

Eastland County To Host Law Enforcement School

Final approval has been given by the Eastland County Commissioners Court to a 20-hour 1 a w enforcement training school to be held in morning and evening sessions Aug. 4-15 in classroom space provided by Cisco Junior College, according to County Judge Scott Bailey.

The Eastland commissioners are paying \$300 for the instruction, which will be provided by Arthur Butler of the A&M University Police Training Division headed by Ira Scott.

Individual students may take the course at no expense, Judge Bailey said, and all area law enforcement officers and interested private citizens have been invited to participate. Bailey said registration is now being conducted, and he asked potential students to contact him for applications.

CJC President Leland Willis volunteered the air-conditioned college classrooms for the sessions which will be held from 10 to 12 a.m. and from 7 to 9 p.m. weekdays. The separate sessions are intended to allow both night and day-duty officers and others to attend at least part of the courses.

Bailey said the courses will include three basic areas: a primary police training course (201 in the A&M Calendar), a primary criminal investigation course, and material on traffic law enforcement and accident investigation.

search and seizure, rules of evidence, the code of criminal procedure, patrol methods

Judge Bailey said particular emphasis will be given to the public relations material. He also said he hopes a number of private citizens attend the courses, possibly with a view to organizing a volun-

Construction Set to Begin On Carbon's New Water System

Construction is to begin immediately for the installation of the Carbon Water System, with the formal signing this week of a contract for construction.

The new Carbon System authorized \$130,000 in bonds, insured with the Farmers Home Adminstration and maturing over the next 40 years.

On hand for the formal signing were prinicpals, giving the go-ahead for construction of two pump stations and installation of the water system. Contractor is George M. Amthor of San Saba on a bid of \$115,200. Some 110 customers are to be served initially, with a potential of about 140.

Mayor Clint Britian of Carbon said that the realization of the water system will substantially help the economy in Carbon, and it is expected that the community's economy will stabilize and grow. Signing the 130 \$1,000 bonds was System Secretary-Treasurer Collin Campbell, as plans were finalized in the offices of O. M. The Carbon System will secure water from the City of Eastland at a site near Int. 20, south of Eastland.

Other members of the County FHA Committee are Claud Fuller of Gorman and Hulon Erwin of Rising Star. Work on the project is expected to take some 120 days.

Farm acroage certification is in its second year in Eastland county. In 1968 this system was inaugurated in the county. "We are very pleased with the way the farmers received and cooperated with this new concept of reporting acreage," Mr. Jesse G. Meredith, county office manager for Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, stated.

Have Immediate Diagnosis In Suspected Hog Cholera

Hog Cholera is not a thing of the past in Texas, Bill R. Cardwell, Cisco veterinarian told the Cisco Press Saturday. He had just returned from College Station where he attended a two-day conference of Texas veterinarians where what is known as the Phase 3 program for hog cholera eradication was reviewed in one part of the program.

Phase 3, he explained, aims at the total eradication of cholera by complete ulation" of infected herds. Phase one of the program wa a survey of herds to determin probable extent of infectio and Phase two dealt with getting rid of sick animals in the herd.

Under Phase three all herds found to have infection would be disposed of under state supervision.

Funds are available to indemnify owners whose animals are removed under this phase of the program, but Dr. Cardwell warned that only those


the state regulatory veterinan makes his diagnosis of the herd will be paid for.

For that reason, he said, if important that herd owns have an early diagnosis. rey should contact a veterarian as soon as possible afainfection is suspected and

If veterinarian finds probinfection he will notify the State authorities and a diagnosis. Animals which are dead balore the

man examines the herd ill not be subject to payment will be disposed of under the state veterinarian's supervision Some of the animals may be subject to sale in the market.


the Fourth of July program is requested by many people for a repeat performance on the jamboree. Other groups are pending to


