## HOME TOWN Talk

If you're a football fan of any stature, you won't want to pass up the chance to see the last home game of the season Friday night. The Blizzards will meet the Coleman-Bluecats on Blizzard Field, and the winner of this game has been given the most likely chance against the undefeated and untied Cisco Lobos in the battle for District 7-AA championship.

Game-wise, the teams are evenly matched, with two wins and no losses in district play, and a season record of 5-2. They took similar beatings at the hands of Brady in pre-conference play, with Coleman losing to the Bulldogs 32-6, and the Blizzards losing 50-14.

In district contests, Coleman has beaten Eastland 28-8, and Ballinger 20-6; Winters has defeated Ranger 22-0 and Eastland 20-0. Coleman has allowed opponents 14 points in district encounters; Winters has allowed no scoring by conference foes. Cisco, the top team on the 7-AA totem pole with no losses all season, has allowed conference opponents to score 44 points.

Weightwise, the Bluecats average about three pounds less per man in the line than the Blizzards, and about five pounds less per man in the backfield. According to reports, they are an aggressive team, running from a wing-T with flankers and split ends. They've got some speed, and like to run wide on reverses and bootleggers. They have thrown well this season, but they completed only two out of four against Ballinger.

Prior to district competition, Coleman lost to Anson 12-0 in their season opener; Winters downed Anson 14-6.

Pre-game ticket sales indicate that Friday night's game will be a sell-out; the biggest game of the season on Blizzard Field.

We flipped a calculating lid last week, and ended up in a tie again, with five wrong guesses out of the ten games picked. Second week in a row we've toted up a 50 percent average, after getting off to a pretty good start at the beginning of the season. With college football getting spookier as the season progresses, we'll probably see worse results before the end.

**About 50 Landowners Discuss Plans And Costs of Valley Creek Flood Control**

About 50 landowners in the Valley Creek watershed Tuesday night heard discussions on the plans and costs of the Valley Creek Water Control District's proposed flood control measures, at a meeting in the Wingate School.

This was the first of a series of meetings planned to discuss the recently created water district. The board of directors of the District plan meetings at Hylton, in Nolan County, Tuesday, Nov. 3, at Valley View on Nov. 10.

C. T. Parker, Runnels County Agent, discussed what work had been done and what is yet needed to be done. He commended the work that the steering committee and the board of directors had done. Parker reported that the annual flood loss in the watershed had been estimated at \$138,000, and pointed out that with a watershed protection and flood prevention program this loss could be reduced to less than 50 percent. To construct the necessary flood retention structures would cost from \$1.5 million and \$2 million, he said, but added that this cost would be borne by the Federal government.

Price Middleton, Runnels County Auditor, explained the tax structure needed to raise \$100,000, the amount estimated by the board of directors needed to carry out the obligations of the district.

**Winters Lions Club Will Hold Light Bulb Sale**

The Winters Lions Club will conduct an all-out drive beginning next Tuesday to sell electric light bulbs to residents of Winters. Proceeds from the sale will go to service projects adopted by the club.

The light bulbs will be sold in bags, each containing eight bulbs. Club President J. B. Nevins said, "Every householder can use light bulbs, and this drive affords an opportunity to buy a good supply, and at the same time, help a worthy cause."

The entire membership of the Winters Lions Club has been organized to supply friends and neighbors with light bulbs, and a main distribution point will be set up downtown at the post office.

The light bulb sale begins next Tuesday, and will last as long as the shipment of bulbs lasts, Nevins said.

## Winters School New Shop Plans Open House

The recently completed shop building for the Winters School will be open for patron visitation and inspection on Sunday afternoon, Nov. 15, between 3 and 5 p. m. The building enables the school to offer courses in mechanical drawing and woodwork with some 60 students participating.

The building consists of approximately 2500 square feet and has classroom facilities for mechanical drawing, office space and shop area. The building construction is of concrete block, steel beams and asphalt tile roof and was built by the Winters Lumber Company.

A complete list of power tools will be available for student use and includes wood and metal lathes, band saws, planer, shaper, drill press, jointer and others. Student projects will also be on display during the open house visitation. Courses in mechanical drawing and woodwork are taught by Jerry Durgan, graduate of Sul Ross College.

Districtwise, Winters beat Eastland, 20-0, and Ranger, 22-0. Both teams were trampled by Brady in pre-conference games: Brady defeated Winters 50-14, and Coleman 32-6.

## High School Band ... and the Half Time Show!

Many factors enter into the idea behind the shows presented by the Winters High School band between halves at football games. These come from everyday occurrences, newspaper articles, holidays, and many others.

