe the story and assessed a fine for hunting men had not fired a gun. without license, when the Frank Bucy tried to convince the man of authority that the feathers found in their pockets were from last years hunt, but of no avail, Frank and Wallace each paid a fine of \$38.50.

After paying their fines the men decided to come home and forget the hunt. Resolutions were made on the spot t h a t "pockets would be cleaned out" before another hunting season and that license would be renewed on time.



AUSTIN—Stepping into the two-year versus one-year State budgetary b a tile between Governor Preston Smith and Lieutenant Governor Ben

Barns.~s, State Representative Musgrove this week in Austin apparently sided with Governor Preston Smith, and labeled the one-year spending pro-

posal a liberal approach that would eventually "burn the pocket of every Texas taxpayer."

Musgrove tagged Governor Smith's two-year State budgetary plan as the conservative approach to State fiscal spending, and the one-year plan backed by Barnes as a manuever to "live high on the hog nd pay later."

The Breckenridge Representative stated that he still has strong reservations, though, about the justifiable need for additional revenue funds that would necessitate new taxes under each of the two budgetary plans. "We

are a growing State, producing each year more tax revenue from the same tax base, and we should attempt to budget the operations and services of this State within his growth

factor.," Musgrove explained. "Only in one area can I become convinced of the need for substantial increased ap-

priations, and this is in the area of State employees salaries (legislator's not included). There should be some

other areas of spending that should yield to this priority so that a net revenue need would not exist.



Charles Duran, Ross Wilson, S. S. Powers, Paul Norris, Glenn Justice, Berenice Jeffs and A. L. Williams.


The district was authorized by a majority of 98 votes according to an unofficial count.



Screwworm Threat Is Great, Officials Report

All livestock owners are asked to be on the alert for screwworm outbreaks this year. The warning came from Dolph Briscoe, Jr. at an entergency meeting of the Screwworm Eradication officials and livestock men in San Antonio last Wednesday. Briscoe is President of the Southwestern Animal Health Research Foundation Board of Trustees. Four Eastland County men

attended the meeting. They were Oscar Schaefer, County Screwworm Committee Chariman; Doug Fry, President of the County Livestock Raisers DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent and Bob Cohen, Asst. County Agent.

Before the screwworm dication program began in 1962, screwworms caused Texas livestock men to lose 100 million dollars each year. Officials estimated the program has saved farmers and ranchers over 500 million dollars since it began in 1962.

Briscoe said there were 10,-000 cases of screwworms reported last year compared to

only 800 the previous There are indications. there may be even more breaks in 1969. Therebeen 60 screwworm cases during the first four raco of 1969 compared to an ca es this date in 1968. Proofficials said the large but up of the costly pests was 3 t) a mild winter and a w spring in South Texas and Mexico.

The Screwworm Eradication Program was initiated by livestock owners who contributed money to get the program rted. Several rancher's expressed the opinion that stockmen were ready to give again recessary to continue the lication program. Briscoe said the program officials were not asking for money at this time, but were asking for stockmen to do their part in keeping screwworm cases to a minimum. Ranchers were asked to observe their livestock closely, treat all wounds, send samples of all larvae col lected to the Mission Lab. and spray all livestock.


Keep filters clean


