Texas Education Agency and the State Division of Defense and Disaster Relief are co-sponsors of the civil defense adult education program. Since the program got under way late last year, 2,816 persons over the state have taken the free 12-hour course. Another 1.295 persons are attending 66 classes now in progress, and 150 new classes are due to begin this

Classes are held at public school and taught by public school and junior college teachers who have een trained and certified by TEA's civil defense staff.

Seven new teacher training work have civil defense classes in or near every Texas community.