Once the director has chosen the idea or theme of the show he must chart it. In other words, he must place each bandman in a certain place on the field, and when all the students are assigned their spot, the script for that one particular maneuver is written. After the initial idea is formed, charting the show for a 60-piece band takes about three hours of work. Each bandman knows where he is to go for each of the three maneuvers which are part of a pageant show. A high school band is allowed eight minutes on the field at a halftime, so split second timing is most important.

Music appropriate to the theme must be chosen and rehearsed for each Friday's show. A good high school band will play eight to twelve different pieces of music

while they are performing on the field.

Rehearsal time is usually one hour for each eight minute show. The band must rehearse their precision marching each day of the school week. The band period is usually 55 minutes long, but after the time it takes for roll call, and reaching the practice field, only about 40 minutes of time is left for practice. In this 40 minute period, the band must learn new maneuvers, pivots, diamonds, flanks, countermarches, obliques, and others. All this in addition to the show that must be put on each week.

Music for the game itself must be rehearsed. The band plays 25 to 30 pieces in the stands as the game is being played. One hour per week is given to this phase of the performance.

Finally, in order for a band to do its best on the field in front of the public, it takes three hours of charting time; two hours of music time and about four hours of marching time. All this to entertain the patrons of the school during the halftime period.

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**Complete Processing Plant Is Brought To Farmers Of This Area**

A new farm service that brings a complete feed processing plant right into customers' farmyards has been started in this area by Winters Feed And Seed, of Winters, Texas.

In announcing the new operation, Weldon Huntsman, owner, said that the new "mill on wheels" will benefit local farmers and feeders who want to utilize their own grains and roughages for feeding livestock and poultry. One of the main advantages of the new service, he said, is that it brings the mill to the farmer instead of the farmers having to take his grist to the mill.

The mobile unit, first of its type in this area, is built by the Daffin Manufacturing Company of Lancaster, Pa. It consists of a complete feed mill that grinds all farm grown grains and roughages according to the farmer's specifications, mixes the ground material with feed concentrates, and blends in fresh liquid molasses to produce any desired formula. The truck-borne mill is powered by its own Diesel engine and is driven from farm to farm on a regular route schedule.

The new mobile farm service saves feeders a tremendous amount of time, labor, and money, according to the equipment owners. Increased emphasis is also placed on better nutrition, enabling farmers to get high production and greater profit from their meat, milk, and eggs.

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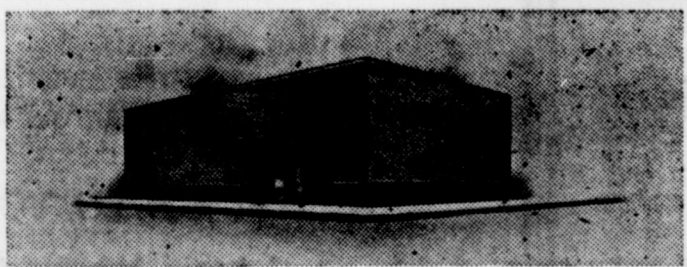

## Blizzards Cool Eastland Mavericks 20-0 Friday Night

Riding high on the winds of the season's first norther, the Winters Blizzards branded the Eastland Mavericks to the tune of 20-0 here Friday night.

The Blizzards drank deep in sweet revenge as they recalled the crushing 12-0 defeat in Eastland last year.

The Blizzards struck first late in the 2nd period, when, with 51 seconds remaining in the half, half-back William Grissom closed out a 43 yard drive, slashing in from the eight yard line. Grissom swept end for the conversion, and Winters led 8-0.

Eastland came back in the third quarter, when they marched down to the Blizzard one, but Winters' forward wall rose up, smashing the visitors bid for a tally.

Shortly after the beginning of the fourth quarter, quarterback Jerry Dunnam hit Jimmy Smith on the twenty, and little Jimmy scampered down to around 5, where he stopped completely, turned, ran in between two Eastland defenders, and then waltzed over to pay dirt. The try for points failed, and the Blizzards held a 14-0 lead.

A bit of irony surrounded events of the last Blizzard tally. Last year, in the shutout at Eastland, Charles Currey, punting for the first time, kicked the pigskin straight up, with the ball coming down on Winters' 5. This year Winters picked up an Eastland punt on the Mavericks 25 yard line, and 5 plays later Grissom scored.

