Wheat Marketing Quota Controls Up To Farmers

The final decision on whether or not marketing quota controls will apply to wheat produced in 1956 will be made by wheat growers on June 25.

According to the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, if two-thirds vote "yes," the support for the 1956 crop will probably be between 75 and 82 percent of parity — the exact level will be announced before the referendum. If more than one-third vote "no," the support will be 50 percent of parity. In any case, points out the committee, support will be available in the commercial wheat states only to those farmers who stay within their farm's wheat acreage allotment. Texas is a commercial state.

If, points out the committee, the vote is favorable, market quotas will be in effect and growers who exceed their farm acreage allotment will be subject to a marketing penalty of 45 percent of parity on their excess wheat. If the vote is unfavorable, there will be no marketing quotas and no penalty for excess wheat.

Acreage allotment will be in effect for price support purposes even if marketing quotas are disapproved. The national acreage allotment for 1956 is 55 million acres — same as for 1955 — which is the minimum established by law.

Ned I. Morris, Carbon, was elected president of the newly formed Sabanno Valley Game Preserve Association at a recent meeting of the farmers and ranchers at the Center Point School in south central Eastland County, according to an announcement here.

Other officers named include: Henry Lovell, vice-president, and Berry Greenwood, secretary-treasurer. Both Lovell and Greenwood get their mail out of Carbon.

Four directors will be elected in the near future who will, with the officers, act as the governing body of the organization. Special emphasis in the newly formed game preserve will be on deer and quail, according to Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper, who has been helping the group set up the organization.

There are a few deer in the thinley settled area at the present time. Deer hunting is to be closed in the area for the next five years it was said.

The group plans to meet on the second Tuesday night in each month at the Center Point School.

Blocking up of land acreages by signing the applications and agreements is already underway by the secretary. From 20,000 to 35,000 acres are in the proposed area. It is likely that farmers and ranchers in the north end of Comanche County will be invited to participate in the organization.

Value Farm Land Up In Past Year

Farm real estate values in Texas rose three percent between November and March and two percent during the 12 months ending March 1, according to a U. S. one percent during the four months period and two percent for the year ending March 1.

Land values this March were above a year earlier in half of the states.

Records of farm sales show, according to the report, that from 40 to 50 percent of all land purchased in the wheat areas were made to enlarge existing farms. In the central Corn Belt at least a third of all purchases were for this purpose.

With many farms in these areas still below the optimum size for maximum efficiency, this type of demand can be expected to have a bolstering effect on the level of land prices for some time, the report suggested.

CISCO KID FIESTA TO RECEIVE WIDE TELEVISION PUBLICITY

The top events of the Cisco Kid Fiesta to be held here on July 2, 3 and 4, will receive nationwide publicity it was learned Saturday when officials of the Humble Company's Texas In Review television program notified Mel Sandler, director, that they would be here Monday to film highlights of the affair. Original plans called for them to be here Saturday, July 2.

Directors of the program were pleased with the change in time since the main activity in the three-day celebration will be Monday, July 4.

Plans call for filming the parade Monday afternoon, the stage coach robbery Monday afternoon, the variety show and the bathing revue Monday night.

Sandler reported that the show was shaping up and that it would be ready for the opening Saturday, July 2. The three-day affair will be highlighted by a visit by Duncan Renaldo, the Cisco Kid of radio, television and screen fame. He will receive an honorary citizenship award and other honors while here.

The tentative program is as follows: Saturday — the caravan opening the three day affair, sport events at Lake Cisco Park, the variety show and bathing revue and a square dance at the Cisco Country Club. Sunday — Sports events at Lake Cisco Park, a barbecue and the variety show. The hours from 7 p. m. to 9 p. m. will be set aside for church services, it was reported. The variety show will be held at 9 p. m.

Monday — Stage coach robbery and parade, sport events, a kiddie revue, a dinner for the Cisco Kid, the variety show at 8 p. m., finals in the bathing revue at 9 p. m. and fireworks following the revue. A dance at the country club will be the final event of the celebration.

In the sports events, which will feature boys and girls in sack races and other events, the prize for the six winners will be a dinner with the Cisco Kid. That

There will be various rides and other carnival features for the three day program, it was reported. No side shows or other carnival activities will be permitted.

Other details of the program will be released from time to time before the Fiesta.

