DOUBLE TAXES

The overlapping of taxes and the taxing power by the state governments and the Federal government seems to be bringing about a situation which calls for correction and many readjustments. Some way should be found to place definite limits upon the fields of taxation occupied by the national government and the state governments respectively.

The Treasury Department has recently made a report on "double taxation" from 1930 to 1935. There are six fields of taxation in which both the Federal and the state governments operate. These are inheritance taxes, individual income taxes, corporation taxes, gasoline taxes, liquor taxes and tobacco taxes. While sources in the fiscal year of 1935, the states also collected