The real story of the game, however, lies in Smith. The 136 pound end was in on over three-fourths of the tackles, did a tremendous job of rushing the Maverick passer, and showed razzle-dazzle running almost equal to that of Texas University's speedster, Jimmy Saxton. Stanley Bolden and Louis Dietz also played outstanding defensive games, as did big Tommy Webb.

The backs were running well, and the line did a good job. Winters' big end, James (Pee Wee) Williams latched on to an aerial for a good gain, and Dietz swiped an enemy toss on spectacular plays for the victors.

So now the stage is set—the Coleman Bluecats move to Blizzard field Friday—in almost the same situation as last year's contest, except that the positions are exactly reversed.

Rumor has it that Coleman's football players were ashamed to come back to school on Monday following the Blizzards 1958 14-12 victory at the Bluecats homecoming game last year—tonight (Friday) the Blizzard King and Queen will be crowned—and the general feeling around WHS is that the Bluecats will go home colder than when they came in.

## Appointment Of Farm Census Crew Leader Announced

Appointment of Mrs. Mary F. Mueller of Ballinger, Texas as a crew leader for the 1959 Census of Agriculture was announced today by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas.

Mrs. Mueller will direct a force of census takers who will canvass all farms in Runnels and Coleman Counties. Before assuming her post, she will go to San Angelo, Texas where she will receive five days of training by a member of the Census Bureau's staff. Topics to be covered include procedures for recruiting of census takers, census taker training, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports, and the supervision of census takers to insure a complete and accurate count.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operations of the Census of Agriculture. It is her responsibility to recruit and train the census takers and supervise their work; plan and allocate work assignments; review the work of the census takers and take remedial action where necessary, and to conduct difficult interviews.

After completing her training, Mrs. Mueller will return to her district where she will spend several weeks recruiting census takers, and training them in preparation for the start of the field canvass on November 18.

