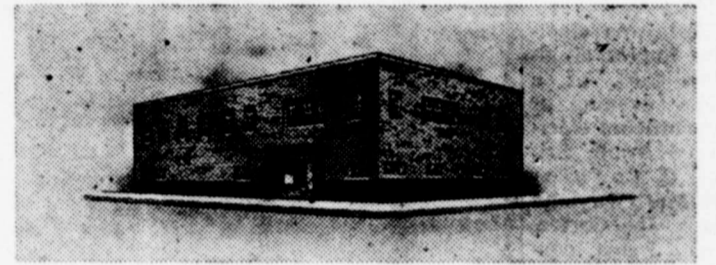
The girls had just finished a unit on teas and this gave them an opportunity to practice their new social skills.

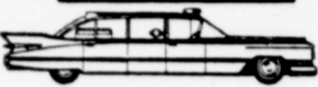


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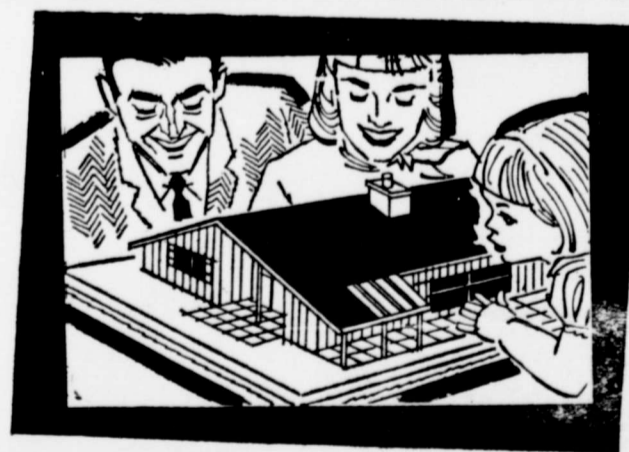

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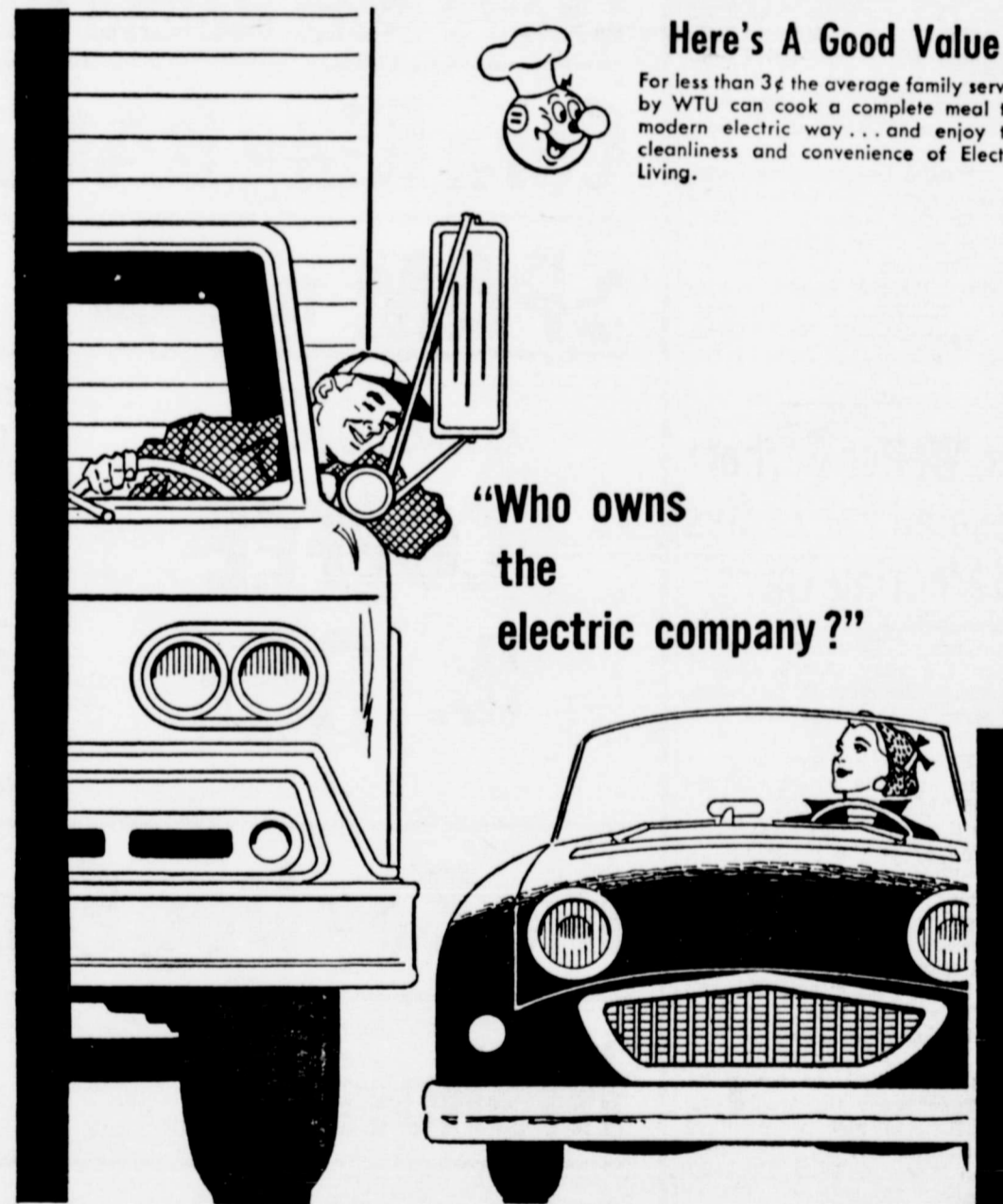

He has one sister, Mrs. Oscar Lackey of Lawn. His mother died in 1906 and his father in 1925. He has two sisters and two brothers deceased.