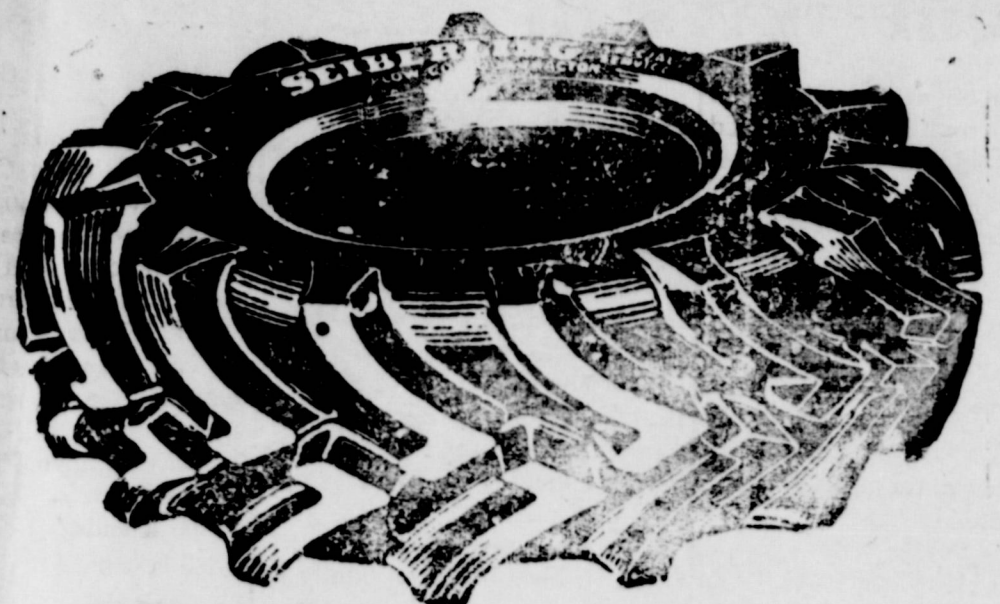
Rising Star Girl At Warm Springs

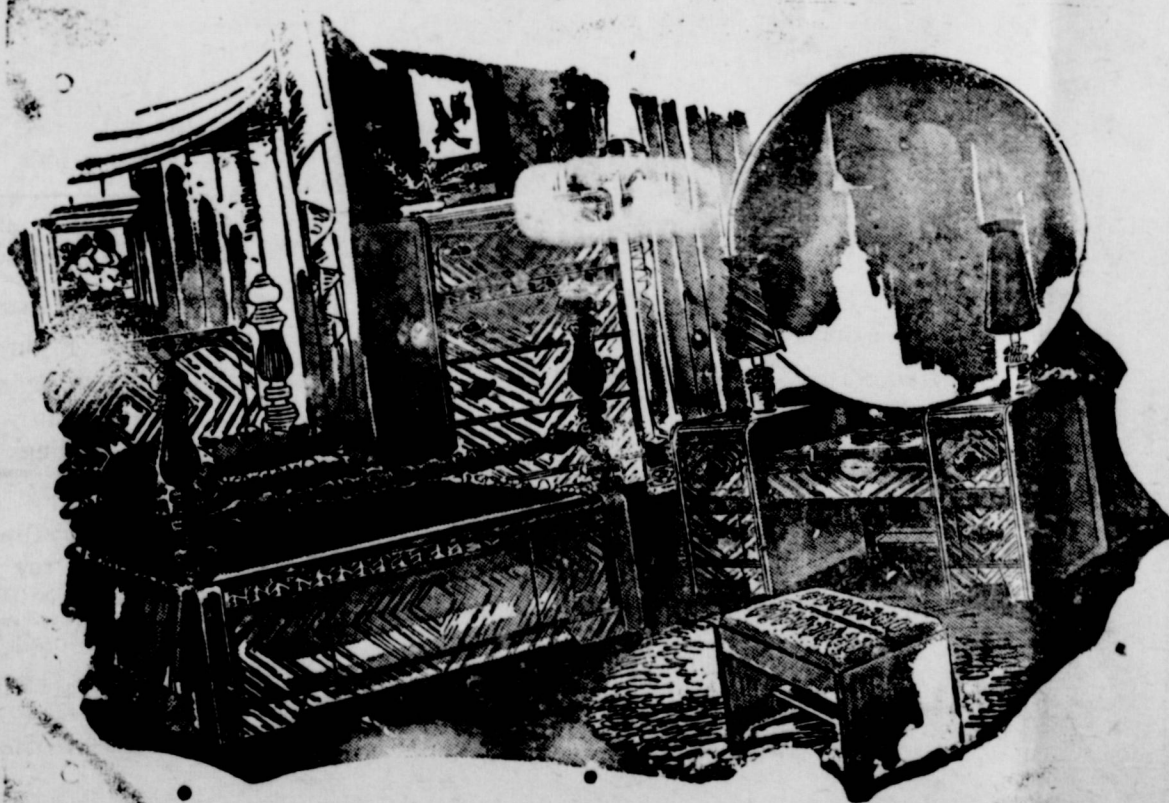

Disabled Persons May Protect Their SS Benefit Rights

The new disability provision of
 the social security law is import-
 ant to a number of people in this
 area, according to R. R. Tuley,
 Jr., District Manager of the Abilene
 Social Security office.

Tuley explained that the dis-
 ability section protects the dis-
 abled worker's insured status and
 the amount of the social security
 benefit rate that would be paid
 to him at age 65 or to his family
 in case of death. To obtain this
 protection, a disabled person who
 meets the requirements, must file
 an application to establish his dis-
 ability on social security records.

In general, the qualifications
 are: (1) the person must be dis-
 abled now from doing any sub-
 stantially gainful work; (2) must
 have been disabled for at least
 the last 6 months; (3) must have
 had 5 years of social security
 credits in the 10 years just be-
 fore becoming disabled; (4) and,
 also, 1 1/2 years of social security
 credit out of the 3 years just be-

Price Announced For Milk Of Area

Producers supplying milk for
 the Central West Texas market
 (23 cities in Central West Texas)
 are to receive a minimum price
 of \$5.73 per hundredweight for
 base milk sold during the same
 period is to be paid for at not
 less than \$3.27 per hundredwei-
 ght.

This price applies to milk de-
 livered to plants at Abilene, San
 Angelo, Stamford, and Sweetwa-
 ter. For base milk delivered to
 plants at Midland and Lamesa a
 price 15 cents higher is paid, and
 before the disability began.

 requirements or who want more
