





Winters State Bank Increases Capital **Stock At Meeting**

At the annual stockholders meeting Friday, stockholders of the Winters State Bank voted to increase the capital stock of the bank to \$100,000 with a certified surplus of \$100,000. This now brings the total capital structure, including reserves, up to \$430,000, accordin; to John Q. McAdams, bank president.

Owners of 407 shares of stock were present and all voted in favor of the increase.

The Winters State Bank was organized with a \$15,000 capital stock in 1906.

John Q. McAdams, who has been president of the bank since its organization, is an ex-president of the state banks division of the American Bankers Assn. He is a former president of Texas State Bankers Association, and was state banking commissioner for several years.

Officers and directors elected include Dr. J. W. Dixon, vice president and chairman of the board; Gattis Neely, vice president; Mrs. E. N. Reid, assistant vice president; W. H. Craven, cashier; and Estella Bredemeyer, assistant cashier.

Past Records Indicate Climb In Summer J. O. Musick, general manager

of the Texas Safety Association, warned Texans today that increased travel during the peak vacation months of June, July and August could - on the basis of past records-bring a traffic toll of more than 650 deaths and 81,000 injuries.

"This, of course, does not have to happen," Musick said. "The size of the actual toll will depend entirely on how many driv, ers heed or fail to heed a few common sense rules that could save their lives and the lives of their friends and neighbors."

Musick emphasized seven basic rules that will assure vacationers of a much higher degree of safety in travels, they are: 1. Have a complete service check on the car; brakes, tires, steering, lights and windshield wi-

2. Be extra careful on strange roads.

3. Hold your speed to 60 mph, or below, on the open road. Read and heed traffic warning signs and signals.

4. Put the time of arrival at your destination last in importance and your safe arrival first.

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Despite sharp increases in consumption of frozen foods, the canned-food industry appears to be maintaining its relatively strong position. During the next ten years, I predict canners will have to devote more time and thought to their raw material sources. Tighter control of plantings will be a "must." In some cases, it will be advantageous for canners to purchase outright the fruit groves or vegetable acreage needed to assure them of adequate supplies and to enable them to compete with truly synthetic products.

Canners' costs have been trending upward for some years now. They will rise at an even faster rate during the next ten years. Both skilled and unskilled labor on farms and in the groves and canning plants will command higher wages. More money will be needed for containers and for canning and freezing machinery replacement, although I do not now foresee any early switchover to alum-inum cans. However, food pro-
