



When young John Jacob Aster III quit his \$25 a week job with the steampship line of which his half-brother, Vincent Aster, is vice-president, a lot of people spoke sneeringly of the "idle rich," jumping to the conclusion that the young man was nothing but a "playboy" after all. But to me his explanation that the 48 hours of work every week took up so much of his time that he couldn't attend to his personal business affairs properly, sounds quite reasonable.

"In times like these," he said, 'you have to watch things pretty closely." He has had to learn young that it is easier to make money than to keep it. Heir to one of the largest fortunes in America, he has discovered that everybody is trying to take it away from him, and that he has to do his own watching, instead of leaving the guardianship of his property to hired

I know a number of wealthy men. Most of them work harder at the job of keeping their wealth from slipping away from them than the rest of us do in trying to make a little more.

HOUSING . . . . . for poor I've been hearing a lot of talk about low-cost housing for the poor, but I haven't seen anything tangible, so far, that convinces me that new homes can be built with high-priced labor, at a cost that will enable the lowest-paid workers to pay the necessary rent. They've done it in England by buying cheap farm land a long way from town, and paying building trade workers about one-third the wages

I've seen some of the European low-cost housing develop-