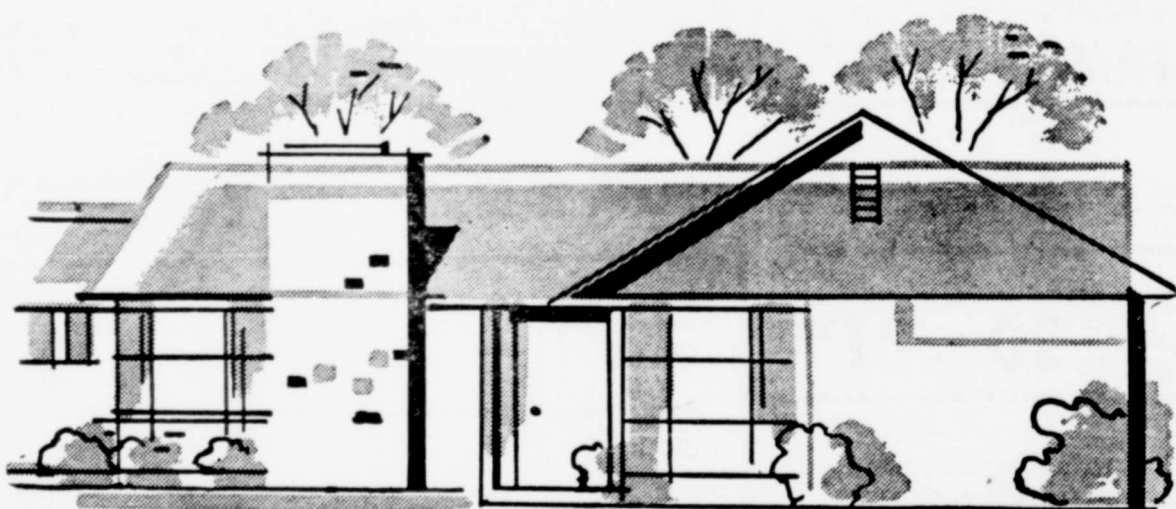

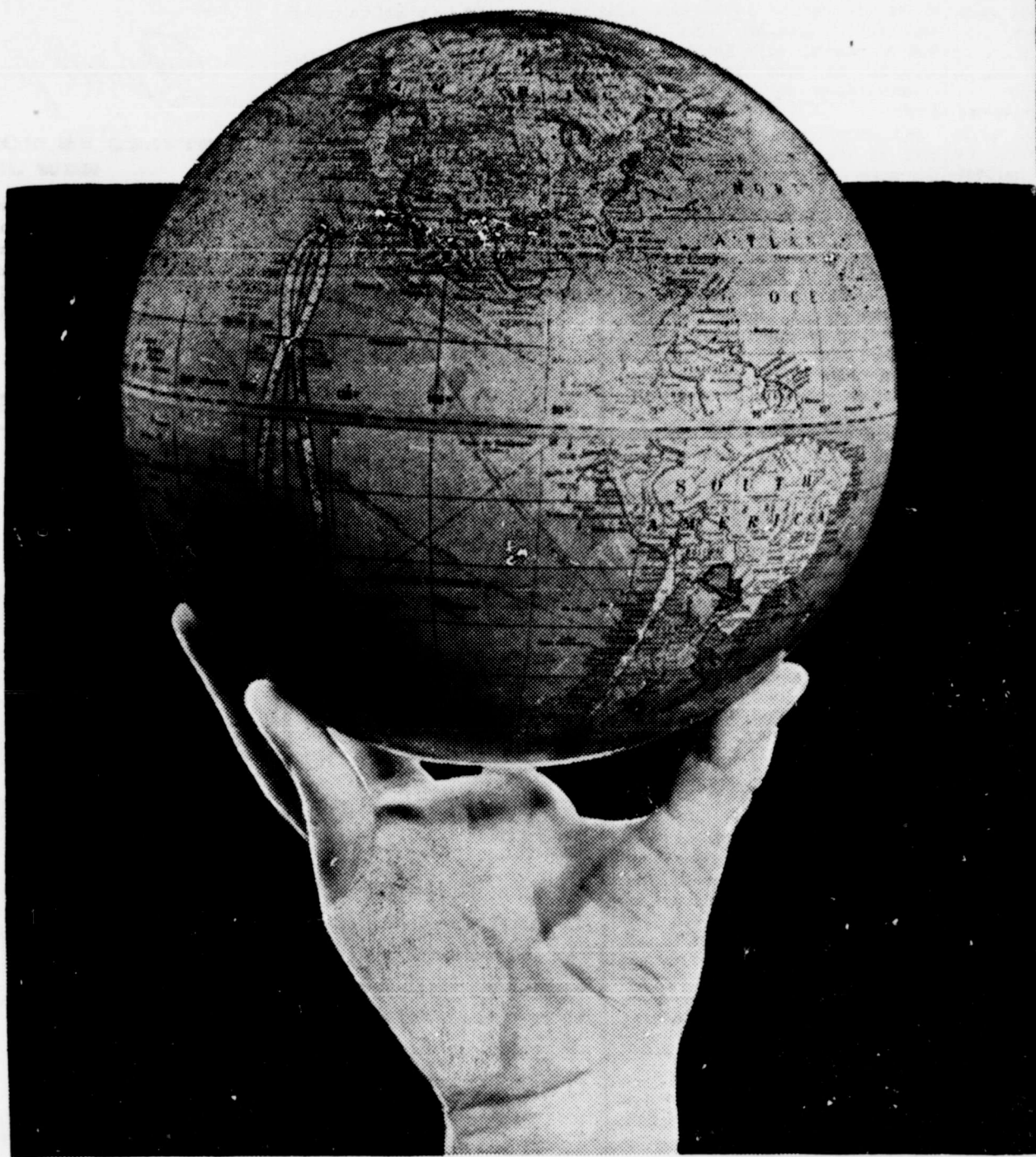

## Runnels Members Of TSTA Hear Hale-Aiken Points

John Lovelady of the Texas State Teachers Association discussed the three-point minimum foundation program for the betterment of education in the state, at the first meeting of the Runnels County Unit of the association in Ballinger Monday night.

Included in the program discussed by Lovelady were 1. Salary for teachers; 2. Funds for maintenance and operation; 3. Reimbursement for transportation. The first step toward achieving the Hale-Aiken program recommended by 254 county committees and the state Hale-Aiken committee, Lovelady pointed out, should strengthen the three areas of the minimum program by providing an immediate increase in the state minimum salary schedule of \$45 per month, and effective 1959-1960, a \$12 per month increment for each year of teaching service. This would provide a \$3600 annual beginning salary for a degree teacher.

The program also calls for an increase of \$50 per teacher for maintenance and operation (teaching supplies, custodial care, utilities, insurance, repairs). Also called for in the program is an increase of \$190 per bus in transportation reimbursement.

Prior to the main address the Ballinger Junior High School choir sang several numbers.

After the meeting, refreshments were served to approximately 200 people in the school Home Economics Cottage.

## Safety Experts Warn Parents of Halloween Hazards To Children

J. O. Musick of Austin, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, sends this reminder to moms and dads as a Halloween safety thought: "The highway isn't the only hazardous spot for Halloweeners. The home and its surroundings can be just as big a bobby trap."

That tip from one of the leading safety experts, who believes adults have an obligation to keep the trick-or-treaters safe as they tramp from house to house Saturday night—served as an advance warning to parents that the annual observance of All Saints Day (Halloween, to you) is upon us.

"Most motorists," Musick said, "know you can't count on excited youngsters to play it safe, so they exercise extra caution when driving on Halloween. Many homeowners, though, haven't learned their lesson quite so well. Homeowners have a moral responsibility to keep youngsters safe at Halloween. Furthermore, in many instances homeowners can be legally responsible if someone is injured on their property."

How can you guard against a tragedy that may mar a child's Halloween? Follow these, and similar, suggestions, Musick recommends:

1. Light your porch if there's any chance of a visit from trick-or-treaters Saturday evening. An excited youngster is ripe for a tumble in the dark.

2. Make sure your yard isn't an obstacle course for children. Cover excavations. Tie strips of white cloth to temporary fences around shrubbery or newly seeded grass.

3. If you have a dog, keep it secured. The strange sights and sounds of youngsters dressed up to look like ghosts and goblins could excite it—with dire results. "Keep Halloween happy," Musick advised. "Don't let a needless accident spoil some child's fun."

It must be fun to be asked questions when you know the answers.

## Farmers, Ranchmen Use Small Grain To Supplement Grass

Many farmers and ranchmen in the Runnels Soil Conservation District use small grain to supplement native grassland, states Glen Green of the Ballinger Work Unit. Marvin Hambricht of Crews, Vester Parrish of Wingate, and B. T. Gardner of Winters, are a few of the District cooperators who give their ranges a rest with this practice.

Glen Green, of the local Soil Conservation Service, said that this practice has other benefits also. If managed properly, a protective cover will be maintained on the cropland during our most critical "blow season" period. This period usually ends about April 1. After this date one may allow a short rest and plow it under as a green manure crop to return much needed nutrients to the soil. Very often farmers remove livestock from small grain in March allowing the crop to mature seed. The grain is harvested, and residues are left on the surface of the soil for protection against wind and water erosion. The stubble can be plowed under and furnish the benefits of a soil improving crop by adding nitrogen fertilizer to the residue. This should be at the rate of about ten pounds of nitrogen per ton of residue. Dense, easily packed soils are benefitted by the root action of small grains. These roots probe through these dense layers leaving openings for water to penetrate. When the plants complete growth, the roots die and leave large amounts of organic matter in the soil.

Moreover, even with the added cost of the fumigant—about \$22 per acre—the cost per bale of cotton produced under the experiment was lower than when the nematodes were not controlled. Applied at the rate of four gallons per acre, DBCP is injected about eight inches into the soil with equipment similar to that used to apply anhydrous ammonia. Then the soil is compacted with a roller to prevent the fumigant from escaping. Cotton planting should be delayed until about eight days following fumigation to avoid any possible toxic effects of the nematocide on the plants. Because this waiting period varies with the type of soil, growers are advised to follow the fumigant manufacturer's recommendations, says Smith.

Differences between the size of seedlings in the treated areas and those in the untreated areas are readily apparent. Plants in the fumigated plots are larger and more vigorous than those in the untreated plots and these differences become more pronounced as the plants mature.

Research showed that treatment after planting leaves a moderately heavy nematode infestation, and is not an effective means of control.

Observation in Texas indicate that spot treatment of localized infested areas may be better than overall fumigation in the field. Smith adds that the fumigants Dowfume D-85 and D-D are being used with good results in the irrigated cotton areas of Texas.

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## Root-Knot Nematodes On Cotton Can Be Controlled

Root-knot nematodes, which results in an average loss of more than 160,000 bales of cotton annually for all U. S. cotton-producing areas, can be controlled by using a chemical soil fumigant, reports Harlan E. Smith, extension plant pathologist. This pest occurs particularly in the irrigated areas of the Southwest, he adds, and accounts for 10 percent of U. S. cotton disease losses.

A nematologist of USDA's Agricultural Research Service in Arizona has shown that DBCP (marketed under the name of Nemagon or Fumazone) can effectively reduce populations of root-knot nematodes. This method of control, says Smith, is as effective as crop rotation and summerfallow in combating the pest.

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## Dependent Parents May Receive Benefits From Social Security

The 1958 amendments to the Social Security Act provide payments for dependent parents of a worker who dies, even though a widow, widower, or children also survives. This important reminder was issued today by Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the social security office located at San Angelo. So, if you are a parent who was receiving most of your support from a son or daughter at the time of his or her death, Ellington suggests that you contact your social security office.
